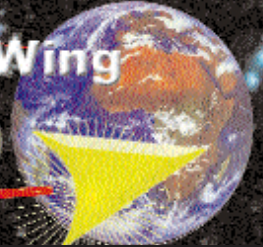

## Manpower reductions planned throughout AFSPC

PETERSON AIR FORCE BASE, COLO. – Air Force Space Command will trim 1,125 employee positions over the next seven years as part of an Air Force initiative to realign more than 13,000 active-duty and civilian manpower authorizations by 2010.

The AFSPC plan calls for 756 positions to be eliminated across the command by the end of September 2004 - 314 civilian and 442 military positions. By the end of September 2009, the number of eliminated positions will grow to 1,125 - 349 civilian and 776 military. What positions will be trimmed and at what locations should be determined by the end of March, according to Col. Laurie Carroll, chief

of Headquarters AFSPC's manpower division.

"Historically, we've been able to work manpower reductions without causing individuals to lose their jobs, but there are no guarantees," Col. Carroll said. "Each AFSPC base will use a specialized group of personnel programs to minimize the impact on their employees while maintaining the viability of their mission."

These strategies include retraining military members, and offering priority placement and voluntary retirement and separation incentives to civilian employees. The command is also planning to delay or delete some planned initiatives.

Increased operations tempo, workload and security requirements created by the war on terrorism, as well as

budget constraints have prompted the Air Force to review its manpower authorizations to create a workforce better prepared to meet future challenges and missions. The plan is to put more resources into its highest priority missions, including special operations, security and intelligence, which were heavily stressed after Sept. 11, 2001.

"We are committed to minimizing the impact on people as much as possible," Col. Carroll said. "No military member will be involuntarily separated. While we can't absolutely guarantee no civilian worker will lose their job, we're doing everything we can to trim positions without affecting current AFSPC employees. We're concerned about the

Greetings friends! Congratulations to the entire Delta IV launch team for the spectacular and successful launch Monday of a Defense Satellite Communications System satellite. After a couple of minor technical issues were resolved, the Delta IV blasted off at 7:59 p.m. Monday. After approximately 60 days of tests, the DSCS becomes operational in May and will aid our war fighters overseas fight the war on terror and any other war that may be in our nation's future. SUPER JOB!

I'm sure by now the front page and Page 3 articles on the Space Command manpower cuts and Stop Loss have caught your eye. I'd like to take a moment and address them both. Concerning the manpower cuts, I already have the manpower and personnel folks working a plan. Like a skilled surgeon, we are only going to cut what is absolutely necessary and with great forethought. It will definitely be a "measure twice, cut once" approach and not cutting slots by "a fast swing with a meat ax."

Regarding Stop Loss, our AF leadership struggled with this very hard. They know this is the third implementation in four years. But at the end of the day, they did what is necessary to carry out the mission of our Air Force. Instead of blanketing the force, however, they also took a "measure twice, cut once" approach and are only holding people in career fields where it's absolutely necessary. It affects career fields across the board. Flyers, maintainers, historians and lawyers were all held and not specific groups targeted, such as medics only. It's simply a function of shortages in certain career fields.

As always, if someone is experiencing a true hardship, work your chain of command to bring it to my attention. If there is a hardship, I will help the person work the waiver package. Remember, the list is periodically reviewed and specialty codes removed as warranted. I know it will be tough for some, but your nation needs you now more than ever.

Next week, our 45th Medical Group once again is being put through their paces for a critical inspection. The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations/Health Service

Inspection team arrives Monday. This team is a joint civilian-military team evaluating every aspect of the group's capability to deliver medical care in support of the wing's launch mission.

Col. Chuck Mackett, the 45th Med Group commander, calls it his group's Super Bowl. I am confident his entire team is well prepared. I ask the rest of the wing to lean forward and support

this effort if called upon to do so. The wing leadership and I are welcoming the team at the front of the clinic Monday, 5:30 p.m. I invite you to join me in welcoming the inspectors and supporting the Med Group through this important inspection. We know they're the best in the business and a week from today, the JCAHCO team will know it as well!

