### Highlights

An estimated 5.4 million adults were under some form of correctional supervision in 1995. Seven in every ten of these people were on probation or parole. About 2.8% of the U.S. adult resident population were under correctional care or supervision in 1995, up from 1.6% in 1985.

### Jails

Local jails are facilities that hold inmates beyond arraignment, usually for more than 72 hours but less than a year. Local jails are administered by city or county officials.

Local jails held an estimated 499,300 adults, or about 1 in every 389 adult U.S. residents, on June 30, 1995. Men made up 90% of adult jail inmates. White non-Hispanic inmates accounted for 40% of the total jail population; black non-Hispanics, 43%; and Hispanics, 15%.

The total number of adults in jail increased by an estimated 19,500 inmates during the year ending June 30, 1995, or 4.1%. The overall increase of 255,000 adult inmates between 1985 and 1995 represents an average annual increase of 7%.

### Probation

Nearly 3.1 million adults were on probation on December 31, 1995. Probationers made up 58% of all adults under correctional supervision in 1995.

Approximately 21% of the probationers were women, a larger proportion than for any other correctional population. About 66% of adults on probation were white, and 32%, black. More than 6 in 10 persons discharged from probation had successfully completed their sentences.

The number of adults on probation in the United States increased by 115,500 (3.9%) between yearend 1994 and 1995. From 1985 to 1995 the probation population grew by more than 1.1 million, an average of 4.6% annually.

### Prisons

An estimated 1.1 million men and women were in the custody of State and Federal prisons at yearend 1995. About 94% of all prisoners were men; 48% were white, and 50%, black.

Nearly two-thirds of sentenced prisoners entering prison in 1995 were new court commitments, and about a third were parole or other conditional release violators. Among persons released from prison in 1995, 76% were placed on probation, parole, or some other type of conditional release.

The number of prisoners rose by 9% during 1995, the equivalent of 88,400 inmates. This brought the total increase in prisoners between 1985 and 1995 to 590,952, which translates to an average growth rate of 8.3% each year.


### Parole

An estimated 700,000 adults were on parole at yearend 1995, an increase of 1.4% from 1994. Nine of every ten parolees were men. An estimated 53% of persons on parole were white; 46%, black; and 1%, of other races.

Half of all entries to parole were based on a parole board decision. Nearly half of all exits from parole were categorized as successful completions. Most of the remainder were returned to incarceration, but only 1 of every 9 parolees were returned to incarceration with a new sentence.

While the parole population increased by only 1% during the year, the average annual rate of increase from 1985 to 1995 was 8.8%, more than that of any other correctional population. The number of adults on parole more than doubled during the 10-year period (from 300,203).

The percentage of prisoners released from prison to supervision in the community has remained relatively unchanged from 1980 (73%) to 1995 (71%). There was a steady decline in the percentage of inmates released by parole boards, down from 55% in 1980 to 32% in 1995. This decrease was offset by dramatic increases in mandatory parole releases (19% in 1980 and 39% in 1995).



### **Capital punishment**

During 1995, 310 inmates were received under sentence of death by State and Federal prisons, and 105 had their death sentences removed by means other than execution. State and Federal prisons held a total of 3,054 prisoners under sentence of death on December 31, 1995.

An estimated 57% of those under sentence of death at yearend were white and 42% were black. Half of the inmates had been under sentence of death for at least 6 years and 9 months.

Sixteen States executed 56 male prisoners during 1995. The total number of prisoners executed under civil authority in the United States from 1977 to 1995 was 313.

### **Military confinement**

On December 31, 1995, the Army, Marine Corps, and Navy held a total of 2,838 prisoners in 28 facilities. The Coast Guard operated no confinement facilities. Data for Air Force confinement facilities were not reported.

About 84% of prisoners held by the Army, Marine Corps, and Navy at yearend 1995 were convicted inmates; 16% were unconvicted persons whose cases had not been tried.

A third of convicted military prisoners were confined for rape (16%) or sexual assault (17%); a fifth were serving a sentence for murder. About 7% were confined for military infractions, such as desertion, AWOL, insubordination, or failure to obey a lawful order.

Approximately 98% of military detainees were men. About 52% were non-Hispanic whites; 36%, non-Hispanic blacks; 8%, Hispanics; and 4% other races. More than 98% of persons confined were enlisted; 1.8% were officers.

### **1995 Census of Correctional Facilities**

Every 5 years the Bureau of Justice Statistics conducts a census of the Nation's

prisons to obtain detailed information on State and Federal prison inmates, staff, facilities, and programs. Previous censuses were conducted in 1974, 1979, 1984, and 1990.

On June 30, 1995, 1,023,572 persons were incarcerated in the Nation's State and Federal correctional facilities, a 43% increase over the 1990 population. Between 1990 and 1995, the number of inmates per 100,000 U.S. residents rose from 263 to 390.

About 94% of all inmates were men. Nearly 36% were white non-Hispanic; 48%, black non-Hispanic; 14%, Hispanic; and 2%, other races.

The number of prisoners under age 18 in State and Federal correctional facilities increased 47% from 3,600 in 1990 to 5,309 in 1995. Five States accounted for 52% of this increase: Florida (804), Connecticut (736), New York (498), North Carolina (457), and Texas (251).

Between July 1, 1994, and June 30, 1995, 3,311 inmates died while in the custody of State and Federal correctional authorities. The leading cause of death was illness and natural causes (excluding AIDS), accounting for 55% of deaths. AIDS-related illnesses were second (34%), followed by suicide (5%), homicide by other inmates (3%), and other causes (3%).

The number of employees in State and Federal correctional facilities grew by nearly a third between 1990 and 1995, from 264,201 to 347,320.

Between 1990 and 1995 the number of inmates increased at an annual rate of 7.4%, while the number of full-time and part-time employees grew at an annual rate of 5.6%. In 1995, custody or security staff comprised 6 of every 10 employees. The number of inmates per custody or security employee was 4.6 inmates in 1995, up from 4.2 in 1990.

The States, District of Columbia, and the Federal Bureau of Prisons operated a total of 1,500 correctional facilities at midyear 1995, including 1,196 confinement institutions and 304 community-based facilities. Confinement institutions held 97% of all inmates.

The South maintained 629 correctional facilities (46% of all State facilities); 3 of the 4 States reporting the largest numbers of institutions were also in the South — Florida (98), North Carolina (93), and Texas (92). California operated the most facilities in 1995—102.

Between midyear 1990 and 1995, Texas recorded the largest growth in the number of State facilities (49 new facilities), followed by Washington (13) and Georgia (11). Nine States — Arizona, Florida, Hawaii, Kansas, Lousiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, North Dakota, and Virginia reported a decline in the number of correctional facilities. The Federal Bureau of Prisons added 32 confinement facilities and 3 community-based facilities during the 5-year period.

At midyear 1995 the rated capacity of the Nation's State correctional facilities totaled 909,908. Rated capacity is the maximum number of beds or inmates allocated by rating officials to each facility. Between 1990 and 1995 more than 259,000 beds were added.

As of June 30, 1995, State correctional facilities were operating at 103% of rated capacity. Between 1990 and 1995 rated capacity increased by 40%, while the number of inmates increased by 43%.

The total number of State and Federal correctional facilities rose by 17% from midyear 1990 to midyear 1995 (from 1,287 to 1,500). During the same period, facilities holding 2,500 inmates or more increased by 108%, and those holding between 1,000 and 2,499 rose 65%. The number of maximum security facilities rose 27%; numbers of medium and minimum security facilities each grew by 14%.

A third of the country's State and Federal correctional housing stock was less than 10 years old in 1995; nearly a quarter was 50 years old or older, including 3% that had been in existence 100 years or longer. The Midwest had the highest percentage of both facilities less than 10 years old (36%) and 100 years old or older (7%).

The primary function of most correctional facilities was housing general adult populations: 63% of State facilities and 86% of Federal facilities. About 19% of State correctional facilities were used as work release or pre-release centers. While 65 correctional facilities operated bootcamps, only 22 reported bootcamps as their primary function.

Among State correctional facilities, 378 were under court order for at least one reason. About 85% of these had been cited for specific conditions; 60% had been ordered to limit population; and 39% had been cited for totality of conditions.

