## **CNO** says Midway vets 'set the standard'

By winning the Battle of Midway and turning the tide of the war in the Pacific, Midway veterans set the standard that Sailors and Marines are upholding today in the

war on terrorism, according to Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Vern Clark.

"In the aftermath of December the 7th, 1941, it looked gloomy," the CNO told Midway veterans at San Francisco's Marine's Memorial Club. "We're used to winning. We weren't winning. We weren't winning until the Battle of Midway."

The CNO said he has a deeper understanding of how the attack on Pearl Harbor felt because of 9/11.

> "It's a day I'm never going to forget," Clark said. "They hit my command center. I lost 42 people on my staff. What some people don't know is that we lost 10 people in the Navy family also that day who were on airplanes up in New

York, Pennsylvania and Washington. After USS Cole and 9/11, I've started to take this personal."

Clark told the Midway veterans that they would be proud of their successors in today's Navy-Marine Corps team.

"The greatest thing that I get to do is watch our young people. They're truly awesome. They're just trying to follow in your footsteps," the CNO said. "In 1941 in the month of June, it was your turn. It was your turn to carry the torch. It was your turn to set the standards. It was your turn to set the standards. It was your turn to stand on the bridge. It was your turn to stand tall and you did it in an amazing way. I want you to know how much we appreciate what you did for the United States of America."

"It was your turn then. It's our turn now. And we're going to get it done."

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# A message from the Chief of Naval Personnel

Your Navy's participation in the global war on terrorism continues to be nothing short of awe-inspiring. In the first ten months, our Navy has been at the leading edge of the fight. Here are just a few quick facts:

- 78 U.S. Navy ships have deployed to CENTCOM.

- More than half of the active carrier force has engaged in combat operations (*Enterprise, Carl Vinson, Kitty Hawk, Theodore Roosevelt, John C. Stennis, John F. Kennedy,* and *George Washington*).

- Five of 12 ARGs have joined the fight (Peleliu, Bataan, Bonhomme Richard, Wasp, and Belleau Wood).

- 60,000 Sailors and Marines have deployed to CENTCOM.

- Over 13,000 Navy and Marine reservists have been mobilized.

- Naval aviation has flown 12,000 combat sorties.

- We dropped over 5,000 precision weapons, including firing 82 Tomahawks.

That's delivering credible combat power to the four corners of the earth. As you know, we can also do this with complete freedom of action and without a permission slip from other nations.

It's also a busy time in Washington, D.C., as Congress works on delivering a budget which supports our men and women. Several of the issues we are working were addressed during the Secretary of the Navy's Retiree Council which met in Washington in April. The council took note of the dramatic accomplishments that have taken place in the past two years in the health care arena, specifically the TRICARE Senior Pharmacy (TSRx) and TRICARE for Life programs. The Council expressed in its letter to Secretary England the appreciation of Navy and Marine Corps retirees and their families for the Department of the Navy's efforts in making these programs become a reality.

The Council felt that two major issues merited top attention on behalf of the retired community: changes to the Survivor Benefit Plan and the concurrent receipt of retired pay and disability compensation for military retirees. On these issues, the Council expressed the following opinions:

"We must take care of our spouses and surviving spouses who stood by our sides throughout our careers and, in many cases, sacrificed the opportunity to pursue careers of their own. Reducing their survivor's annuity at age 62 is an embarrassment."

"The time has come to provide our disabled retirees just due by providing full entitlement to both retired pay and disability compensation. It is patently unjust to combine these entitlements for those who served arduous duty in the military while providing both to other Federal retirees."

In an effort to help you get more of the information you need, we have established a Customer Service Center (CSC) at the Navy Personnel Command in Millington, TN. The CSC became operational in April '02 for active duty Sailors and has opened to rave reviews. The center's capacity has since been expanded to handle responses from our entire Navy family to include reservists, retirees, and family members. If you have a question, call 1-866-U-ASK-NPC (1-866-827-5672) between 0700-1900 CST Monday through Friday, or you can visit the web site at www.staynavy.navy.mil.