With all that transpired this week, it's extremely obvious we've reached a pivotal point regarding the situation in Iraq. I don't have a crystal ball and don't know what will happen next. Our leaders at the highest levels of government are working this issue hard and will continue to do so in the coming days. There are people from this wing that are deployed from their families for months. This is a very serious time for our nation and we need to all do our part. This includes being able to react at a moment's notice. I appreciate your efforts in this area.

I know I've addressed this numerous times, but if there was ever a time to ensure your "ducks were in a row" in order to deploy, this is the time. That means everything from having your shots done to your loved ones knowing where to find your will and how to pay bills while you are gone. The time to take care of this is not while you are trying to process through a mobility line. Register now on the MyPay Web site to receive your password before you deploy. See Finance if you have questions. We'll see how the next few days unfold,

but if our leaders call upon us to react, we'll need to be ready!

I'd like to officially welcome Col. Greg Billman, his wife Dania and their two girls Brooke and Becca to the 45th Space Wing team. He officially took command March 7, during a classy change of command ceremony at the foot of the Cape lighthouse. Col. Billman brings a wealth of experience to the wing as a missileer, space operator and senior navigator with more than 3,700 flying hours.

He is a certified war hero with combat missions over Baghdad during the Gulf War. # AF starts Stop-Loss

WASHINGTON -- The Assistant Secretary of the Air Force (Manpower & Reserve Affairs) has authorized the use of Stop Loss in order to retain specific skills needed to meet national security objectives. Effective May 2, 2003, 43 officer and 56 enlisted specialties are Stop Lossed.

"We do not take this action lightly," said Secretary of the Air Force Dr. James G. Roche. "Stop Loss is designed to preserve critical skills essential to supporting the Global War on Terrorism, while ensuring we're prepared to meet contingencies."

"We've implemented Stop Loss to ensure we have the necessary skilled personnel to conduct operations," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. John P. Jumper. "We'll use it only as long as necessary to accomplish our mission."

Stop Loss is being implemented across the total force (active duty, Air Force Ready Reserve, and Air National Guard) for the affected career fields and affects all airmen in the rank of colonel and below, according to Maj. Teresa L. Forest, chief of Air Force retirements and separation policy at the Pentagon.

The secretary and chief of staff are

acutely aware that the Air Force is an all-volunteer force and that this action, while essential to meeting the service's worldwide obligations, is inconsistent with the fundamental principles of voluntary service.

"We take Stop Loss seriously and are working hard to ensure the lives of our airmen, their families and their civilian employers are not disrupted any longer than is necessary to meet our national commitments," Gen. Jumper said.

Therefore, a waiver process will be implemented for those people with unique circumstances.

"We are doing our best to minimize this disruption," Dr. Roche said. "And we will look at unique circumstances on a case-by-case basis and do all we can to offer appropriate relief."

"We understand the individual sacrifices that our airmen and their families will be making," Gen. Jumper said. "We appreciate their unwavering support and dedication to our nation."

# Reshaping force never easy task

Over the next seven years, Air Force Space Command will trim 1,125 manpower positions. That is our share of the more than 13,200 reductions the Air Force must make before the end of the decade. Seven hundred and fifty-six of those cuts will come in the next year, so we are exploring proposals to implement the reductions. We will focus on outsourcing, reprogramming or delaying some manpower positions and eliminating lower-priority workload.

With all the rumors out there, I want to assure everyone in Air Force Space Command that this force reshaping is central to the needs of the Air Force, especially in strengthening sorely stressed career fields such as security forces and intelligence.

The command is taking a mission-oriented approach to the cuts it has been directed to make, rather than arbitrarily assigning reduction numbers to bases. We believe a "fair share" spread of the reduction to the field is counterproductive, so we will take a hard look at each mission area rather than taking a percentage of slots from each unit.

We still have not completely resolved what bases, or career fields, this reduction will come from in AFSPC. Those decisions should be finalized in the next month.

