

WORLD OPENS BUREAU

Women and Bodies of Children Still Coming Ashore at North Brother Island and Other Points Around Hell Gate --- Fire Caused by the Overturning of Pot of Grease in the Galley.

The big excursion steamboat Gen. slocum burned and sank to-day off North Brother Island with 1,600 excursionists, 500 of them children from St. Mark's German Lutheran Church, in East Sixth Street, aboard. The loss life is estimated to be 1,000.

The following is the latest estimate made by Detective-Sergeant Kinsler and Police Inspector Brooks. Their computation is as follows:

Number on board.... Dead bodies recovered Injured in hospitals Survivors accounted for

Fifty-three injured persons died on North Brother Island while the doctors were attending to them just after they had been carried from the boat to the shore.

When the Slocum went down, at 12:25 o'clock, two hours and twenty-five minutes after the fire was first die-Little One Was Lying Alive on Pile of covered, it is estimated that there were nearly one hundred Dead When Rescuers Extricated charred bodies on her decks. Just after the Slocum sank where she had drifted from North Brother Island the water was black with bodies. The tug Fidelity succeeded in picking up eighty-eight charred corpses before the swirling eddies in Hunt's Cove off Riker's Island carried them out into the Sound.

None of these eightf-eight bodies can ever be identified. Heads and legs are burned off, eNot a shred of clothing is left on any one of them. The captain of the Fidelity says that he estimates that he left twenty bodies