This is my last letter to you as your Chief of Naval Personnel. Serving you and our active duty Sailors has been the honor and privilege of a lifetime. We have made real progress in both improving the quality of service for our young men and women and demonstrating that their service is highly valued by our fellow citizens. As a result, our Navy's combat capability is exceptional and our reenlistment rates are at all-time highs. In September I will become president and CEO of The Retired Officers Association (TROA). This position with TROA will allow me to continue serving you and **all** of our men and women and their families. It's hard to think of a better position outside of wearing the uniform.

Thank you for your own personal example of dedicated service to our nation and your continued support to all our men and women currently serving.

#### **Dear Fellow Retirees**,

The March-June 2002 *Shift Colors* was one of the largest newsletters published in my nine years of working with the Retired Activities Branch. Of note is the section in my last article mentioning that a list of stateside Casualty Assistance Coordinators for those interested in volunteering for "Military Funeral Honors Details" would be included in that edition. I found out at the last minute that the details on administering the program had not been worked out. As soon as a Navy policy is promulgated we will publish additional information in the *Shift Colors*.

In the last edition I also provided you information on "Special Compensation" and "Concurrent Receipt". However, due to printing deadlines and the lack of finalization of legislative initiatives, what is the latest when we go to print may have changed by the time you receive your copy of *Shift Colors*. So, I encourage you to consider joining a military fraternal organization, i.e. the Fleet Reserve (FRA), The Retired Officers Association (TROA) or The Retired Enlisted Association (TREA), to name a few, or visit their web sites to stay updated on your entitlements and benefits.

During the months of April and May, I had the privilege of participating in the Secretary of the Navy's Retiree Council (SECNAV RC), the Army's Chief of Staff Retiree Council and the Air Force Retiree Council. The councils are composed of retired representatives of their service. The members articulate their retiree communities' concerns and forward recommendations to their service's Secretary or Chief of Staff. The Services again are working together to let leadership know how the retiree community feels about (primarily): Full Concurrent Receipt, Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) offset provision, Concurrent Receipt of SBP, Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) and TRICARE for Life (TFL). We will publish the Secretary of the Navy's Report with his response in one of our future newsletters.

"I didn't know that," is a phrase I hear from members of the retiree community far too often. Fellow retirees and survivors, we have to be an informed community to ensure nothing we are entitled to slips by. Go to Retiree Appreciation Days or call your Retired Activities Office (RAO) and ask, "what's new." You contributed your youth and energy to the military for many years. You owe it to yourself and your beneficiaries to be knowledgeable of events that affect you.

**Do you know where your DD214 (discharge or retirement order) is located?** Your survivors will have a tough time arranging military funeral honors without this important document.

### Other important issues addressed at the Retiree Council meeting:

Vice Adm. Ryan's letter (page 3) details key issues addressed by the 2002 Secretary of the Navy Retiree Council. Additional issues discussed include:

• The Uniformed Services Former Spouses Protection Act (USFSPA) – Support legislative changes to USFSPA effecting changes to the division of retired pay.

• Access to Health Care – Reimburse Medical Treatment Facilities (MTFs) adequately for care provided to Medicareeligible beneficiaries.

• TRICARE Communication and Marketing – Establish an aggressive, comprehensive, unrelenting non-traditional marketing and communication plan.

Subsidy for TRICARE Retiree Dental Program

(TRDP) – Urge DoD to appropriately subsidize TRDP and to extend Plan to retirees overseas.

• Monetary Penalty for Military Retiree Late Enrollment in Medicare Part B to Qualify for TRICARE for Life (TFL) – Support a policy change to grant a waiver of Medicare Part B enrollment for military retirees eligible for TRICARE benefits if they were eligible but enrolled in Medicare Part B prior to June 5, 2001.

• Incorporate Department of the Navy retirees as part of the "Quality of Service" continuum – Establish a program that utilizes the talent pool represented by Naval Service retirees.

• Authorize and implement payroll deduction and automated payment of TRICARE Prime premiums.