The 112 Federal facilities under court order or consent decree for specific conditions in 1995 resulted from a preliminary injunction arising from a single court case involving the Federal Bureau of Prison's inmate telephone system. One Federal facility was under court order to limit population.

### Important note

Correctional Populations in the United States presents numbers that describe persons under some form of correctional supervision. In this compilation the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) seeks to help users by—

• making readily apparent the links between different correctional institutions or methods in each State

• suggesting the similarities and differences between States and regions as our system of criminal justice responds to both common and disparate needs

• permitting comparisons, however limited they must be, with previous years' statistics.

#### Helping readers find a single number

Through an **index** at the end of the volume, readers can find all topics treated in the tables. The index numbers refer to the tables.

**Footnotes** give extra information about how to interpret the numbers in the tables.

Category definitions are available in three places: the **explanatory notes** in the appendices of sections, the **questionnaires** also in the appendices, and the **definitions of common terms** in the *Introduction* on page 2.

### To make comparisons across years or between jurisdictions

BJS makes every effort to report numbers that are consistent in interpretation with those of the past and between separate jurisdictions in the present. Data collection rules and reporting protocols that fit historical statistics and that impose the least burden on respondents are used.

Some jurisdictions depart from the reporting conventions, and some categories for counting have shifted over the years. Users who try to draw conclusions from such numbers by comparing years or jurisdictions must take into account special circumstances and changes. **Footnotes, table notes, explanatory notes, and other material highlighting the tables** must be consulted for a full understanding of the data.

### Introduction

### History of U.S. corrections statistics

In 1850 the Federal Government, in cooperation with the States as a part of the Seventh Decennial Census, initiated a count of prisoners in 32 States and in the territories of Minnesota, New Mexico, Oregon, and Utah. Between 1850 and 1870, U.S. marshals administered the census of prisoners as part of a special schedule of social statistics. The 1880 report indicated there were 61 prisoners in State institutions per 100,000 residents. By 1890 Nevada had the highest per capita rate among the States, 203, and Wvoming had the lowest, 16. In that same year New York had 136 prisoners per 100,000 residents, and California had 169.

In 1926 the Bureau of the Census began the annual collection of prisoner statistics, and the report for that year described the goal of the effort as the collection of data to "show the application of penal policies for various classes of offenders and in different parts of the country." That first annual report in 1926 provided information by jurisdiction on admissions, releases, sentences and time served, inmates under sentence of death, recidivism, and crowding — issues of major concern today.

In 1950 the corrections program was transferred from the Bureau of the Census to the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) in the Department of Justice and in 1971 to the predecessor of the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the National Criminal Justice Information and Statistics Service of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA). LEAA added the statistical series on local jails (1970), probation (1979), and parole (1976). All the major reporting series and projects of the corrections unit, Bureau of Justice Statistics, are outlined under "Data sources" below. The Bureau of the Census serves as the data collections agency for most of these series. The following chronology sketches the evolution of the statistical reports grouped in this volume.

**1904.** *Prisoners and Juvenile Delinquents, 1904* reported movements rather than individuals. Prison officials served as enumerators.

**1924.** *Prisoners, 1923* presented adults separate from juveniles.

**1926.** Prisoners in State and Federal Prisons and Reformatories began as an annual report that continued until 1946. The report included a special section on prisoners under sentence of death. From 1946 to 1970 the Bureau of Prisons published the annual figures. The LEAA followed for 9 years until BJS was created in 1980. (The Bureau of Census has acted as collecting agent since 1972.)

**1947.** The Bureau of Prisons began the separate annual reports on prisoners under sentence of death. LEAA and then BJS continued the reports until 1984. BJS will continue to publish annual bulletins about the death penalty and persons sentenced to death; the more detailed statistics appear in the corrections volume.

**1965.** The National Council on Crime and Delinquency (NCCD), a nongovernmental organization, started the Uniform Parole Reports project under Federal contract.

**1970.** LEAA conducted its first 1-day count of jails.

**1974.** LEAA, with the Bureau of the Census, surveyed a national random sample of inmates in State prisons. The survey, repeated in 1979, 1986, and 1991, collected information on personal background and criminal history and inquired about drug and alcohol usage.

**1976.** The NCCD and LEAA annual reports covered parole data beginning in 1976.

**1978.** The Bureau of the Census counted prisoners in U.S. jails; Census repeated the complete enumeration in 1983, 1988, and 1993.

**1979.** The first annual report on parole and probation appeared, published by BJS.

**1982.** The Bureau of the Census completed the first annual jail sample survey for BJS. Bulletins containing data from the sample survey are supplemented by the corrections volume

**1983.** The National Prisoner Statistics program on admissions and releases (NPS) and the Uniform Parole Reports (UPR) were combined into one reporting system, the National Corrections Reporting Program (NCRP). Each year NCRP collects individual-level data on persons admitted to prison, released from prison, and released from parole.

**1985.** BJS published the first *Correctional Populations in the United States.* The report consolidated data collected annually from Federal, State, and local correctional agencies. The report contained a chapter highlighting a special collection completed during the year.

### Definitions of common terms used in tables

**Custody.** To have custody of a prisoner, a State must hold that person in one of its facilities. Early statistical reports gave *custody counts* that largely have been replaced by *jurisdiction counts* of State prison populations. A State may have custody of a prisoner over whom another State maintains jurisdiction. The tables present both kinds of counting procedures, with jurisdiction counts being more complete; States reporting only on custody are noted.

**Detention status.** This term distinguishes between prisoners, usually in jail, who were convicted or awaiting judgment.

**Discretionary parole.** A release from prison to supervision is discretionary when it is decided by a board or other authority.

**Hispanic origin.** A person of Hispanic origin may be of any race; however, a few States treat the ethnic category as a racial one. Reporting officials usually rely on self-definition, but some States classify according to surname.

**Jurisdiction.** Jurisdiction refers to a unit of government or to the legal authority to exercise governmental power. According to the latter meaning, the prisoners under a State's *jurisdiction* may be in the custody of local jails. (See "Custody.")

**Mandatory parole.** Mandatory parole results from statutory or correctional guidelines, and no judgment by a panel or board is required for release of a prisoner to supervision outside prison.

**Maximum sentence length.** Some jurisdictions sentence offenders to a range of years; the larger number in that range is the most that a prisoner may serve on a sentence. Often, *good time* is subtracted from the maximum sentence. When the tables report on prisoners with sentences longer or shorter than a year, the *maximum sentence* is used where applicable.

### Military justice terms-

General court-martial is the highest military court for judging the most serious offenses. A military judge presides. This court includes members (jurors) at the election of the accused, except when the court must have members for imposition of the death penalty. If an enlisted person is accused, in the absence of exigent circumstances at least a third of the court must be enlisted members who are not lower ranking than the accused. A general court-martial may be used to try any person subject to the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

Special court-martial is used for judging offenses less serious than those in a general court-martial. A military judge presides. A special court-martial may *not* impose the following: the death penalty, a dishonorable discharge, dismissal of an officer, confinement in excess of 6 months, hard labor without confinement for more than 3 months, forfeiture of pay in excess of twothirds of pay per month, or forfeiture of any percentage of pay for more than 6 months.

Summary court-martial is the least formal military court, consisting of one active-duty commissioned officer. This court promptly adjudicates minor offenses under a simple procedure. Punishment may not exceed confinement for 1 month, hard labor without confinement for 45 days, restriction to specified limits for more than 2 months, or forfeiture of more than two-thirds pay for more than 1 month. If the service member is above the rank of E-4, the presiding officer may not impose confinement, hard labor without confinement, or reduction of more than one grade.

**Movement.** In corrections, a movement is an admission to or a release from a status — prisoner, parolee, or probationer. Unless specifically noted, a transfer between facilities does not count as a movement. **Most serious offense.** The offense with the longest term of incarceration imposed.

**New court commitments.** Inmates who were admitted to prison directly from a court with all new sentences. This category includes probation violators entering prison for the first time on the probated offenses. Parole violators are excluded from this category.

**One-day count.** For a 1-day count a jurisdiction or facility is asked to report how many people were on its roll on a certain day. The *average daily population* is a year's total number of people on the roll each day, divided by the number of days. The methods of counting in aggregate do not yield estimates of either the number of persons in a status during the year or the average amount of time persons remain in a status.