Identified airmen will have the opportunity to retrain while civilians will be eligible for priority placement, voluntary early retirement and voluntary separation incentives. I can't absolutely guarantee that no civilian workers will lose their jobs, but we're doing everything we can to avoid any involuntary separations as a result of this manpower reduction.

Increased operations tempo, workload and security requirements created by the war on terrorism, as well as budget constraints, have prompted the Air Force to review its authorizations to create a workforce better prepared to meet future challenges and missions. Our challenge is to reallocate positions - both military and civilian - to alleviate some of that workforce stress.

Let me assure you that we will do everything possible to trim positions with a minimal effect on current AFSPC employees. We will do this in part by delaying or deleting some positions slated to be filled in the next year, as well as using attrition and current vacancies. We're concerned about the personal issues of this action more than the personnel issues.

Today's challenges have forced the Air Force to make tough decisions. Shaping the workforce to meet the future steady state of the Air Force that has evolved since Sept. 11 is our top priority. We must do this by making sure manpower authorizations do not exceed the funding Congress has given us.

We will work this issue extremely hard to get answers as soon as possible. We are fully committed to keeping the number of people affected as low as possible without negatively impacting the missions of our bases.

personal issues of this action more than the personnel issues. We want and need to take care of our people."

Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld directed a review of the Air Force last year to best determine its ability to meet mission requirements.

Based on this review, the Air Force directed realignment of more than 13,000 military and civilian manpower authorizations by 2010. Each Air Force major command was given a share of positions to eliminate.

"The restructuring of manpower positions isn't an attempt to reduce the Air Force's personnel strength," she said.

"Rather, it's an effort to shape the workforce to meet the future steady state of the Air Force that has evolved since Sept. 11."

The command is taking a programmatic approach to the cuts it has been directed to make, rather than arbitrarily assigning reduction numbers to bases.

# First military payload launched on EELV

America's warfighters gained a critical global communications asset Monday with the successful launch of the first military satellite on an Evolved Expendable Launch vehicle — in this case, a Boeing Delta IV rocket.

Boeing's Delta IV and Lockheed Martin's Atlas V are the two families of EELVs developed with the Air Force to modernize and reduce the cost of America's space lift operations. Both flew their maiden missions with commercial payloads last year.

"Today's launch marks the dawn of a new day for national security space programs," said Lt. Col. Tony Taliancich, director of the EELV Cape Consolidated Task Force.

The military payload boosted into orbit Monday was a Defense Satellite Communications System satellite. It joined a constellation that is recognized as the backbone of the U.S. military's communications capabilities. DSCS serves all Department of Defense branches in a worldwide network coordinated by the Defense Information Systems Agency.

"This DSCS satellite will be positioned over the Indian Ocean and should be fully operational by July 1. That's about a 55-day reduction from nominal on-orbit checkout operations," said Capt. Greg Ellingson, DSCS Integration Officer, Det. 8 of the Space and Missile Systems Center. "Getting this satellite up and running is being accelerated because it's critical to our warfighters' needs for current national security operations."

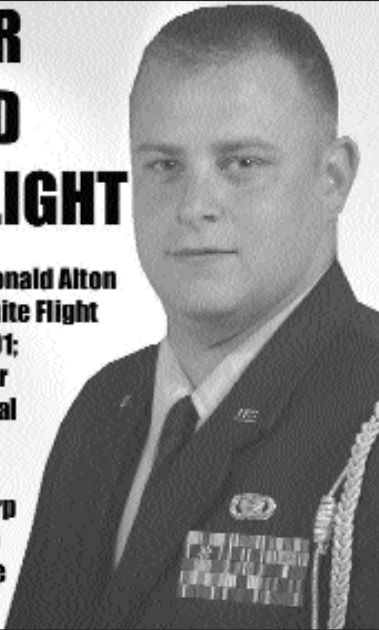
"Words can't do justice to the feelings of pride and accomplishment I felt when the Delta IV soared into the heavens and when the DSCS satellite was placed into its proper orbit," said Lt. Col. Taliancich. "This marks the fruition of a 10-year dream for me and is a significant milestone in the Boeing/government partnership for EELV."