# **Federal Long Term Care Insurance Program**

#### From the Office of Personnel Management web site

FLTCIP is an important new benefit for more than 20 million members of the Federal family, including Federal and Postal employees and annuitants, members and retired members of the uniformed services and qualified relatives. We contracted with John Hancock and MetLife, who formed a joint venture called Long Term Care Partners, to provide this insurance.

#### Q. What is long term care?

**A.** Long term care is the kind of care that you would need to help you perform daily activities if you had an ongoing illness or disability. It also includes the kind of care you would need if you had a severe cognitive problem like Alzheimer's disease. It is help with eating, bathing, dressing, transferring from a bed to a chair, toileting, continence, etc. This type of care isn't received in a hospital and isn't intended to cure you. It is not acute care. It is chronic care that you might need for the rest of your life. It can be received in your own home, at a nursing home or other long term care facility.

#### Q. What is long term care insurance?

**A.** It is insurance that helps you pay for long term care services, such as home care or care in a nursing home or assisted living facility.

**Q. I'm healthy. I won't need long term care. Or, will I? A.** The odds are that you will need long term care at some point in your life, and you may need it sooner than you think. About 40 percent of people needing long term care are adults ages 18-64. They may have had an accident or a stroke, developed multiple sclerosis, etc. While we hope you never need it, everyone should have a plan for meeting their long term care needs. Many will do so through long term care insurance.

#### Q. Is long term care expensive?

**A.** Yes, it can be very expensive. It can easily exhaust your savings which is one reason you might decide to buy long term care insurance.

### Q. But doesn't my health plan already cover long term care?

**A.** No, in most cases it does not. Health plans may cover some of the skilled medical services you may need when you

can't care for yourself after an illness or injury, but usually for a limited period and only as long as you are showing improvement. Health plans typically do not cover ongoing chronic care such as an extended stay in an assisted living facility or a continuing need for a home health aide to help you in and out of bed. No health plan that we know of will cover all of your long term care needs.

#### Q. But won't Medicare cover long term care?

**A.** No, in most cases it will not. Medicare is a Federal health insurance program for people who are age 65 or older, some people with disabilities under age 65, people with End-Stage Renal Disease (permanent kidney failure requiring dialysis or a transplant), and people with Lou Gehrig's disease (ALS, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis). Medicare will cover the first 100 days of care in a nursing home if: (1) you are receiving skilled care, and (2) you have a qualifying hospital stay of at least three days and enter the nursing home within 30 days of that hospital discharge. There are also some deductibles and co-pays (meaning you have to pay part of the cost). Medicare also covers limited home visits for skilled care.

It's very important to realize a few things about long term care versus Medicare's coverage:

1. most long term care is not skilled care,

2. most long term care does not take place in a nursing home,

3. most nursing home stays do not immediately follow a hospital stay,

4. most people who require care in their home usually need more or different types of care than Medicare covers,

5. most people won't start Medicare coverage until age 65.

So don't count on Medicare to cover your long term care needs.

### Q. I recently read that Medicare is now covering Alzheimer's Disease. Is this true?

A. The information that you are seeing is related to the decision by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to no longer exclude persons with Alzheimer's disease from accessing Medicare-covered services due to their diagnosis alone. Medicare still only covers skilled care under certain conditions for a limited period of time. All the restrictions on receiving nursing home care or home care, including a prior *continued on next page* 



hospital stay and need for skilled care, as well as required deductibles and copayments, still apply. Alzheimer's disease is a chronic illness. Persons with this illness typically require non-skilled, custodial care for long periods of time. This type of care is still not covered under Medicare, but the change in Medicare's policy has left many with the impression that it might be.

#### Q. But won't Medicaid cover long term care?

**A.** Medicaid is a state-based program supplemented by Federal funds that acts as a safety net to provide health services to the poor and impoverished. Medicaid covers long term care services and might cover you if you meet your state's poverty criteria and receive care that meets your state's guidelines. Usually this means expending all but \$2,000 of your assets and savings (except for perhaps your house and your car). It also means receiving care from a limited number of state-approved caregivers (mostly institutions like nursing homes) that are willing to accept Medicaid's payments. People that you wouldn't consider poor sometimes qualify for Medicaid by "playing the game" and "beating the system," usually with legal help. States react with more rules.