**Race.** Classification by race often depends on the reporting program and the State. A few States reported two categories: white and nonwhite. A few others categorized Hispanic offenders as belonging to "Other race." The number of persons with certain racial backgrounds were sometimes estimated.

**Reporting time.** The prison and capital punishment figures are from December 31, 1995, unless otherwise noted. The Bureau of the Census surveyed jails on June 30, 1995. The bureau conducted the Census of State and Federal Correctional Facilities on June 30, 1995.

**Revisions.** Many States revise the yearend number reported for the previous year. Those revisions are made in the total, not the detail. For example, the number of blacks, whites, and members of other races for 1994 were not changed by a State in 1995 to equal its revised 1994 total.

**NPS-1B.** Advance yearend count of prisoners; emergency releases because of prison crowding; rated, operational, and design capacities of prison facilities.

**NPS-8A.** Yearend count of persons in prison under sentence of death.

**NPS-8B,8C.** Complete survey of States to determine any significant changes in statues or case law relating to the death penalty.

**CJ-8.** Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on probation by jurisdiction.

**CJ-7.** Yearend count, admissions, and releases of persons on parole by jurisdiction.

**CJ-5.** Annual survey to estimate the population and rated capacity of jails.

**CJ-43.** Census every 5 years of all State and Federal prison facilities to record their characteristics.

**CJ-3.** Census every 5 years of all jail facilities to record their characteristics.

### Series based on reported individual offenders

**NPS-8.** Characteristics of persons admitted to, under, or released from a sentence of death during the year.

**NCRP-1A.** Individual record data on each offender admitted to prison during the year, covering race, age, Hispanic origin, jail credits, prior prison credit, offenses and number of counts, and maximum and minimum sentence.

**NCRP-1B.** Individual record data on each offender released from prison during the year, covering data from NCRP-1A, offenses and sentences since admission, time spent in halfway houses, time served, and category of discharge.

**NCRP-1C.** Individual record data on each offender discharged from parole supervision, covering data contained in NCRP-1A and NCRP-1B, parole discharge, and category of discharge.

### Series based on interviews of sampled prisoners

**SIJ-43.** Survey every 5 years of a random sample of jail inmates to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.

**NPS-25.** Survey every 5 years of a random sample of prison inmates to determine criminal history, drug and alcohol use, and personal background.



### **Explanatory notes**

The offense distributions of State prisoners at yearend are estimated for 1985 and 1990-95. Inmate surveys, conducted in March 1986 and August 1991, provide estimates for the custody populations at yearend 1985 and 1991. When combined with counts by offense of annual admissions and releases, these surveys provide the basis for estimating the offense distributions of the other years.

The offense distributions were estimated using the following forward and backward stock-flow procedures:

1. To obtain a base population for each survey year, survey estimates were applied to counts of the total sentenced jurisdictional populations for the survey year. The 1986 survey provided estimates for yearend 1985, and the 1991 survey for yearend 1991.

2. To obtain flow populations for each year, the offense distributions of admissions and releases (in percents) were drawn from annual reports of the National Corrections Reporting Program (1985-95). These percents were then multiplied by the total number of admissions and releases of sentenced prisoners to obtain an estimate of the number of admissions and releases by type of offense for each year.

3. Forward estimates of the number of inmates at yearend in nonsurvey years were estimated iteratively by adding admissions and subtracting releases from the base populations. The estimated end of year distribution was then used as the base population for the next year. The process was then repeated until the subsequent survey year was reached. Data from the 1986 survey were used for forward estimates for 1986-90, and data from the 1991 survey, for 1992-95.

4. Backward estimates were obtained iteratively by adding releases and subtracting admissions from the yearend base population. The estimated distribution was then used as the base population for the preceding year. This process was repeated until the previous survey year was reached. Data from the 1991 survey were used to estimate data for 1990 back to 1986.

5. Final estimates were obtained by calculating a weighted sum of the forward and backward estimates. The forward and backward estimates were weighted inversely to the elapsed number of years from the base population and then summed. Forward weights were reduced by one-sixth for each year after the base survey year, and backward weights were reduced by one-sixth for each year preceding the base survey year. The final estimates were then converted to proportions.

6. Because the 1986 and 1991 survey estimates were based on custody counts, the final estimates (which were based on the sentenced jurisdictional counts) were then converted to custody counts. To estimate the number of inmates by offense, the total number of inmates in physical custody was multiplied by the proportion of inmates in each offense category.

### **Technical note**

To estimate the total correctional populations in tables 1.1-1.4, the four correctional populations are assumed to contain individuals with only one status at a time. This assumption may not be valid. Multiple correctional statuses may occur because —

- probation and parole agencies are not always notified of new arrests, jail entries, or prison admissions;
- absconders on agency caseloads in one jurisdiction may actually be incarcerated in another jurisdiction;
- individuals may be admitted to jail or prison before formal revocation hearings by a probation or parole agency.

By adding the number of persons on probation, on parole, in jail, and in prison, we may count some persons more than once; consequently, the sum will be an overestimate of the total number of persons under correctional supervision at any one time. The magnitude of the overestimation is not known; however, data collected in previous BJS surveys of prison and jail inmates indicate that the number of inmates doublecounted may be small relative to the total population under correctional supervision.

Results from the 1989 Survey of Inmates of Local Jails indicated that 28% of the jail inmates were on probation and 10% were on parole at the time of admission. Results from the 1991 Survey of Inmates in State Correctional Facilities indicated 23% of the State prisoners on probation and 22% on parole when entering prison.

If the survey results are applied to the total jail and prison populations in 1995, and if all of these inmates are assumed to have been doublecounted, then the total number of doublecounted inmates would be 635,000, or about 11.8% of the estimated correctional population. This is an extreme assumption.

Somewhat lower estimates are generated if it is assumed that the survey figures should be applied only to those jail inmates who are unconvicted and to prisoners who are technical violators of parole or probation supervision. Under this assumption, the doublecount would be an estimated 215,000 inmates, or 4% of the total correctional population. Doublecounting may also include an unknown, but relatively small, number of persons on both probation and parole.



### Methodology

### Annual Survey of Jails

In each of the 4 years between the full censuses, a survey of jails is conducted to estimate baseline characteristics of the Nation's jails and the inmates housed in these jails. The 1995 Annual Survey of Jails is the 11th such survey in a series begun in 1982. The reference date for the 1994 survey was June 30, 1995.

Using information from the 1993 Census of Jails, a new sample of jail jurisdictions was selected for the 1994 survey. A *jurisdiction* is a county (parish in Louisiana) or municipal government that administers one or more local jails. The sample included all jails in 796 selected jail jurisdictions and 23 multijurisdiction jails. A *multijurisdiction jail* is one in which two or more jurisdictions have a formal agreement to operate the facility.

In the drawing of the sample for 1994 and 1995, jail jurisdictions were first stratified into two groups: single-jurisdiction jails and multijurisdiction jails. All of the multijurisdiction jails were included in the survey. The

remaining jurisdictions were then further stratified into two groups: jurisdictions with jails authorized to hold juveniles and jurisdictions with jails holding adults only. Jurisdictions were then selected based on the average daily population in the 1993 census. All jails in 203 jurisdictions were automatically included if the jurisdiction held juveniles and had an average daily population of 250 or more inmates in 1993 or if it held only adults and had an average population of 500 or more. The other jurisdictions (593) were then selected based on stratified probability sampling. ata were obtained by mailed questionnaires. After followup phone calls to nonrespondents, the response rate for the survey was 100%.

National estimates for the inmate population on June 30, 1995, were produced by sex, race/Hispanic origin, and age group and for the average daily population during the year ending June 30, 1995. National estimates were also produced for rated capacity.

### Sampling error

Survey estimates have an associated sampling error because jurisdictions with smaller average daily populations were sampled for the survey. Estimates based on the sample survey may differ somewhat from the results of conducting a complete census. Different samples could yield somewhat different results. Standard error is a measure of the variation among the estimates from all possible samples, stating the precision with which an estimate from a particular sample approximates the average of all possible samples. The estimated relative sampling error for the total inmate population of 507,044 on June 30, 1994, was 0.58%. (See tables 2.9 and 2.10.)