The 45th Space Wing ensured safe access to space for the DSCS satellite by coordinating Eastern Range support including tracking and telemetry, weather and communications.

"Most people aren't afforded the opportunity to participate in a defining moment of our nation's history," said Maj. Julia Black, Range Operations commander. "This was our time. It's a great privilege to help make a difference. Given current world events, the timing couldn't have been better."

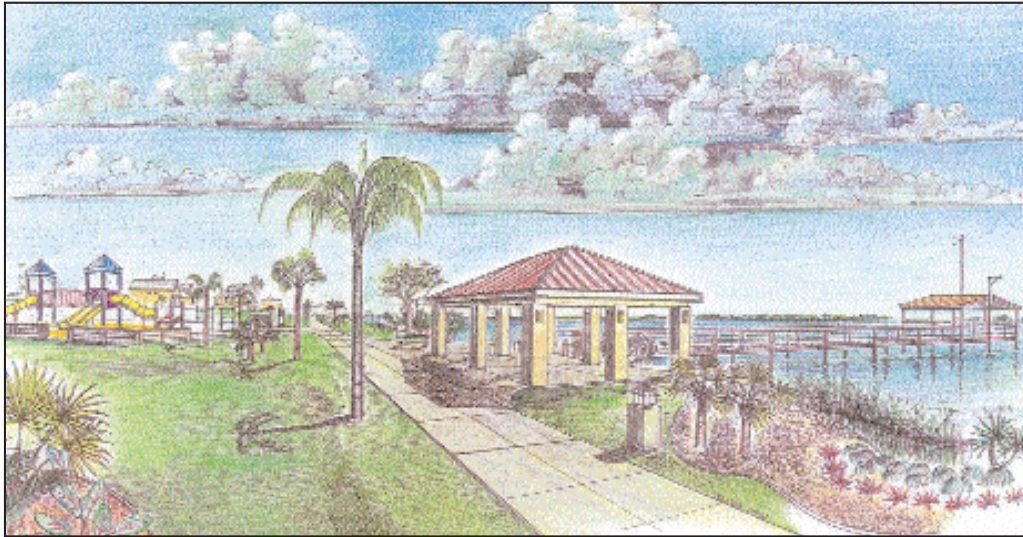
"SeaFest stimulates the local economy and encourages everyone to work together for the benefit of our community."

Patrick's recreational area just got a lot nicer, thanks to \$400,000 in quality of life funds. The 45th Civil Engineer Squadron secured the housing funds to begin phase one of the Riverwalk path, which when completed will stretch along the shores of the Banana River from the tip of North Housing to the Family

#### Campground.

The Riverwalk's wide path will allow people to enjoy an unobstructed view of the river and take leisurely walks or exercise in an area free from vehicular traffic.

The first phase of the three-phase project to complete the Riverwalk portion in North Housing will begin this spring and include 2,000 feet, roughly the area from the Riverside

Temporary Living Facilities to the second fishing pier in North Housing.

The 9.5-foot-wide path will comply with all accessibility requirements and have water fountains, trash receptacle, lights, and benches all highlighted by new landscaping to include shade trees.

Four large pavilions, two of which are included in phase one, will provide sheltered areas for picnics and other activities.

Three of the four new pavilions will be located next to the existing piers and the pavilion furthest south in North Housing will adjoin the existing playground. The Riverwalk will connect to all the playgrounds via new sidewalks along the path.

The quality of family housing is one of the most important factors in the Air Force, and the Riverwalk is just one of the improvements 45th CES is implementing.

"Patrick Air Force Base has a unique landscape," said Lt. Col. Chris Hazen, 45th CES commander.

"We live on a barrier island, and this project will capitalize on the natural beauty and great weather we have down here in Florida.

"I hope families will enjoy walking, biking and relaxing next to the river."