If you don't have much in the way of assets and income, Medicaid is probably your best bet for long term care. If you can afford long term care insurance, want to control the type and location of care that you receive, and aren't interested in (or don't want to count on) beating the system, the Federal Long Term Care Insurance Program deserves your attention.

### What should my spouse know in the event of my death?

This question is often asked of *Shift Colors* and the Retired Activities Branch. While it may be impossible to truly prepare for the overwhelming emotions and dilemmas that arise with the loss of a loved one, it does help when most of the issues have already been settled.

This checklist provides information that may prove helpful as you prepare one another for the task of handling the affairs of a deceased loved one.

\_\_\_\_ Create a military file that includes your retirement orders, separation papers, medical records, etc. Make sure your spouse knows the location and telephone number of the nearest military installation.

\_\_\_ Create a military retired pay file that includes the pertinent information for DFAS and NPC. To contact:

Your file should also include the number of any VA claim still pending and the address of the VA office being used; a

list of deductions currently being made from benefits; and the name, relationship and address of the person you have made the beneficiary of any unpaid retired pay at the time of death.

\_\_\_Create an annuities file. This should contain information regarding the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP), Reserve Component Survivor Benefit Plan (RCSBP) or the Retired Serviceman's Family Protection Plan (RSFPP), Civil Service, etc. Additional information regarding SBP annuities can be obtained from the DFAS Denver office at **800-435-3396**.

\_\_\_ Create a personal document file that has copies of marriage certificates, divorce decrees, adoptions and naturalization papers.

\_\_\_ Create an income tax file. Include copies of both your state and federal income tax returns.

\_\_\_ Create a property tax file. Include copies of tax bills, deeds and any other related information.

\_\_\_ Create an insurance policy file. Include life, property, accident, liability and hospitalization policies.

\_\_ In a secure location, maintain a list of all bank accounts (joint or individual). Include the location of all deposit boxes, savings bonds, stocks, bonds and any securities owned.

\_\_\_ In a secure location, maintain a list of all charge accounts and credit cards. Include account numbers and mailing addresses.

\_\_\_\_ Maintain a list of all associations and organizations of which you are a member. Some of them could be helpful to your spouse.

\_\_\_\_\_ Maintain a list of all friends and business associates *continued on next page* 



who may be helpful. Include name, address and phone number.

\_\_\_\_ Spend time with your spouse discussing your plans in respect to the type of funeral, burial, cremation or service you would prefer. If they know your desires, it may resolve many of the questions they might have to face at a later date.

\_\_\_\_ Visit a local funeral home and pre-arrange your services. Many states will allow you to pre-pay for services.

\_\_Investigate the decisions that you and your family have agreed upon. Many states have specific laws and guidelines regulating cremation and burials at sea. Some states require a letter of authority signed by the deceased in order to authorize a cremation. Know the laws in your specific area and how they may affect your decisions. Information regarding Burials at Sea can be obtained by phoning the Naval Office of Medical/Dental Affairs-Mortuary Affairs Division at **800-876-1131**.

\_\_\_Once your decisions have been made and you're comfortable with them, have a will drawn up outlining all your wishes.

\_\_\_ Ensure that your will and all other official documents are maintained in a secure location known by your loved ones.

\_\_\_ When all the decision-making and documenting is completed, continue to enjoy life with peace of mind.

Rest assured that you have done everything possible to help prepare your loved ones for a day when you can no longer help. If you have other suggestions that might prove helpful and would like to share them with your fellow retirees, send them to the Retired Activities Branch at our address on the previous page for inclusion in a future issue.

# Survivor's Guide

This information is for family members of surviving spouses of military retirees. It is intended as a guide and is not all-inclusive.

• Notify the Defense Finance and Accounting Service – Denver if the surviving spouse was receiving an annuity from the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP), the Reserve Component Survivor Benefit Plan (RCSBP), the Retired Serviceman's Family Protection Plan (RSFPP) or "Forgotten Widows Annuity." Call **800-435-3396** 

• If the survivor was a Civil Service retiree or receiving an annuity from the Federal government, notify the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) at **724-794-8690**, **Option 3 or 888-767-6738**.

