- > 1.4 million military
- > 1.3 million military dependents of voting age
- > .1 million Federal civilian employees overseas
- 3.7 million overseas civilians, not affiliated with the Government

- Uniformed Services Participation
 1996 64 % 2000 69 %
- Overseas U. S. Civilian Participation
 1996 37 % 2000 37 %
- Federal Civilian Participation
 1996 68 % 2000 65 %

Actions Taken

- > DOD Directive 1000.4 revised and published, June 3, 2002.
 - Program scope and objective defined.
 - Defines DOD and Service roles and responsibilities.
- > Help America Vote Act of 2002 (Public Law 107-252).
- Monthly review with Senior Service Voting Representative (GO/FO).
- Increased worldwide Voting Assistance Officer (VAO) training and workshops:

Actions Taken - Continued

- Federal Voting Assistance Program website (www.fvap.gov) reengineered to a comprehensive, one-stop source for information.
- > Toll free phone access to FVAP increased from 58 to 66 countries.
- > Actions taken to increase FVAP awareness:
 - Through: DeCA, Exchanges, DoDEA, AFRTS, Pentagon Channel.
 - Communicating a positive message in the press (National and local).
 - Presentations at Mobilization sites and Family Readiness Groups.
 - Overseas Citizens' Voters' Week Jul 4-10, 2004 (C, JCS video)
 - Armed Forces Voters' Week Sep 3-11, 2004
 - Absentee Voting Week Oct 11-15, 2004
- Governors informed of the program and encouraged to support.

Unit Voting Assistance Officers provided standard products to enhance training.





Actions Taken - Continued

> Actively urging State Election Officials to permit use of fax or electronic mail methods.

- States permitting fax delivery of blank ballot increased from 23 to 32
- States permitting fax return of voted ballot increased from 17 to 23
- Some jurisdictions allow for blank ballot delivery by email
- On-line Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) now accepted by 53 states and territories.

> Absentee ballot envelope design specifications and special markings to expedite processing.

Contract awarded to facilitate email delivery of blank ballots from participating jurisdictions prior to election.





Other Actions Taken: Postal Improvements

Special handling implemented by US Postal Service (USPS) for election materials sent to and returned from APO/FPO addresses per postal briefing on June 2, 2004

 USPS Postmasters contact local election officials to coordinate handling procedures for election materials
 Military Postal Service Agency (MPSA) actions:

- All units now have proper postmarking devices
- Weekly messages on proper handling of ballots
- Biweekly and weekly surveys of all Military Post Offices (MPO) to ensure no ballots are delayed
- Published recommended mailing dates