### Measures of population

Two measures of inmate population are used: the average daily population for the year ending June 30 and the inmate count on June 30 of each year. The average daily population balances out any extraordinary events that may render atypical the inmate count on June 30. The June 30 count provides data on characteristics of inmates, such as race, Hispanic origin, and age, that may not be available on an annual basis.

For the first time in 1995 the Annual Survey of Jails obtained separate counts of the total number of offenders under jail jurisdiction, those held in jail facilities, and those supervised outside of jail facilities. Previous surveys and censuses included a small but unknown number of offenders under community supervision.

To estimate the percent change from 1994 to 1995 in the jail population, the 1995 survey included a count of inmates held at midyear 1994. Based on the 1995 survey results, the 1994 survey total (490,442) included an estimated 3,968 persons under community supervision.

### Juveniles

State statutes and judicial practices allow juveniles to be incarcerated in adult jails under a variety of circumstances. Because of the differing statutes and practices, however, accurate and comparable data on juveniles are difficult to collect. Beginning in 1994 the Annual Jail Survey provided estimates of the total number of jail inmates under age 18, the number held as adults, and the number held as juveniles. New sampling procedures were also introduced in 1994 to minimize the standard errors of these estimates. By stratifying jurisdictions based on the authority to house juveniles, the precision of the juvenile counts was improved

#### **District of Columbia**

West Virginia has 2 reporting agencies: 1 State and 1 interstate compact agency. Interstate compact cases represent 3% of West Virginia's December 31, 1995, total. As reported, the interstate compact data are for year beginning July 1, 1994, and ending June 30, 1995.

No detailed data are provided.

The State's January 1 and December 31 populations are estimated (table 3.2).

The State's entries and exits are unknown (table 3.2, 3.5, 3.6).

#### Wisconsin

Detailed data are not provided for probation status (table 3.3).

"Active," "Absconder," and "Other" include 1,452 probationers who are supervised out-of-State (table 3.3).

"Probation with incarceration" include an unknown number of persons who entered probation by "probation without incarceration" (table 3.5).

"Incarcerated — with new sentence" include an unknown number of persons who are released from probation because they are "Incarcerated — under current sentence" (table 3.6).

Intensive supervision and electronic monitoring program numbers include both probationers and parolees (table 3.10).

#### Wyoming

"Other" types of status of probation include reduction of sentence (table 3.3).

"Other" exits include 409 bench warrants (table 3.6).

"Other" race includes 261 Hispanic probationers of unknown race (table 3.8).

The State reported having an electronic monitoring program, but is unable to provide the number of probationers in the program (table 3.10).

#### **Explanatory notes**

The 1995 Census of State and Federal Adult Correctional Facilities was the fifth enumeration of State institutions and the second of Federal institutions sponsored by the Bureau of Justice Statistics. Earlier censuses were completed in 1974, 1979, 1984, and 1990.

The facility universe was developed from the Census of State and Federal Adult Correctional Facilities conducted in 1990. Each department of corrections was contacted to identify new facilities and facilities that had been closed since June 30, 1990. Telephone follow-ups with data providers were carried out in the fall of 1995 and resulted in a final response rate of 100%.

Facilities were included in the census if they were staffed with Federal, State, local, or private employees; housed primarily State or Federal prisoners; were physically, functionally, and administratively separate from other facilities; and were operational on June 30, 1995. The census also included 110 private facilities under exclusive contract to State governments or to the Federal Bureau of Prisons to house prisoners. The Census included the following types of State and Federal adult correctional facilities: prisons; prison farms; reception, diagnostic and classification centers; road camps; forestry and conservation camps; youthful offender facilities (except in California); vocational training facilities; drug and alcohol treatment facilities; and Stateoperated local detention facilities in Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

Specifically excluded from the census were privately operated facilities that were not exclusively for State or Federal inmates; military facilities; Immigration and Naturalization Service facilities; Bureau of Indian Affairs facilities; facilities operated and administered by local government, including those housing State prisons; facilities operated by the U.S. Marshals Service; and hospital wings and wards reserved for State prisoners. Correctional facilities were classified as community-based if 50% or more of the residents were regularly permitted to leave, unaccompanied, to work or study. These facilities included halfway houses, restitution centers, and prerelease, work release, and study release centers. Correctional facilities in which less than 50% of the inmates regularly left the facility unaccompanied were classified as confinement institutions.

Because the census was a complete enumeration, the results were not subject to sampling error.

Other releases, unconditional and conditional: Court-ordered releases.

Other releases: Includes extraditions to Federal jurisdiction.

Other race: Alaska's "Hispanic" race category.

# Arizona

Population, admissions and releases: Based on custody data.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Includes supervised early releases, provisional releases, supervised work furloughs, earned credit releases, and releases to the home arrest program.

Cause of death: Pending investigation at time of data collection.

Other releases: Includes early releases to detainer, persons returned to prison pending revocation hearing where no revocation occurred, and persons who were returned to supervision.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 322 men housed in local jails solely to ease prison crowding.

# Arkansas

Arkansas revised its December 31, 1994, jurisdiction counts.

Other admissions: Returns from the Department of Community Punishment, a separate agency.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Persons released under the provisions of Arkansas' Acts 378 and 814 and Boot Camp to some form of supervision.

Jurisdiction population, inmates with a year or less sentence: Includes 345 men being held in the county jail awaiting transfer to the Department of Corrections for whom the sentence is unknown.

Custody population, inmates with a year or less sentence: Includes 387 men being held in the county jail awaiting transfer to Department of Corrections for whom the sentence is unknown. Other race: Includes Cuban inmates.

#### California

California revised December 31, 1995, data to include jurisdiction counts. State previously reported only custody counts.

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: May include some parole violators and returns from supervised mandatory releases with new sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: May include some parole violators without new sentences and some supervised mandatory or parole releases returned pending a revocation hearing.

Other admissions: Returns from appeal/bond reported in "Other admissions" category.

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: Includes some court-ordered releases.

Jurisdiction population, unsentenced inmates: Includes civil narcotic addict commitments and county diagnostic cases.

Other race and not known Hispanic origin: Includes some Asian, Pacific Islander, and Hispanic inmates admitted to California prisons prior to January 1990 (when these categories were added to the California computer system). Also includes the California "Hispanic/Mexican" category.

#### Colorado

Sentencing information: Reported populations with sentences of more than 1 year include a small number of inmates with a maximum sentence of 1 year or less.

Transfers from other jurisdictions: Includes admissions of inmates through interstate compacts.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Numbers are estimates.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases not classified as conditional or unconditional.

State inmates housed in other facilities to ease overcrowding: Includes 325 men housed in a facility owned and operated by the County of Bent; and 219 men and 5 women housed in county correctional facilities.

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers are estimates.

#### Connecticut

Connecticut revised its December 31, 1994, jurisdiction population counts.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered discharges and inadvertent releases (release coding errors).

Other conditional releases: Release to home jurisdiction, community releases, and an undetermined number of unknown release types.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system.

Other race: The Connecticut "Hispanic" category.

#### Delaware

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Prisoners with partially suspended sentences (part served in prison, part served under probation) are included with the "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" only when the prison portion of the sentence exceeded 12 months. As a result, the population and movement counts of "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" are understated, and the counts of "Inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentence" are overstated.

Parole and other conditional release violators with new sentences: Includes violators with and without new sentences.

Other admissions and releases: Includes admissions from and releases to State and local hospitals, inmates serving weekend sentences, and inmates who were changed from jail sentences of less than 1 year to prison sentences of more than a year.

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: Includes some releases to probation.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system.

Other race: Includes Puerto Rican and Mexican prisoners.

#### **District of Columbia**

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Prisoners with partially suspended sentences (part served in prison, part served under probation) are included with the "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" only when the prison portion of the sentence exceeded 12 months. As a result, the population and movement counts of "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" are understated, and the counts of "Inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentence" are overstated.

Sentencing information, short sentences: An undetermined number of inmates housed in neither the District of Columbia jail nor the Detention Center and having either no sentence or a minimum sentence of 1 year or less are included in the movement and population counts of inmates with more than 1 year maximum sentences. As a result, the population and movement counts of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year are overstated, and the counts of inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentence are understated.