• If the survivor was receiving Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) or other compensation from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), contact the VA at **800-827-1000**.

 $\cdot\,$  Notify private sector or retirement custodian if the deceased received funds from an employer sponsored plan.

 $\cdot\,$  Notify financial institutions where the deceased saved, invested or maintained funds.

· Notify insurance companies.

• Contact your nearest Retired Activities Office (RAO) or Retired Services Office (RSO) for assistance. The RAO phone numbers are routinely published in *Shift Colors*. Call your nearest military installation for the RSO locations.

• If the deceased was receiving Social Security benefits, notify the Social Security Administration at **800-772-1213**.

• If the deceased participated in the federal government's Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) contact the Federal Retirement Thrift Board at **504-255-6000**.

• If the deceased was a member of a military fraternal group, such as, the Fleet Reserve Association (FRA), The Retired Officers Association (TROA), The Retired Enlisted Association (TREA), The American Legion or DAV, please notify that organization.

Realizing that the above list is incomplete, we would appreciate any input from retirees or survivors on information that would be pertinent for the family members of a deceased service member.

## Veterans' stories vital for documenting history

Looking out the windows of the Naval Home in Gulfport, the view is one of Live Oaks and the Gulf. It is a peaceful sight, one of the very best on the coast.

The grounds around the home are active, with people coming and going. Occasionally an ambulance drives in and then out, slowly gliding around the curves as it rolls towards the main gate. One might wonder if there is a friend inside.

Others may wonder if they will make it back to the home. The thought that crosses my mind is "there goes a part of history." I wonder if we ever got the story of the passenger, his oral history.

Thousands of World War II veterans will not be heard from again after this year. Their stories, if not captured, will go untold, and future generations will lose the richness of this heritage.

Over half of the residents of the Naval Home are veterans of our largest war. How many veterans have sat down and documented their story? How many have passed on the memories used to maintain our factual history?

The Naval Home, now named the Armed Forces Retirement Home-Gulfport, is taking the steps to maintain that history. In conjunction with the

Center for Oral History, at the University of Southern Mississippi, the oral history program at the Naval Home is alive and running.

"Already a handful of interviews are providing useful facts and anecdotes," said Pic Firmin, interviewer for USM.

"We have had some excellent interviews, with a good turnout from the residents," he said.

### **Retirement Home fees reduced**

Resident fees have been reduced at the Armed Forces Retirement Home-Gulfport, cutting in half the fees for independent and assisted living care for veterans of all military services. The National Defense Authorization Act for 2002 has implemented this reduction until Dec. 31, 2006, or until new or renovated quarters are available for residents.

The percentages and limitations on the maximum monthly amount that are applicable to fees charged to residents are as follows: independent living, 35 percent, but not to exceed \$800 per month; assisted living, 40 percent, but not to exceed \$1,300 per month; and long-term care, 65 percent, but not to exceed \$2,500 per month.

The home has vacancies. For information, please call 800- 332-3527.

Firmin has been interviewing residents for several months and is a major asset to the program. With the help of Mary Allen, a resident of the home, the program is running smoothly.

"The oral history of the home is absolutely imperative," said Macon Patteson, resident and curator of the Naval Home museum. "Oral history gets down to the nitty-gritty of the person, down into the heart of history and into the details of everyday life. The program sat idle for several years. The opportunity to dust it off and open the doors to the residents came this year. When we kicked off the oral history program, we posted bulletins on our internal cable network."

The first person to respond was Amos Nissley. He said he wanted to tell the story of the attack on Okinawa, the way he saw it through his binoculars.

"We had intelligence reports of an eight-mile beach," he said. "The only thing we saw were cliffs, and I wondered how the guys were going to get over them."

At that moment, the bombs from the nearby ships started to disintegrate a targeted section of the cliffs, he said. Soon after, landing craft vessels brought in bulldozers and the access was created.

