Program Highlights

Urban and Community Forestry

Connecticut ReLeaf recognizes municipalities, institutions, and neighborhoods with exemplary urban forestry programs. The four most recent honorees are Milford, Groton, Glastonbury, and Farmington.

Cooperative Fire Protection

State Fire Assistance helped provide: training for 1,400 firefighters, personal protection equipment, 30 dry hydrants, and Firewise, Prevention, and Risk planning. The Federal Excess Property Program helped acquire 210 lightweight nomex jeans for Volunteer Fire Departments, train 100 firefighters, and assist 51 communities with \$69,000 in Volunteer Fire Assistance funds.

Forest Stewardship

Forest stewardship training for Envirothon students, COVERTS volunteers, and landowners raised the awareness of the value of active land stewardship. Connecticut completed its Priority Plan.

Forest Health Management

The State Agricultural Experiment Station continues to assist with research and delineation of forest pests, especially the hemlock wooly adelgid and other introduced insects and pathogens. Their focus is using natural predators to reduce pest populations and their impacts.

Economic Action

Connecticut is a partner in the Southern New England Forest Consortium to promote the importance of the region's forests. Workshops on Costs of Community Services, Fostering Forest Conservation in Southern New England Communities, and See the Forest demonstrated the positive net financial contribution of open space and forests.

Forest Legacy Program

Landowners in the Stonehouse Brook Watershed Forest Legacy Project received Forest Stewardship training to integrate the Forest Legacy and Stewardship Cooperative Forestry Programs.