## Teams evaluate award-winning 45th Medical Group

The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, in conjunction with the Air Force Inspection Agency's Health Services Inspection team, will survey the 45th Medical Group Monday through Friday.

Accreditation with JCAHO, a civilian organization, is recognized nationwide as a symbol of quality that indicates an organization meets specific performance standards, addressing leadership, nursing, medical care, and stringent safety and facility standards.

The HSI evaluators from Kirtland Air Force Base, N.M., look at military-specific issues such as preventive health assessments, readiness, family advocacy and other programs. This team provides senior Air Force medical leaders with an independent assessment of mission capability, health care and resource management.

"I'm confident the evaluation teams will recognize our commitment to supporting the wing's space launch mission through the outstanding medical care we provide to our active-duty and family members," said Col. Charles Mackett, 45th Medical Group commander.

Eight HSI and two JCAHO inspectors will look at every process the medical group accomplishes. These processes ensure the medical facility is in compliance with all Department of Defense and federal require-

ments and run the gamut from force health protection for deploying troops to diabetic teaching and nutritional counseling for the retired population at the Health and Wellness Center.

The standards the 45th MDG will be

judged by are developed in consultation with nationally-known healthcare experts, providers and measurement experts, as well as healthcare consumers. In order to assure year-round compliance with the standards, JCAHO and HSI give medical facilities just 30 days notice of the upcoming inspection. The 30 days is used to gather documentation, prepare for the team's arrival and synchronize actions of the MDG's personnel. To earn and maintain JCAHO/HSI accreditation, the MDG must undergo this on-site survey at least every three years. The last inspection was successfully completed in July 2000.

"The MDG is certain that we will once again accomplish our goal of accreditation through tenacious execution of our inspection game plan", said Col. Mackett.

A highlight of the inspector's visit will be the opportunity to view a special storyboard recognizing 45th MDG personnel's most recent achievements. The 45th MDG earned 40 percent of the available AFSPC MAJCOM Surgeon General Awards for 2002, taking home a record 32 annual awards.

# Cape cyclists pedal across Florida

Its genesis was 18 months ago with riders cycling around Cape Canaveral Air Force Station improving their fitness level during their lunch hour in hopes of eventually earning a T-Shirt.

Today, some of those same cyclists are preparing for a 170-mile ride across Florida, in less than 14 hours. The cyclists are gearing up for the April 13 "Ride Across Florida" that will take riders from Cocoa Beach to Tampa.

The Cape cycling program, affectionately known as Tour de Cape, has several different layers to it, according to Rafael "Chez" Sanchez, program manager.

The program started in September of 2001 with a simple goal, 500 miles in 10 weeks. Six out of 25 riders rose to the challenge.

Now, the program is in Phase 3, riders are on an honor system, but must report mileage to Sanchez, who logs it into the program's database. Riders don't have to be on the Cape.

Riders will receive mileage patches at the 1,000, 1,500, 2,000 and every 500 miles thereafter.

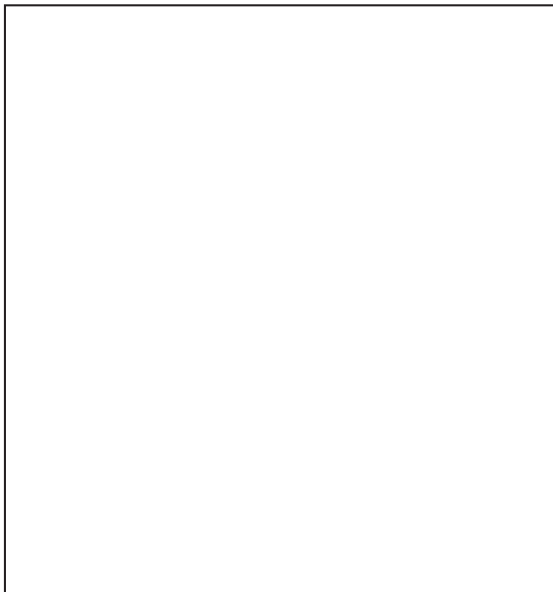