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Includes transfers from and to mental hospitals and other State and Federal facilities.

Number of deaths: All deaths are reported under "males." As a result, total male releases are sightly over counted and female releases are slightly undercounted.

Cause of death: Unknown at time of data collection.

Total jurisdiction population: Includes male and female DC code violators housed in Federal Bureau of Prisons facilities and male inmates housed in other State facilities. Of these inmates, an undetermined number are being housed solely to ease prison overcrowding.

Unsentenced inmate populations: Jurisdiction and custody counts include unsentenced inmates held in the District jail or Detention Center.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in the District of Columbia.

#### Florida

Population, admissions, and releases counts: Based on custody data.

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: Includes violators of control releases, provisional releases, Other conditional release violators without new sentences: Includes violators of control releases, provisional releases, conditional releases, and supervised community releases with new sentences.

Transfers from other jurisdictions: Includes admissions through interstate compact agreements with and without new sentences.

Other admissions: Contains the net difference between total admissions and the release movements not classified in other categories.

Other unconditional releases: Includes vacated sentences and control releases without supervision.

Other conditional releases: Includes control releases with supervision, conditional medical releases, conditional releases, supervised community releases, and reinstatement to control releases.

Transfers to other jurisdictions: Includes interstate transfers (inmates who have been sentenced under Florida's jurisdiction but serve their sentence in another State or Federal prison).

# Georgia

Population, admissions, and releases: Based on custody data.

Parole violators with new sentences: May include a small number of other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Includes one inmate who paid a fine.

Other conditional releases: Consists of special and supervised reprieves controlled by the Georgia Parole Board.

Cause of death: Unknown.

Jurisdiction population: Excludes inmates awaiting pick-up from local jails.

Other race: Includes inmates who identify racial categories other than those specified.

# Hawaii

Category estimates: Jurisdiction and custody counts are actual counts. Admissions, releases, race, and Hispanic origin are estimated based on information from Hawaii's Correctional Information System (CIS).

Other unconditional releases: Administrative discharges and emergency releases.

Other conditional releases: Type of release unknown at the time of data collection.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Hawaii.

Other race: Includes "Puerto Ricans," prisoners of "Other Hispanic" origin, and "Other" race categories (inmates who identified more than one racial group). Prisoners of part-Hawaiian ancestry are counted as "Asians/Pacific Islanders."

Hispanic origin: The Hawaii "Puerto Rican" category and individuals of the Hawaii "Other" race category with Spanish surnames.

# Idaho

Parole violators with new sentences: Count unavailable by gender.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Adjustment residuals to balance the movement data not reported in other categories with the December 31, 1995, population.

Race and Hispanic origin: Numbers are estimates.

# Illinois

Population, admissions, and releases: Based on custody data.

Sentencing information: Inmates with sentences of more than 1 year include some inmates with maximum sentences of 1 year.

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: Includes some parole violators with new sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Includes some parole violators without new sentences.

Escapees: Illinois now reports the movement of escapees by using the Offender Tracking System. All inmates in Community Correctional Centers and Electronic Detention Centers are now included in the counts, which in part accounts for the increase in the number of escapes and returns from escape.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Cause of death: Unknown at time of data collection.

Other admissions and releases: Contains the net difference between long-term admissions and release movements not reported in other categories (transfers, writs, and medical furloughs) to balance the December 31 population. The category also includes an undetermined number of transfers to other jurisdictions.

Other race: The Illinois "Hispanic" category.

# Indiana

New court commitments: Includes probation violators with and without new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: Sentences terminated based on Parole Board decisions.

#### lowa

Population, admissions, and releases: Based on custody data.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Includes parolees remanded to prison prior to a formal revocation hearing.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Conditional releases, paroles: Includes persons returned to parole following revocation hearings and persons released to parole by Conditional Commutation Orders.

Other admissions and releases: Inmates held for safekeeping.

Other conditional releases: Releases to work release programs.

Other race: The Iowa "Hispanic" category.

# Kansas

New court commitments: May include some returns from appeal/bond and a small number of probation violators, both with and without new sentences, who may have previously spent time in prison.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Type unknown at time of data collection.

Other conditional releases: Conditional releases to supervision, similar to that for parole.

Executions: Kansas legalized capital punishment in 1995. Therefore, "Executions" is no longer reported as "Not applicable."

Cause of death: Unknown.

#### Kentucky

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Court-ordered returns to prison.

Other releases: Includes court-ordered releases not identifiable as conditional or unconditional.

Other race: Includes inmates whose race cannot be classified in the specified categories.

#### Louisiana

Population, admissions, and releases: Movement and population counts are now based on jurisdiction data. Louisiana previously reported only custody data.

Sentencing information: Jurisdiction and custody counts of inmates with a maximum sentence of more than 1 year and with 1 year or less maximum sentence are not comparable to 1992 and previously reported data. Prior to 1993, reported inmates with 1 year or less sentences were actually parole revocations with remaining sentences equal to 1 year or less. The original sentences for these persons were greater than 1 year, but when they returned from parole the remaining time on their sentences had decreased to 1 year or less. Since persons with sentences of 1 year or less are not sentenced to Louisiana prisons, all inmates are now reported as having a maximum sentence greater than or equal to 1 year.

Cause of death: Can specify only for executions.

Other releases: Includes inmates released in error.

Total custody population: Louisiana revised its December 31, 1994, custody counts.

American Indians or Alaska Natives: American Indians only.

Asian or Pacific Islanders: Chinese and Japanese only.

Other race: Includes Latins and all other persons whose race is unspecified.

Hispanic origin: Not included in the Louisiana data system.

#### Maine

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: Probation violators with new sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Probation violators with no new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Inmates released directly from prison to the community.

Other releases: Releases to detainer or warrants and inmates whose release requires victim notifications.

#### Maryland

Category estimates: The movement and population totals are actual counts. Categories for admissions and releases are estimated by applying percentages from automated data to the totals that are made manually. The automated data system counts only inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year, while the detailed categories in the manual data include inmates with maximum sentences of 1 year or less.

New court commitments: May include a small number of returns from appeal/bond.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Interstate compact admissions.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases. May also include a small number of releases to appeal/bond.

Other conditional releases: Inmates paroled from the Patuxent Institution to work release.

Other releases: Includes 7 to 10 interstate compact releases as well as releases of new admissions that had been double counted with admissions data.

# Massachusetts

Massachusetts revised its 1994 population counts.

Population, admissions, and releases: Movement and population counts are based on jurisdiction and custody data. These figures include all inmates in Massachusetts custody, including a limited number of county, Federal and other States' inmates under jurisdiction of another authority, as well as Massachusetts inmates housed in other States.

Total inmate population: Excludes 662 men housed in local facilities and 393 men held in Federal and other State facilities solely to ease prison crowding. Also includes 1,275 men housed in local, State and Federal facilities not due to prison crowding.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Includes some parole violators with new sentences, other conditional release violators with and without new sentences, and a small number of returns from appeal/ bond.

Category estimates: The totals for admissions and releases are actual; the categories are estimates. Unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: Includes some releases to probation.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases and a small number of releases to appeal/bond.

Other race: Includes Hispanic inmates whose race is not specified; also includes 1,275 men housed in local, State, or Federal facilities not due to prison crowding, but excludes 662 men housed in local facilities and 393 men held in Federal and other State facilities solely to ease prison crowding.

Unknown ethnicity: Includes 1,275 men housed in local, State, and Federal facilities, not due specifically to prison crowding, but excludes 662 men housed in local facilities and 393 men held in Federal and other State facilities solely to ease prison crowding.

#### Michigan

Michigan revised its December 31, 1994, jurisdiction population counts because of procedural improvements in tracking and reporting.

Population, admissions, and releases: Based on custody data.

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Transfers from and to mental hospitals and facilities of the Federal Government and other States.

Escapes: Consists mainly of zero tolerance walkaways from community residential programs.

Other admissions: Returns from county jail and from parole status.

Returns from and releases to appeal/bond: Contains the net difference of all movements from and to the courts.

Cause of death, illnesses/natural causes: Includes unspecified type of deaths, including deaths resulting from AIDS- or HIV-related diseases. Other releases: Includes inmates temporarily housed at a county jail and returns to parole status.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 393 men housed in local jails solely to ease overcrowding.

