D. TAXIDERMY (Migratory Bird Treaty Act, 50 CFR 21.24)

Note: A Federal taxidermy permit is required to perform taxidermy services on migratory birds or their parts, nests, or eggs for someone other than yourself. You should apply as an individual, and you must be at least 18 years old. The conditions of a Federal taxidermy permit are very specific. Please read "What You Need to Know Before Applying for a Federal Taxidermy Permit" and the pertinent regulations before you sign and submit your application.

Please make sure you include with your application a copy of any applicable State licenses or permits, as requested in C.2. on page 1 of this application.

Please provide the following information in the space below:					
1.	The location (street address or legal description) of the premises where taxidermy services will be provided, if different from your mailing address. This must include all drop-off and pick-up locations. The record keeping and tagging requirements specified in 50 CFR parts 13, 20, and 21 apply at all locations, and all locations are subject to Federal and State inspection.				
2.	Describe your taxidermy experience. This should include your experience mounting migratory game birds or other wildlife and any training or schools you have attended.				
3.	Please provide the name and address of anyone who will be assisting with the permitted activities and briefly describe what they will be doing. Anyone who will be assisting you with your taxidermy services must either possess their own Federal taxidermy permit or be listed as a subpermittee under your permit. (They also may require a State permit.) Subpermittees must be at least 18 years old. As the primary permittee, you will be responsible for ensuring that your subpermittees adhere to the terms of your permit.				
4.	You must retain records relating to the activities conducted under your permit for at least 5 years from the date of expiration of the permit. At what address will these records be kept?				



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE APPLYING FOR A FEDERAL TAXIDERMY PERMIT

A Federal Taxidermy permit will authorize you to mount or otherwise perform taxidermy work on migratory birds, their parts, nests or eggs, belonging to someone else. The conditions of a Federal taxidermy permit are very specific. You will receive several parts of the Code of Federal Regulations with your application (50 CFR parts 10, 13, 20, & 21). You are responsible for reviewing and understanding these regulations before you request and accept a permit. Below is a review of several sections pertinent to a Federal taxidermy permit.

- 1. You can receive and mount migratory game birds taken and possessed in compliance with applicable Federal and state hunting regulations. All such birds must be properly tagged as required by 50 CFR 20.36. The tag may be removed during taxidermy operations but must be retained and reattached after mounting, and must remain attached until the specimen is delivered to the owner. (50 CFR 21.24(d)(2))
- 2. You can sell properly marked, captive-reared migratory waterfowl that you have acquired from a federally licensed game farm. The propagator must give you a completed Notice of Transfer or Sale of Migratory Waterfowl (Form 3-186) at the time of the transfer, and you must maintain this form in your files. An additional copy of this Form 3-186 must accompany the mount when the bird is sold. **You may not sell any migratory bird that has been taken from the wild.** (50 CFR 21.24(c)(2))
- 3. Protected nongame birds such as songbirds, hawks, and owls, can be legally brought to a taxidermist by game wardens, Federal agents, or holders of appropriate State and Federal permits. Once mounted, these birds can be legally possessed only by public scientific education institutions. Private possession of nongame birds is prohibited. (English sparrows, common starlings, and feral pigeons are not native to the United State and are not protected by Federal law.) (50 CFR 21.11)
- 4. Your permit is not valid unless you also are in compliance with State requirements. This means that if your State requires you to have a State taxidermy permit or license, you must hold a valid State permit or license in order for your Federal permit to be valid. It is your responsibility to make sure any State permits/licenses are in order.
- 5. You must maintain an accurate recordbook of operations, on a calendar-year basis, including the names and addresses of persons from and to whom migratory birds or their parts, nests, or eggs were received or delivered; the species and quantity of each; and the dates of receipt and delivery. (50 CFR 21.24(d)(1)) You must maintain records for at least 5 years after the transaction. (50 CFR 13.46)
- 6. By accepting a Federal taxidermy permit, you authorize an agent of the Service to enter your premises at any reasonable hour to inspect the wildlife you hold, your books and records. (50 CFR 13.47)
- 7. Any address or location changes, or other circumstances that affect your permit, must be reported to your Regional Migratory Bird Permit Office in writing within 10 days so your permit can be amended. (50 CFR 13.23)
- 8. Renewal procedure. A renewal letter and form will be sent to you at least 60 days prior to the expiration of your permit. If you want to renew your permit, you must return the completed renewal to your Regional Migratory Bird Permit Office at least 30 days prior to the expiration of your permit and include a copy of your current State license, if one is required. If we receive your renewal request at least 30 days prior to the expiration of your permit, your permit will remain valid beyond the expiration date until a decision on your renewal is made. If you allow your permit to expire before requesting renewal, you must submit a new application. (50 CFR 13.22 and 13.11(c))

Contact the Fish and Wildlife Service Regional Migratory Bird Permit Office responsible for your State if you have any questions. (2/01)

PERMIT APPLICATION FORM INSTRUCTIONS

The following instructions pertain to the standard Permit Form 3-200 that must be completed as an application for a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The General Permit Procedures in 50 CFR 13 address the permitting process. For simplification, all licenses, permits, registrations, and certificates will be referred to as a permit.