Maintaining that history, for Nissley and for our country, truly is imperative. Stories from the eyes of these veterans cannot be created from any other source. The day-to-day experiences recorded will help to preserve the history of our great country.

The Armed Forces Retirement Home-Gulfport is working each day, to ensure those stories are documented for future generations.

# Law increases veterans' burial benefits

Under a new law, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) will increase reimbursement for funeral expenses and cemetery plots for service-disabled veterans and provide government markers for veterans' graves even if families already have installed private markers.

"The modest increases in payments to veterans' families, and the additional monuments to our heroes' service, are steps toward better acknowledging this nation's appreciation of its veterans," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Anthony J. Principi.

The Veterans Education and Benefits Expansion Act of 2001 increases the burial and funeral expense allowance for veterans who die as a result of a service-connected disability from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and the cemetery plot allowance, for certain other disabled veterans, from \$150 to \$300.

The law also directs VA to honor requests for government markers for veterans buried in private cemeteries even if their graves have headstones or markers furnished at private expense. Previous law prevented VA from providing markers in that situation. These increases are among many provisions of Public Law 107-103 that expand other veterans' benefits.

About 9,800 families receive funeral expense reimbursement for serviceconnected deaths each year. The \$500 increase in the funeral reimbursement, the first since 1988, is expected to increase the government's cost by about \$5 million a year. This change applies to deaths on or after Sept. 11, 2001.

About 90,000 families become eligible for the plot allowance annually. The cost of increasing the amount, which had been \$150 since 1973, will be about \$13 million a year. The higher allowance will be paid for deaths on or after Dec. 1, 2001.

The plot allowance is paid when a veteran is buried in a non-government cemetery. Also, the veteran must meet

one of the following three criteria: the veteran was eligible to receive VA disability compensation or a VA pension, was discharged from military service due to disability or died in a VA hospital.

In the past, people who submitted VA applications to receive a government marker had to certify that the veteran's grave was unmarked. Some families complained of unfairness because they could not obtain the government's free marker to commemorate the veteran's service if they had purchased a marker.

Under the new law, the applicant must certify that the marker will be placed only in a cemetery. VA will send the marker only to a designated cemetery.

The new provision for markers applies to veterans' deaths on or after Dec. 27, 2001. By Feb. 1, 2006, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs will report to Congress on how much this benefit is being used and recommend whether or not to continue it.

### Charter renewed for Advisory Committee on Women Veterans

Secretary of Veterans Affairs Anthony J. Principi has renewed the charter for a special 14-member panel that advises him on issues affecting women veterans.

"VA is being called upon to provide more services for women veterans," Principi said. "We must make a special effort to ensure we're meeting their needs for health care, rehabilitation, outreach and other VA programs."

The Advisory Committee on Women Veterans, established in 1984, reports annually to the VA secretary with assessments of the needs of women veterans.

It also reviews the adequacy of VA

programs to the needs of women veterans and makes recommendations for administrative and legislative changes.

The director of the Center for Women Veterans, Dr. Irene Trowell-Harris, serves as the executive director for the committee. VA's Center for Women Veterans, created in 1994, ensures that women veterans receive benefits and services on a par with male veterans; that they encounter no discrimination in their attempts to access these services; and that they are treated with respect, dignity and understanding.

"We've created change through collaboration," said Dr. Trowell-Harris.

"We've provided staff education and training, strengthened interagency relationships, developed partnerships with veterans service organizations, enhanced the flow of information, responded to over 200 inquiries since October, fostered research on womens health and incorporated women veterans' issues as part of the national women's agenda."

The 14-member committee is among 21 special VA advisory panels. By law, the charters of those panels expire every two years unless renewed by the VA secretary for another two-year term. Principi renewed the charter for the womens' panel on Dec. 31.



## Quality of veterans' health care rates high marks

The health care veterans receive from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is comparable to -- and often better than -- care provided by private sector counterparts, according to recent reports.

VA data from 18 indicators were compared with similar data from managed health care organizations, government sources and populationbased surveys.

For 16 of the 18 indicators, VA outcomes exceeded the "best-reported" performance data from health care organizations measured by the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA), Medicare Managed Care Plans (MMCP), Centers for Disease Control (CDC) surveys, and Health and Human Services National Center Health Statistics (NCHS).