Population housed in jails: All inmates are reported as males.

Other race: Includes Mexican Americans and all other persons whose race is unspecified.

Hispanic origin: Mexican Americans only.

#### Minnesota

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: Includes supervised mandatory release violators and work release violators with new sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Includes supervised mandatory release violators and work release violators with no new sentences.

Transfers, escapees, AWOL prisoners, and admissions/returns from appeal/bond: Categories are not considered releases and are not valid in the Minnesota data system.

Other unconditional releases: Includes inmates discharged by court or executive orders. May include some commutations and overturned convictions.

Other conditional releases: Work releases and intensive community supervision.

Asian/Pacific Islanders: Includes persons with Asian surnames.

Other race: Includes 240 Hispanic males and 10 Hispanic females because Minnesota classifies "Hispanic" as a race. Also includes 21 males reported in the Minnesota "Other" race category.

#### Mississippi

New court commitments: Includes some probation violators with and without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Includes 33 men and 3 women awaiting revocation hearing and returns from appeal/bond, as well as 160 men and 28 women whose admission category was unavailable at the time of data collection.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other releases: Inmates returned to community supervision following a revocation hearing where no revocation occurred. Also includes releases to appeal/bond.

Race: Numbers are estimates.

Other race: The Mississippi "Hispanic" category.

#### Missouri

AWOL returns, with and without new sentences: Include some returns of walkaways from community release centers previously included in escape returns, with or without new sentences.

Other admissions: Includes inmates returned from erroneous releases, persons whose commitment was reinstated, and parole board holdovers (offenders arrested by local authorities and returned to prison, instead of to the local jail as customary).

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Conditional release to custody/detainer, administrative parole, and credit time releases.

Causes of death: Unknown.

AWOL from confinement: Walkaways from community release centers

residential treatment facilities, previously included in escapes from confinement.

Other releases: Erroneous releases.

# Montana

Population, movement and releases: Numbers are estimates based on fiscal year data (July 1, 1994, to June 30, 1995.)

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Escapees/AWOL releases/admissions: Montana does not track escapees and AWOL prisoners as admissions and releases.

Jurisdiction and custody population: Includes some inmates from other jurisdictions whom Montana housed.

Race, white: The Montana "Hispanic" category.

# Nebraska

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Includes some parole violators with new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: Includes sentences vacated by the court. A court action reversed or overturned the sentences or dismissed the charges.

Race and ethnicity: Numbers are estimates.

# Nevada

Total admissions and releases: May include some inmates with a 1 year sentence.

New court commitments: May include a very small number of returns from appeal/bond.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Includes some parole violators with and without new sentences. Transfers from other jurisdictions: These inmates are considered part of Nevada's out-count and are not counted as admissions.

Other admissions: Includes Nevada's "not physically received" inmates who are serving concurrent sentences elsewhere. Inmates are counted as admissions when Nevada begins to monitor their sentences and includes them in their out-count population.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Race: Numbers are estimates.

Other race: Includes persons of Hispanic and Cuban origin and all other persons whose race is unspecified.

# **New Hampshire**

Jurisdiction counts: In 1995 New Hampshire began reporting computer generated counts. Therefore, the January 1, 1995, population counts differ from the December 31, 1994.

New court commitments: Includes some returns from appeal/bond. May also include some other conditional release violators with and without new sentences.

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Includes parole violators with a new sentence.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases with no supervision.

Other releases: Court-ordered releases not identifiable as unconditional or conditional.

# New Jersey

Sentencing information: Inmates with sentences of more than 1 year include some inmates with a sentence equal to 1 year.

New court commitments: May include some transfers from other jurisdictions and returns from appeal/bond.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Prisoners returned (some with new sentences) from the Intensive Supervision Program, an experimental program operated by the Administrative Office of Courts.

Other conditional releases: Prisoners released to the Intensive Supervision Program.

Causes of death: Unknown at time of data collection.

Other race: "Hispanic" inmates who are not classified as "White" or "Black."

Unknown race/ethnicity: Inmates for whom the racial category was unspecified.

#### New Mexico

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Includes parole violators with and without additional sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Includes violators both with and without new sentences. Also includes returns from community corrections programs.

Other conditional releases: Releases to community corrections programs.

Cause of death: Can specify only executions.

#### **New York**

New court commitments: Includes parole and other conditional release violators with new sentences.

Transfers from other jurisdictions: Includes 520 men and 49 women previously under the jurisdiction of the Department of Mental Hygiene for psychiatric treatment.

Other admissions: Includes 26 men returned from conditional parole deportation to the custody of the U.S. Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization Services, as well as 23 men and 2 woman returned following erroneous release. Causes of death: Unknown at time of data I collection.

Transfers to other jurisdictions: Includes 580 men and 50 women transferred to the jurisdiction of the Department of Mental Hygiene for psychiatric treatment.

Other releases: Include erroneous releases of 6 men and 9 women.

#### North Carolina

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Prisoners with partially suspended sentences (part served in prison, part served under probation) are included with the "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" only when the prison portion of the sentence exceeded 12 months. As a result, the population and movement counts of "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" are understated, and the counts of "Inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentence" are overstated.

Category estimates, sentencing: Population totals are actual; populations by sentence length are estimates.

Parole violators with new sentences: Includes some parole violators without new sentences and some conditional release violators with and without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions: Consists of an adjustment residual to balance movement data with the December 31 population.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other conditional releases: Includes some supervised mandatory releases.

Hispanic origin: Not included in the North Carolina data system.

#### North Dakota

Parole violators only, no new sentences: Includes some parole violators with new sentences.

Other conditional release violators only, no new sentences: Includes some conditional release violators with new sentences.

Other conditional releases: Court-ordered releases.

# Ohio

Sentencing information: Inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year include some inmates with sentences of 1 year or less.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: All unauthorized absences are classified as escapes.

Other unconditional releases: Sentences vacated by courts.

Other conditional releases: Furloughs and other conditional releases.

#### Oklahoma

Sentencing information: Inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year includes some inmates with sentences of 1 year or less.

New court commitments: Includes some conditional release violators with and without new sentences.

Other unconditional releases: Legislative CAP releases (Senate Bill 445).

Other conditional releases: Conditional commutations and CAP releases to probation supervision.

Other deaths: Includes one death under investigation.

Total jurisdiction population: Excludes 257 men and 34 women housed in local jails solely to ease prison crowding.

Other race: Includes "Other" races not specified.

Unknown race: Includes Hispanic inmates.

#### Oregon

Transfers from and to other jurisdictions: Oregon cannot distinguish transfers from other admissions or release categories. Transfers may be included in any admissions or release category.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: All unauthorized absences are classified as escapes.

Other admissions: Type of admission unknown at time of data collection.

Other unconditional releases: Type of unconditional release unknown at time of data collection.

#### Pennsylvania

Other admissions: Type of admissions unknown at time of data collection.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other deaths: Includes deaths still under investigation.

Escapee and AWOL prisoners: Excludes prisoners who absconded while residents of community-based facilities.

Other race: The Pennsylvania "Hispanic" category.

#### Rhode Island

Rhode Island revised its December 31, 1994, jurisdiction population because 2 persons serving sentences out-of-State were incorrectly reported as male instead of female.

Rhode Island revised its December 31, 1994, custody population by moving 2 men originally reported in the unsentenced category to the sentenced to more than 1 year category.

Sentencing information, partially suspended sentences: Prisoners with partially suspended sentences (part served in prison, part served under probation) are included with the "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" only when the prison portion of the sentence exceeded 12 months. As a result, the population and movement counts of "Inmates with over 1 year maximum sentence" are understated, and the counts of "Inmates with 1 year or less maximum sentence" are overstated.

Other admissions: Returns from erroneous release.

Other conditional releases: Court-ordered releases to drug/alcohol treatment programs.

Other deaths: Death from a drug overdose.

Other releases: An erroneous discharge.

Jurisdiction and custody population, unsentenced inmates: Includes 5 men held on civil contempt of court for nonpayment of child support.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Rhode Island.

#### South Carolina

Other admissions and releases: Includes resentenced inmates.

Other unconditional releases: Releases by court-order and remanded to the county jail to await retrial.