- Complete section A or B, and sections C and D of the application. Print clearly or type in the information. An incomplete or unclear application may cause delays in processing or may be returned to the applicant.
- Provide any required additional information or attachments outlined in section D of the application form. Be as complete and descriptive as possible. If there is any doubt as to the information's relevance, include it with the application.
- Sign the application in blue ink and send the original to the address at the top of the application. Faxes or copies of the original signature will not be accepted.
- Please plan ahead. Allow at least 60 days for your application to be processed (50 CFR 13.11). Some applications may take longer than 90 days to process. Applications are processed in the order they are received.
- Additional forms and instructions are available on the Internet at http://permits.fws.gov/.

Most of the application form is self-explanatory, but the following provides some assistance for completing the form.

COMPLETE EITHER BLOCK A OR BLOCK B:

- Block A. "Complete if applying as an individual" Enter the complete name of the responsible individual who will be the permittee if a permit is issued. Enter personal information that identifies the applicant. All blocks must be completed. If you are applying as an individual but conducting permitted activities as a business, provide the name of the business. If you are applying on behalf of a client, the personal information must pertain to the client. A document evidencing power of attorney must be included with the application.
- Block B. "Complete if applying as a business, corporation, public agency, or institution" Enter the complete name and address of the business, agency, institution, or other organization that will be the permittee if a permit is issued. Give a brief description of the type of business or activity the applicant is engaged in, the name and phone number of the person in charge (i.e., principal officer), and if the company is incorporated, the state in which it is incorporated.

ALL APPLICANTS COMPLETE BLOCK C:

- Block C.1 "Do you currently have or have you had any Federal Fish and Wildlife permits? List the number(s) of your most current FWS or CITES permit or the number of the most recent permit if none are currently valid. (So not list permits of others under which you acted as a subpermittee or agent.)
- Block C.2 "Have you obtained all required State, Federal or foreign government approval to conduct the activity you propose?"

 (Please be aware that there may be other requirements necessary to conduct this activity, such as local zoning requirements.)

 If "yes," list the State, Federal or foreign countries involved and type of document required. Include a copy of these documents with the application. If "no," indicate what steps you have taken to secure approval (use attachment if necessary). If you have applied for the documents, check the "have applied" box and list the State, Federal or foreign countries involved and type of documents required. If the proposed activity is not regulated check "not required."
- Block C.3 "Check or money order (if applicable)" There is a permit processing fee unless you are fee exempt. Consult the enclosed APPLICATION PROCESSING FEE information. Make your check or money order payable to the "U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service" and attach it to the application form. If you are fee exempt, write "exempt" in the fee block.
- Block C.4 "CERTIFICATION" The individual identified in Section A, the principal officer named in Section B, or person with a valid power of attorney (documentation must be included in the application) must sign and date the application in blue ink. This signature binds the applicant to the statement of certification. This means that you certify that you have read and understand the regulations that apply to the permit. You also certify that everything included in the application is true to the best of your knowledge. Be sure to read the statement and re-read the application before signing.

ALL APPLICANTS COMPLETE SECTION D:

Provide any required additional information outlined in Section D of the application form. Be as complete and descriptive as possible. If there is any doubt as to the information's relevance, include it with the application.

APPLICATION FOR A FEDERAL FISH AND WILDLIFE PERMIT

Paperwork Reduction Act and the Privacy Act - Notices

In accordance with the Paperwork Reduction Act of 1995 (44 U.S.C. 3501, et seq.) and the Privacy Act of 1974 (5 U.S.C. 552a), please be advised that:

- 1. The gathering of information on fish and wildlife is authorized by:
 - (a) Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (16 U.S.C. 668), Title 50, Part 22, of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR);
 - (b) Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531-1544), <u>Title 50, CFR Part 17</u>;
 - (c) Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C. 703-712), Title 50, CFR Part 21;
 - (d) Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1361 et seq.), Title 50 CFR Part 18
 - (e) Wild Bird Conservation Act (16 U.S.C. 4901-4916), Title 50, CFR Part 15;
 - (f) Lacey Act (18 U.S.C. 42); Injurious Wildlife, <u>Title 50 CFR Part 16</u>;
 - (g) Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Flora and Fauna (CITES) (TIAS 8249); Title 50, CFR Part 23.
 - (h) General Provisions, <u>Title 50 CFR Part 10</u>;
 - (i) General Permit Procedures, <u>Title 50 CFR Part 13</u>; and
 - (j) Wildlife (Import/export/transport), Title 50 CFR Part 14.
- Information requested in this form is purely voluntary. However, submission of requested information is required in order to process applications for
 permits authorized under the above laws. Failure to provide all requested information may be sufficient cause for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to
 deny the request. Response is not required unless a currently valid Office of Management and Budget (OMB) control number is displayed on the form.
- 3. Certain applications for permits authorized under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1539) and the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1371-1383) will be published in the Federal Register as required by the two laws.
- 4. Disclosures outside the Department of the Interior may be made without the consent of an individual if the disclosure is compatible with the purposes for which the record was collected. (Ref. 68 FR 52611, September 4, 2003)
 - (a) To subject matter experts, State, Federal, local, and foreign agencies for the purpose of obtaining advice relevant to making a decision on an application for a permit or when necessary to accomplish a FWS function related to this system of records.
 - (b) To the public as a result of publishing Federal Register notices announcing the receipt of permit applications for public comment or notice of the decision on a permit application.
 - (c) To Federal, State, local, or foreign wildlife and plant agencies for the exchange of information on permits granted or denied to assure compliance with all applicable permitting requirements.
 - (d) Captive-bred Wildlife registrants under the Endangered Species Act for the exchange of authorized species, and to share information on the captive breeding of these species.
 - (e) To Federal, State, and local authorities who need to know who is permitted to receive and rehabilitate sick, orphaned, and injured birds under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act; federally permitted rehabilitators; individuals seeking a permitted rehabilitator with whom to place a bird in need of care; and licensed veterinarians who receive, treat, or diagnose sick, orphaned, and injured birds.
 - (f) To the Department of Justice, or a court, adjudicative, or other administrative body or to a party in litigation before a court or adjudicative or administrative body, under certain circumstances.
 - (g) To the appropriate Federal, State, tribal, local, or foreign governmental agency responsible for investigating, prosecuting, enforcing, or implementing statutes, rules, or licenses, when we become aware of a violation or potential violation of such statutes, rules, or licenses, or when we need to monitor activities associated with a permit or regulated use.
 - (h) To a congressional office in response to an inquiry to the office by the individual to whom the record pertains.
 - (i) To the General Accounting Office or Congress when the information is required for the evaluation of the permit programs.
 - (j) To provide addresses obtained from the Internal Revenue Service to debt collection agencies for purposes of locating a debtor to collect or compromise a Federal claim against the debtor, or to consumer reporting agencies to prepare a commercial credit report for use by the FWS.
- 5. For individuals, personal information such as home address and telephone number, financial data, and personal identifiers (social security number, birth date, etc.) will be removed prior to any release of the application.
- 6. The public reporting burden on the applicant for information collection varies depending on the activity for which a permit is requested. The relevant burden for a migratory bird taxidermy permit application is 1 hour. This burden estimate includes time for reviewing instructions, gathering and maintaining data and completing and reviewing the form. You may direct comments regarding the burden estimate or any other aspect of the form to the Service Information Clearance Officer, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Mail Stop 222, Arlington Square, U.S. Department of the Interior, 1849 C Street, NW, Washington D.C. 20240.

Freedom of Information Act - Notice

For organizations, businesses, or individuals operating as a business (i.e., permittees not covered by the Privacy Act), we request that you identify any information that should be considered privileged and confidential business information to allow the Service to meet its responsibilities under FOIA. Confidential business information must be clearly marked "Business Confidential" at the top of the letter or page and each succeeding page and must be accompanied by a non-confidential summary of the confidential information. The non-confidential summary and remaining documents may be made available to the public under FOIA [43 CFR 2.13(c)(4), 43 CFR 2.15(d)(1)(i)].

APPLICATION PROCESSING FEE

The fee to process a migratory bird permit application is \$25.00. Checks should be made payable to "U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service." The fee applies to new permit applications and renewals. The processing fee will not be refunded if the permit is issued or denied, or if the application is abandoned.

The fee schedule does not apply to any Federal, State, or local government agency or individual or institution under contract to such agency for the proposed activities. There is no fee for eagle permits issued under 50 CFR 22. Until further notice, the fee will be waived for permits and for permits for public institutions. As defined in 50 CFR 10.12 - "Public as used in referring to museums, zoological parks, and scientific or educational institutions, refers to such as are open to the general public and are either established, maintained, and operated as a governmental service or are privately endowed and organized but not operated for profit."