"VA health care has come a long way in its more than 50 years of existence," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Anthony J. Principi. "This is a new VA, substantially different, profoundly better and a recognized leader in providing quality health care. This data, in part, explains why so many more veterans are coming to us for their care."

The indicators cover a wide range of care, from diabetes and hypertension to cancer screening and immunizations. With a focus on preventive care, for example, VA provided screening for cervical cancer 89 percent of the time, compared with NCQA's 78 percent. For diabetic patients, VA examined patients' kidney function 72 percent of the time, compared to NCQA's 46 percent.

"To a large degree, VA health care is improving because of an emphasis on the use of clinical practice guidelines and system-wide performance measures throughout VA's 1,300 sites of care," said Dr. Robert H. Roswell, under secretary for health. "VA quality used to be questionable. Today, VA is a health care industry that is highly competitive and in many areas leads the nation."

The performance measure system is

an evidence-based means to assure veterans receive the best care possible. Even in areas where comparable private sector data is not available, VA has made significant progress.

For example, screening for problem alcohol use last year was at 74 percent, up from 66 percent the previous year; educating patients about prostate cancer rose from 71 percent to 83 percent, and screening patients for depression rose from 70 percent to 81 percent.

Clinical statistics only tell a portion of the story. For the second year in a row, independent surveys confirm that patient satisfaction scores for VA outpatient care top those received by private sector health care providers.

"VA does not measure to see where we've been," said Principi. "Instead, we measure to support where we want to go. We will not rest on our laurels. We will continue to improve, and that's a pledge I make to all veterans."

### VA compensates more veterans exposed to radiation

Secretary of Veterans Affairs (VA) Anthony J. Principi recently announced the addition of five new cancers to the list of diseases presumed to be connected to the exposure of veterans to radiation during their military service. Veterans diagnosed with cancer of the bone, brain, colon, lung or ovary will have an easier time establishing entitlement to compensation for their illnesses effective March 26, 2002.

"These veterans accepted the risks of duty and have borne the burden of their illnesses in service to our nation. They should not have to bear an additional and unequal burden to prove they deserve the benefits they've so rightfully earned. The new rules will not cure their cancers, but they will ease the burden of proof required to receive appropriate compensation for their disabilities," Principi said.

The new rules apply to veterans who participated in "radiation-risk activities" while on active duty, during active duty for training or inactive duty training as a reservist.

The definition of radiation-risk activities has also been

expanded to include service at Amchitka Island, Alaska, prior to Jan. 1, 1974, if a veteran was exposed while performing duties related to certain underground nuclear tests. The new definition also includes service at gaseous diffusion plants located in Paducah, Ky., Portsmouth, Ohio and an area known as K25 at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

Under current statutes, the following diseases are presumed to be service connected if the veteran participated in a radiationrisk activity: leukemia (other than chronic lymphocytic leukemia), cancer of the thyroid, breast, pharynx, esophagus, stomach, small intestine, pancreas, gall bladder, bile ducts, salivary gland, or urinary tract, multiple myeloma, lymphomas (except Hodgkin's disease), primary cancer of the liver (except if cirrhosis or hepatitis B is indicated) or bronchiolo-alveolar carcinoma.

### Online system speeds up veteran home loan processing

A new federal Internet-based system for mortgage bankers and other lenders will speed up the processing of home loans for veterans through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). After the veteran's information is entered by the financial institution providing the loan, the lender will receive a certificate authenticating the veteran's eligibility in seconds.

Previously, when a certificate of eligibility was needed, a form was submitted to VA and the certificate was mailed, a process that can take a week or more.

"This leap forward in VA automation is great news for the veteran anxious to close a loan and move into a new home," said VA Under Secretary for Benefits Daniel L. Cooper. "When interest rates begin to change, getting loan procedures resolved quickly can be important to our veterans."

The new system, called Automated Certificate of Eligibility (ACE), should be especially beneficial for active-duty members and veterans who are using their home loan benefit for the first time.