Other conditional releases: Inmates released to the jurisdiction of the Department of Parole, Probation, and Pardon Services under the Emergency Powers Act.

Illnesses/natural causes deaths: Includes some deaths caused by AIDS. South Carolina does not distinguish deaths caused by illnesses/natural causes and those related to HIV infection.

#### South Dakota

Unconditional releases, expirations of sentences: Includes commutations.

Transfers to other jurisdictions: Transfers to Federal or other State facilities.

Race: Numbers are estimates.

#### Tennessee

Sentencing information: Inmates with maximum sentences of 1 year are included with inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year. As a result, the population and movement counts of inmates with maximum sentences of more than 1 year are overstated.

Parole violators with new sentences: May include some parole violators with no new sentences.

Other conditional release violators with new sentences: Includes some probation and community correction program violators with no new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Conditional releases, paroles: May include a small number of supervised mandatory releases.

Other conditional releases: Releases to community correction programs.

Total jurisdiction population: Includes 1,843 men and 214 women housed in local facilities solely to ease prison crowding. Excludes 3,263 felons sentenced to serve their time in local facilities.

Other race: Includes Hispanic inmates.

# Texas

Jurisdiction population, sentencing information: Includes 3,812 men and 605 women with maximum sentences of 1 year or less who cannot be removed from the appropriate admissions and release categories.

Admissions and releases: Numbers are estimates.

Parole violators with and without new sentences: The Texas data system does not distinguish parole violators with new sentences from those without new sentences.

Other conditional release violators with and without new sentences: The Texas data system does not distinguish other conditional release violators with new sentences from those without new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other admissions and releases: Include "State jail" felons not counted in other admission and release categories.

Race and ethnicity: Numbers are estimates.

Other deaths: Cause unknown.

Other race: Includes the Texas "Hispanic" category and all persons not specified as "White" or "Black."

# Utah

Other unconditional releases: Inmates whose sentences were terminated prior to expiration.

State prison crowding: Includes some inmates housed in Texas county jails on contract.

#### Vermont

Parole violators with and without new sentences: May include other conditional release violators with or without new sentences.

AWOL: May include some returns from appeal/bond.

Total inmate population: Jurisdiction and custody counts include inmates in prisons and jails, which form an integrated system in Vermont. Excludes 317 inmates on intermediate sanctions.

Race: Numbers are estimates.

#### Virginia

Virginia provided counts as of January 1, 1996.

Other unconditional releases: Administrative releases and some commutations.

Conditional releases, supervised mandatory releases and paroles: Releases to detainer and transfers to other jurisdictions.

Other releases: Inmates released to appeal/bond and other administrative releases.

Other race: Includes persons of Hispanic origin and all other persons whose race is unspecified.

#### Washington

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other unconditional releases: Vacated sentences.

Total population, jurisdiction and custody: Most inmates with a maximum sentence of 1 year or less are housed in county jails.

Other race: Inmates of mixed racial origin.

#### West Virginia

West Virginia revised its December 31, 1994, jurisdiction count.

Jurisdiction population, unsentenced: Includes unsentenced inmates who were previously included in inmates with more than 1 year maximum sentence.

#### Wisconsin

Admissions and releases counts: An undetermined number of admissions and releases are not reported; therefore, when admissions are added to the January 1 population and releases are subtracted, the total does not equal the December 31 population.

Other admissions: Includes 893 men and 116 women temporarily returned to prison without a formal revocation; 79 men and 5 women returned pending revocation hearings; 4 men with no Wisconsin sentence; 11 male sex offenders held under Wisconsin's predator law; and 6 men and 1 woman erroneously admitted.

Other unconditional releases: Courtordered releases.

Other releases: Includes 645 men and 82 women returned to the community after being held without formal revocations; 2 men with no Wisconsin sentence; 11 men and 3 women who were held pending revocation hearing; 8 men and 1 woman erroneously admitted, and 8 men released by court- order.

Unsentenced inmates, jurisdiction and custody counts: Include inmates whose sentences was unknown at time of data collection.

#### Wyoming

New court commitments and unconditional releases, expirations of sentence: May include a small number of administrative turnovers (starts and expirations of consecutive sentences).

Parole violators only, no new sentence: Include some parole violators with new sentences.

Escapees and AWOL prisoners: Counted as a single category.

Other race: The Wyoming "Hispanic" category.

# Federal

The decrease in persons under supervision in 1995 resulted from a review of the parole statistical database, which identified and closed case records that had been coded incorrectly.

Entries do not include reinstatements and inactive parole cases (table 6.4).

Detailed data are not provided for Hispanic origin (table 6.6).

Of the 2,513 parolees on post-conviction home confinement, approximately 70% are electronically monitored; the remainder are monitored by other means.

#### Alabama

Alabama has two reporting agencies: one State and one local.

All data are estimated.

Detailed data are not provided for exits, Hispanic origin, and sentence length. In addition the State did not provide detailed data about sex and race.

Data exclude absconders and out-of-State cases.

The State reported operating intensive supervision and electronic monitoring programs but being unable to report the number of parolees in these programs (table 6.9).

# Alaska

Data are estimated for total entries and the December 31, 1995, population.

#### Arizona

"Other" entries include Arizona parolees who are supervised out of State through an interstate compact agreement.

#### Arkansas

All data are estimated.

Other entries include 185 parolees returned from out of State, 84 reactivated from detainer, 19 absconders in custody out of State, 481 in custody in State, and 262 transfers (table 6.4).

"Returned to incarceration — with revocation" includes parolees returned to incarceration because of technical violations; "returned to incarceration — other" includes parolees returned to incarceration with revocation because of commission of a felony; "other" exits include 153 detainers, 1 incarceration out of State, 21 outof-State parole terminations, 2 terminated court orders, 568 absconders, and 310 absconders of parolees supervised out of State.

"Returned to incarceration — other" includes an unspecified number of parolees who are released because they are "returned to incarceration — with revocation;" "other" exits include 125 California Youth Authority parolees who were released from supervision with a court action pending, absent without leave at discharge, or at the end of CYA's jurisdiction (table 6.5). "Other" races include 35,838 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (6.7).

### Colorado

Detailed data are estimated for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

"Other" entries include interstate compact from other States (table 6.4).

Other race includes 774 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

The number of parolees in the State's intensive supervision program includes an unreported number of parolees in an electronic monitoring program (table 6.9).

### Connecticut

"Discretionary release from prison" includes persons who entered parole through "reinstatement of parole" (table 6.4).

"Other" race includes 342 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

#### Delaware

All data are estimated.

Detailed data are not provided for entries, exits, and sentence length.

#### **District of Columbia**

Detailed data are not provided for Hispanic origin and sentence length.

"Other" entries include 236 parole/reparole grants (with administrative status or consecutive sentence and detainers) (table 6.4).

#### Florida

The December 31, 1995, population includes all post-prison releases.

#### Georgia

Detailed data are not provided for Hispanic origin (table 6.6).

Detailed data are estimated for sex, race, sentence length, "intensive supervision," and "electronic monitoring."

Because of accounting procedures and record keeping, the January 1 count, plus entries, minus exits, does not equal December 31 count (table 6.2)

#### Hawaii

Detailed data are not provided for race and Hispanic origin.

"Other" supervision status includes parolees supervised by foreign agencies and parolees in institutions (table 6.3).

"Other" exits include 29 foreign and institutional exits (table 6.5).

#### Idaho

Idaho has 2 reporting agencies: the State and interstate compact agencies.

Detailed data are not provided for sentence length (table 6.8).

Data are estimated for the number of parolees in the intensive supervision and electronic monitoring programs (table 6.9).

The January 1 population is reported based on the December 31, 1994, population count (table 6.2).

"Other" race includes 90 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

#### Illinois

Detailed data are estimated for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

"Other" entries include transfers from another State and unspecified others (table 6.4). "Other" exits include transfers to Apprehension Unit and unspecified others (table 6.5).

"Other" races include 2,219 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

"More than a year" is reported as "1 year or more" (table 6.8).

### Indiana

Detailed data are not provided for sex, race, Hispanic origin, and sentence length.

"Other" exits include 249 parolees declared delinquent (table 6.5).

#### lowa

Detailed data are not provided for sentence length (table 6.8).

"Returned to incarceration — with new sentence" includes all parolees released because their parole is revoked; "returned to incarceration — other" includes technical violators; "other" exits include terminated cases (table 6.5).

#### Kansas

Data include all post-prison supervision. The Kansas sentencing guidelines act, with its determinate sentencing structure, became effective July 1, 1993. Previously, Kansas had indeterminate sentencing. As a result, a number of entries and exits to parole (as reported) involve offenders with "guidelines" or "new law" sentences (which have determinate periods of postincarceration supervision). For this report the State is unable to differentiate movements of "old law" and "new law" offenders.

Absconders are not included in the January 1 count, December 31 count, sex, race, Hispanic origin, offense length, and supervision status. Absconders are monitored as a group separate from the regular caseload.

Detailed data are estimated for Hispanic origin (table 6.6).

"Discretionary release from prison" includes those released by the State Parole Board, releases to determinate periods of post-release supervision, and releases pursuant to the retroactive provisions of the Guidelines Act (table 6.4).

"Other" entries include 85 parolees released from pre-revocation and administrative confinement (table 6.5).

"Successful completion" includes 229 discharges and 1,245 sentence expirations; "returned to incarceration — with revocation" includes 1,577 condition violations; "returned to incarceration — other" includes 40 administrative holdings and 87 pre-revocation confinements; "other" exits include 167 absconders who were not returned to jail or prison, 106 cases closed by warrants issued, and 168 cases involving out-of-State offenders (table 6.6).

"More than a year" includes a small number of cases with a sentence of "a year or less" (table 6.8).

#### Kentucky

Detailed data are not provided for sex, race, and Hispanic origin.

#### Louisiana

Detailed data are not provided for Hispanic origin (table 6.6).

"Other" exits include 132 unsatisfactory releases and 16 released by error (table 6.5).

"Other" race includes parolees of an unspecified race and an unknown number of Latinos (table 6.7).

#### Maine

Maine abolished parole in 1976. The data reported represents offenders convicted prior to 1976.

The data exclude absconders.

# Maryland

Detailed data are not provided for Hispanic origin (table 6.6).

"Other" supervision status include delinquents in custody (table 6.3).

"Other" exits include unsatisfactory exits (table 6.5).

#### Massachusetts

Detailed data are estimated for January 1 and December 31, 1995, population counts (table 6.2).

"Other" race includes 859 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

# Michigan

Because of improvements in case-tracking procedures, these data are not comparable to data of previous years.

#### Minnesota

"Other" entries include persons released to intensive community supervision programs (table 6.4).

"Other" race includes 96 Hispanic parolees of unknown race and an unspecified number of Asians (table 6.7).

#### Mississippi

Data do not include 907 inactive cases.

Detailed data are not provided for Hispanic origin and sentence length.

Detailed data are estimated for race (table 6.7).

"Other" entries include 1 case from an "information lag" (table 6.4).

"Returned to incarceration — with new sentence" includes an unspecified number of parolees released because they are "returned to incarceration — with revocation" (table 6.5).

"Other" exits include parolees released to inactive (table 6.5).

"Other" races include 129 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

### Oklahoma

"Other" race includes 96 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

### Oregon

"Other" exits include discharged absconders and unspecified exits (table 6.5).

"Other" races include 1,786 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

Intensive supervision program and electronic monitoring counts include both probationers and parolees (table 6.9).

### Pennsylvania

"Other" races include 2,091 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

Detailed data are estimated for exits, sex, race, Hispanic origin, and status of supervision.

"Other" exits include an unspecified number of absconders and transfers (table 6.5).

"Asian/Pacific Islander" include an unspecified number of parolees whose race is other than white (table 6.7).

#### **Rhode Island**

"Other" status of supervision includes 32 persons supervised by U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), 10 persons serving Federal sentences, 2 persons in a Federal detention facility, 1 person in the Federal witness protection program, and 20 inmates held in the Rhode Island Adult Correctional Institution on detention warrants issued by the parole board (table 6.3).

"Reinstatement of parole" includes people placed on reparoled after revocation provided they had no new sentence or a new sentence of 6 months or less (table 6.4). "Returned to Incarceration — other" includes persons whose parole time expired while they were held on detention warrants by the parole board; "other" exits include two absconders from the State's "home confinement parole" program (table 6.5).

### South Carolina

"Other" exits include transfers to nonparole status or to another jurisdiction (table 6.5).

# Vermont

Detailed data are estimated for race and Hispanic origin.

# Virginia

All data are estimated.

"Other" entries include an unspecified number of persons who entered parole by transfer (table 6.4).

### Washington

All data are estimated.

"Other" exits include discharges to subsequent offense jurisdiction (table 6.5).

"Other" race include offenders of mixed and unknown race (table 6.7).

### West Virginia

West Virginia has 2 reporting agencies: the State and interstate compact agencies.

Interstate compact cases represent 16% of West Virginia's December 31, 1995, total. As reported, the interstate compact data are for year beginning July 1, 1994, and ending June 30, 1995.

# Wisconsin

"Other" supervision status include 195 vacating orders and 143 violation warrants issued (table 6.3).

"Other" exits include 1 voluntary return to institution and 1 modified court order (table 6.5).

Intensive supervision and electronic monitoring programs include both probationers and parolees (table 6.9).

# Wyoming

"Other" race includes 27 Hispanic parolees of unknown race (table 6.7).

The State reported having an electronic monitoring program, but is unable to provide the number of parolees in the program on December 31, 1995 (table 6.9).

#### **Explanatory notes**

The statistics reported for capital punishment may differ from data collected by other organizations. The differences occur for a variety of reasons:

• Inmates under sentence of death are originally added to the National Prisoner Statistics (NPS) counts when they enter correctional facilities rather than when judges pronounce sentence.

• Following the year when prisoners are first counted, their admissions or releases as a result of court order are attributed to the year for the sentence or court order. For example, a prisoner sentenced in November 1993 entering prison custody in January 1994 would be counted as an admission in the 1994 report; the 1995 report would count him or her as being under sentence of death at yearend 1993. Similarly, a prisoner whose sentence is overturned in 1993 but who remains in the count until 1995 when the court's decision is reported would be subtracted from the 1993 and 1994 reports.

• NPS counts of persons under sentence of death are always for the last day of a calendar year and will differ from more recent counts.

Some figures shown for yearend 1994 are revised from those reported in Correctional Populations in the United States, 1994. The revised figures include 26 inmates who either were reported late to the NPS program or were not in the custody of State correctional authorities at yearend 1994: Alabama (1), Arizona (1), Arkansas (1), California (12), Florida (4), Idaho (1), Ohio (1), Oklahoma (1), Oregon (1), Tennessee (1), and Texas (2). Eighteen inmates had sentences to death removed in 1994 but were not reported: Arizona (1), California (8), New Mexico (1), Pennsylvania (1), Tennessee (1), Texas (5), and Washington (1).

The data for 12/31/94 also include 7 inmates in Florida who were listed erroneously as being removed from death row.

#### **Explanatory notes**

In 1994 the U.S. Department of Defense Corrections Council established an annual military confinement report (DD Form 2707). The council, comprised of representatives from each branch of military service, adopted a standardized questionnaire with a common set of definitions. With the Corrections Council, the Bureau of Justice Statistics produced a series of tables that provide a unified profile of persons in the custody of U.S. military authorities.

The annual confinement report provides yearend counts of persons in U.S. military confinement facilities inside and outside the continental United States, by branch of service, sex, race, and Hispanic origin, conviction status and sentence length, and offense. It also provides counts of the number persons admitted to confinement and the number released during the calendar year, by branch of service, type of commitment, and type of release. The confinement report also includes the number of facilities and their design and rated capacities, by level.

Data for 1994 and 1995 are incomplete. Information on Air Force confinement facilities (including the number and characteristics of prisoners held at yearend as well as those admitted or released during the year) was not available. Admission and release data in 1994 for Marine Corps facilities covered only the period October 1 to December 31. In future years, with the full participation of all military services, the annual confinement report will provide a complete enumeration of U.S. military confinement facilities, both inside and outside the continental United States. With the cooperation of the Corrections Council, BJS will include these counts in future publications.

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