Last year VA guaranteed more than 250,000 loans valued at \$31.2 billion. Approximately 80 percent of these loans require a certificate of eligibility. VA anticipates the ACE system will be able to generate a certificate for 30 to 50 percent of these loans. However, some loans will still require manual processing by VA, including veterans whose eligibility is based on National Guard or Reserve service, those with irregular discharges and those in several other situations.

Where the new electronic system is used, the eligibility certificate will be printed from the lender's computer and it will be customized, bearing the date and lender's name as well as a unique authorization number. For the veteran, that represents a change from the traditional certificate process in which the veteran often kept a copy of the certificate of eligibility to take to a prospective lender.

The ACE system will not reject any veterans for home loans and lenders will not be involved in deciding any eligibility issues. A veteran whose eligibility involves special issues requiring the traditional staff review may still request a certificate of eligibility in advance of approaching a bank or mortgage company with a loan application by sending in VA Form 26-1880, Request for Determination of Eligibility for VA Home Loan Benefits.

All lenders participating in the VA loan guaranty program have access to the system. Veterans or servicemembers interested in learning more about their VA home loan benefits or who wish to obtain forms may visit www.homeloans.va.gov on the Internet.

### Benefits guide free on web

The Department of Veterans Affairs has made its comprehensive benefits guide available for free on the Internet.

Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents **www.va.gov/pubaff/fedben/Fedben.pdf** is a 100-page handbook describing benefits provided by the VA and an overview of programs and services for veterans provided by other federal agencies.

VA officials estimate most of America's 25 million veterans qualify for at least some VA benefits, but many are unaware of their entitlements. This handbook includes a listing of toll-free numbers, World Wide Web information resources, and VA facilities.

Most veterans are eligible for healthcare and burial benefits. Many are also eligible for home loan guarantees,

educational assistance, vocational rehabilitation, life insurance, and compensation for service-connected disabilities.

This guide explains how to access many of these benefits online. For instance, it provides a Web address and instructions for enrolling via the Internet into the VA healthcare system. The book describes in detail the priority for care and services available. Separate sections describe specialized services available to Gulf War veterans and those exposed to Agent Orange or radiation.

The Montgomery GI Bill and other education benefits are explained in depth. Burial benefits and employment service are also covered, as are rate charts for the various forms of compensation VA provides.

The book can be purchased through the Government Printing Office for \$5 for U.S.-based customers and \$6.25 for those overseas by calling toll-free **866-512-1800**. By providing it online at, the VA hopes to make the information available to more veterans. Centenarian

# Looking for a second career?

The Internet can be one of your most valuable tools when searching for a job or a second career after retiring. In the past, you may have relied on the classified section of newspapers or a job recruiter. Now, the search is as simple as visiting different web sites to input keywords for the job you want and instantly finding results.

Web sites for job searches differ from newspaper classifieds, because in addition to listing available jobs, they allow you to post your resume for potential employers to review. Employers search these sites by inputting keywords for the type of workers they want to hire.

While some job search companies only use the Internet to help people find jobs, others allow customers to send resumes by fax or other means to be listed in their database.

When searching for jobs on-line, you should provide as much information as you can give about your qualifications, without narrowing your options. Employee questionnaires may ask how far you are willing to travel; salary requirements, and where you want to work.

If you don't own a computer or are not particularly proficient at using the Internet, visit your local library and ask for assistance. There are many other places that you can go to use a computer to search for employment. Your local

employment agency, military transition office, Internet café (there will be a fee to use computers there), or even a friend's house.



### If I have direct deposit, why do I need to contact DFAS to update my address?

Even when your pay is sent directly to your bank, it is important to notify the DFAS Cleveland Center to keep your correspondence address updated. This address is used to mail account statements, distributions from pensions, annuities, retirement or profit-sharing plans, IRAs, insurance contracts, Form 1099R, and other correspondence from the servicing center. DFAS also manages the address list used to send your copy of *Shift Colors* magazine.

### To whom should retirees and annuitants address inquiries regarding their accounts?

To change your address or ask questions regarding your pay, contact:
