

From Baltimore, Maryland Take I-70 West to Frederick, MD; US 340 West past Harper's Ferry, WV to Rt 230; Rt 230 North to Shepherdstown, WV; Rt 480 South 0.4 miles to Lowe Drive on right.

Look for small, blue Clarion Hotel sign.

From Gettysburg/York, Pennsylvania Take US 15 South to Frederick, MD; US 340 West past Harper's Ferry, WV to Rt 230; Rt 230 North to Shepherdstown, WV; Rt 480 South 0.4 miles to Lowe Drive on right. Look for small, blue Clarion Hotel sign.

## From Northern Virginia




# From Harrisburg, Pennsylvania Take I-81 South

to Martinsburg, WV (Exit 12); Rt 9 East toward Charles Town, WV to Rt 480; Rt. 480 North 4.9 miles to Lowe Drive on left. Look for small, blue Clarion Hotel sign.

From Winchester, Virginia Take I-81 North to Martinsburg, WV (Exit 12); Rt 9 East toward Charles Town, WV to Rt 480; Rt 480 North 4.9 miles to Lowe Drive on left. Look for small, blue Clarion Hotel sign.

From Dulles Airport After leaving the terminal, stay in the right lane. Take the "Toll





Road to Leesburg" exit (Greenway Toll Road: \$1.90). In Leesburg, take Rt 7 toward Winchester. Follow Rt 7 to Rt 9 Northwest (Be careful: at one point you will be directed to take a left exit to continue on Rt 9). Follow directions for Rt 9 Bypass through Charles Town, WV to Rt 480; Rt 480 North 4.9 miles to Lowe Drive on left. Look for small, blue Clarion Hotel sign.

# Airport Shuttle Service

The U.S. Office of Personnel Management's Eastern Management Development Center, in partnership with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's National Conservation Training Center, is pleased to provide a shuttle service between Washington-Dulles International Airport and the OPM/EMDC campus in Shepherdstown, WV. The fee is \$25 one way and is payable at the Clarion Hotel front desk upon checkout. If you want to use the shuttle service, you must make a reservation through the EMDC Hotel Liaison Office at (304) 876-7000, x7121. The fax number is (304) 876-8454. In order to insure that we have a large enough shuttle

to accommodate all passengers, please indicate the shuttle you plan to take both upon your arrival and your departure.

#### Directions to Shuttle at Dulles:

From the Dulles main terminal, follow the signs to baggage pickup/ground transportation, and proceed to the appropriate baggage carousel to claim your luggage. Once you have claimed your luggage, use the nearest airport exit, following the signs marked Ground Transportation. The NCTC Shuttle will meet you at ARRIVALS LEVEL (Mid Level) **DOOR** 7. The 24-passenger bus is white with blue trim and has the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service logo displayed on the front. The destination panel will show "NCTC". A 12passenger van is used for smaller group pickups and also displays a USFWS/NCTC identification. The NCTC bus or van will be at ARRIVAL LEVELS DOOR 7.

Shuttle Cancellations: The NCTC shuttle departs on time. If you decide not to take the shuttle or know that you will miss it, please call (304) 876-7000, x7121 to cancel your reservation. There is a 48 hour cancellation policy.





# Shepherdstown History



Shepherdstown is the oldest town in West Virginia. Starting out in 1762 as Mecklenberg, it was re-named for its founder, Thomas Shepherd, in 1798. It officially became Shepherdstown in 1867 after being granted its charter by the new state of West Virginia.

The town and surrounding area are rich in history. Shepherstown was the starting point for the legendary Bee Line March, in which Southern volunteers rushed to the aid of George Washington's Continental Army in Boston. And while the Civil War was not fought in town, one of its most infamous battles, Antietam, was fought less than five miles away. Shepherdstown became a medical stopping point for the retreating Confederate army, converting one of its storefronts into a temporary hospital.

One of the picturesque areas you may find while visiting Shepherdstown is the Rumsey Monument. Located right on the bank of the Potomac, it marks the spot where James Rumsey demonstrated the first working model of the steamboat a full 20 years before Robert Fulton. A working replica of this boat, information about the life of James Rumsey and early photos of Shepherdstown can be found at the Rumsey Steamboat Museum.

A walk through the town will delight in colonial architecture, and a short drive through the surrounding area will reveal many historical sites and stopping places. Cultural and educational opportunities abound in the areas local colleges (Shepherd College in Shepherdstown, Hood College in Frederick, George Washington University in Cascades, West Virginia University Extension). Local secondary schools afford excellent preparation for advanced educational experiences. Jefferson County is a locale where the style and pace of living is family-oriented and reflects the aspirations of generations of individuals seeking higher quality of life that everyone remembers.

## From: The Ranger Notebook:

Battle of Shepherdstown September 19-20, 1862

#### **Potomac River Ford**

Known as Boteler's Ford, Blackford's Ford, Pack Horse Ford, and other names, the shallow crossing of the Potomac River less than a mile downstream from Shepherdstown, West Virginia, was used by travelers since Native American times. After the highway bridge at Shepherdstown was destroyed early in the Civil War, the ford was a convenient crossing point between Confederate Virginia...

Union cavalry arrived on the Maryland side of the river soon after dawn and began to probe the Confederate position across the Potomac with artillery and rifle fire. Under orders from McClellan to pursue the enemy, Fitz John Porter's 5th Corps took over from the cavalry after about two hours. Porter aggressively put more cannon into position and ordered the First U.S. Sharpshooters and one company of the 5th New York Infantry forward. They used the dry trench of the C & O Canal as cover and began to pick off Confederate gunners on the far side of the river. Some Union artillery shells crashed into Shepherdstown itself, causing confusion and chaos among the townspeople and wounded rebels left there...

Pendleton's anxiety increased as Union infantry actually crossed the river. Just before dark, an attacking party of about 500 men waded across under the cover of a barrage of fire, and forced the Confederate infantry back... The Yankees pulled back to the east side of the river for the night, taking their captured guns with them. In the confusion and darkness, however, Pendleton reported to Lee that Union forces were in Virginia and had captured the entire reserve artillery. Lee and Jackson reacted by ordering A.P. Hill's and Jubal Early's Divisions to stop their withdrawal, turn, and drive the pursuers back into Maryland.

#### Battle of Shepherdstown

As the Confederates reacted to the assumed crisis, Union commanders were planning a follow-up to their raid. Three brigades from the 5th Corps crossed the Potomac at 7:00 a.m. and proceeded toward Shepherdstown and down the Charlestown Road. Advanced skirmishers soon met A.P. Hill's Division closing in on the ford from the west. With the Confederates advancing in force, and only a small number of Federals on the Virginia side, Porter gave orders for all Union troops to return back across the river into Maryland.

Under the cover of artillery fire from the east bank, the Yankees began to wade back across. But Colonel Charles M. Prevost, commanding the newly formed 118th Pennsylvania Infantry (known as the Corn Exchange Regiment), refused to withdraw until he received orders from his direct superior.

Hill's Confederates smashed into the Pennsylvanians just as they began to deploy atop the bluffs overlooking the ford.

This was the Northerner's first battle, the first opportunity many of them had to discover their issued Enfield rifles were defective and would not fire. Colonel Prevost was wounded trying to steady his men, other officers led a bayonet charge which was smashed, and the regiment broke apart. Some tried to escape by climbing down the bluffs under Confederate fire, and many died as they fell to the rocks below. Others picked their way past the old cement mill, ran across the slippery dam, or waded across at the ford. Of the 700 men in the 118th who crossed the river that morning, only 431 came back across.

When the Confederates smashed this attempt by the Union army to pursue Lee, McClellan was convinced that the Southern army still had plenty of fight left in it. He decided to delay any further effort to pursue until reinforced. The Battle of Shepherdstown ended the Maryland Campaign, Lee's first invasion of the North.

## **Elmwood Cemetery**

Elmwood Cemetery in Shepherdstown is the final resting place for 252 Confederate soldiers, many of whom died during Lee's Maryland Campaign. Wounded Southerners were brought to Shepherdstown during retreat, and those who died in hospitals there were buried in the local cemetery. Other Confederates were reinterred there between 1868 and 1870. Henry Kyd Douglas, a member of Jackson's staff whose boyhood home Ferry Hill is located just across the Potomac from Shepherdstown, is buried in Elmwood Cemetery. The cemetery is located 1/2 mile west of Shepherdstown on Route 480.

#### **Directions From the Battlefield Visitor Center:**

Drive south on MD 65 to Sharpsburg; turn right at the stop sign onto MD 34 west. From the modern highway bridge over the Potomac you can see the monument to James Rumsey, who successfully demonstrated his 48-foot steamboat on the river at Shepherdstown in 1787. Turn left at the stop sign in Shepherdstown onto German Street and follow it as it bends to the Potomac River. The road becomes River Road, and the ruins of the old mill on the left and the plaques on the right mark the location of the ford. These tablets are part of a system of War Department markers placed around Antietam Battlefield in the 1890s to identify the positions of individual units. Please no not climb on the bluffs, and respect private property.

#### C&O Canal National Historical Park

Hike or bike on this former towpath canal used to transport cargo from Cumberland, MD, to Georgetown in the District of Columbia, during the latter half of the nineteenth century. The canal runs 184.5 miles from DC to Cumberland and camping, fishing, and boating are allowed in designated areas.

The C&O Canal follows the route of the Potomac River for 184.5 miles from Washington, D.C. to Cumberland, MD. The canal operated from 1828-1924 as a transportation route, primarily hauling coal from western Maryland to the port of Georgetown in Washington, D.C.

Hundreds of original structures, including locks, lockhouses, and aqueducts, serve as reminders of the canal's role as a transportation system during the Canal Era. In addition, the canal's towpath provides a nearly level, continuous trail through the spectacular scenery of the Potomac River Valley. Every year millions of visitors come to hike or bike the C&O Canal in order to enjoy the natural, cultural, and recreational opportunities available.

# Historic Shepherdstown and The Historic Shepherdstown Museum

Incorporated in 1961, Historic Shepherdstown has undertaken many important major projects that benefit our community. The Historic Shepherdstown Museum was founded in 1983, and in 1986 the expansion and updating of the National Register for Historic Places listing for the Shepherdstown Historic District was completed.

The largest effort began in 1972 when the historic Entler Hotel was scheduled for demolition.

Volunteers worked together to save and restore the building as a center for public activity. After many years of heavy public use, a major 25th anniversary renovation project was undertaken in 1997-98 to further enhance the public rooms. Today the Entler is headquarters for the Historic Shepherdstown Commission.

#### Harpers Ferry National Historical Park

Harper's Ferry, (304) 535-6298

A walk down the brick streets of this restored, pre-Civil War town transports you to 1859, the year abolitionist John Brown fought to free the slaves. Black history exhibits along High Street; quaint craft shops, museums and eateries. Part of the Civil War Discovery Trail.

Throughout its history, Harpers Ferry has been the backdrop for remarkable and unparalleled events. Here, in one setting, several themes in the American story converge: Native Americans, industry and transportation, African-Americans, John Brown, the Civil War, and the natural environment. Harpers Ferry became part of the National Park System in 1944. The park covers over 2,300 acres in the states of West Virginia, Maryland, and Virginia.

# Antietam National Battlefield and Cemetery

Sharpsburg, (301) 432-5125
Described as the "Bloodiest Day of the Civil War: the Battle of Antietam (or Sharpsburg) on September 17, 1862, climaxed the first of Confederate Gen.
Robert E. Lee's two attempts to carry the war into the North. Some 41,000 southerners were pitted against the 87,000-man Federal Army of the Potomac under Gen. George B.
McClellan. And when the fighting ended, the course of the American Civil War had been greatly altered.

## **Belle Boyd House**

Martinsburg, (304) 267-4713 Home (c. 1853) of the Civil War spy Belle Boyd, who supplied information to the Confederacy.

# Harper's Ferry Historic District

Harper's Ferry

Shops along cobblestone streets winding uphill from the park to the town of Bolivar feature a remarkable collection of antiques including Civil War memorabilia and local crafts.

# James Rumsey Steamboat Museum

After hours faxes can be picked up at the hotel front desk.

Hotel charges for incoming faxes: \$2.00 for first page, \$.25 for additional pages.

Outgoing faxes can be sent self-service from the EMDC Business Center free of charge (the EMDC fax number is 304-870-8001); the Hotel charges \$3.00 for the

first page and \$2.00 for each additional page for outgoing faxes.

**Hotel Student Lounge:** The Clarion Hotel provides two lounges for MDC classes. These are the Potomac

Room and the Blue Ridge Room. These lounges are located on the second floor of the hotel, on either side of the elevators. There is a refrigerator, TV, VCR, stereo,

and microwave in each room.

**Business Center:** The EMDC provides a Business Center, which includes several copy machines, a

fax machine, and several banks of telephones with both local and FTS access.

**No Smoking:** There is no smoking in the EMDC facilities.

**Crest:** On a wreath argent and vert, an anvil proper enflamed or and gules.

**Scroll:** Argent lined vert (motto when chosen to be in black letters).

# **Symbolism**

The Management Development Centers were originally called "Executive Seminar Centers," and were chartered under the Civil Service Commission. The symbolism of the Coat of Arms is as follows: The four pointed star was suggested by the device on the Civil Service Commission seal and alludes to the Civil Service Commission (predecessor of OPM), under whose jurisdiction and authority executive seminars were held and conducted. The star is voided (open) to indicate review, elucidation and discussion of government policies, needs and requirements as they affect civil service personnel and operational functions. The two crossed diagonals (saltire) refer to the various departments and agencies of the government and are interlaced with the voided star to indicate the interlocking of the departments and agencies in their combined mission of achieving government and civil service goals. The anvil is symbolic of wisdom (the brain); in metaphor the brain is likened to an anvil on which are hammered out, by thought and knowledge, new ideas, solutions and decisions as to current and future problems. The tongues of fire are symbolic of zeal and in conjunction with the anvil allude to the presentation, illustration, illumination, investigation and discussion of problems and goals by the groups attending the seminars. The color green is symbolic of memory, knowledge, freshness of approach and unity; the color white (silver) of truth and ability; the color yellow (gold) of achievement and guidance.

# Most Frequently Asked Questions

# Will I have my own hotel room? Do I need to make my own hotel reservation?

Each participant has an individual hotel room. The EMDC staff will make your room reservation for you the week before the seminar begins. Remember to fax the enclosed Special Request Form to Carolyn Zwior at (304)876-8454.

#### Do I get Per Diem?

Your tuition covers meals & lodging so the per diem is \$2.00/day, depending on your agency.

# How far is the airport from the Clarion Hotel? Is there a shuttle? How much does it cost?

Dulles Airport is approximately 65 miles from the hotel. It takes about an hour and a half each direction during normal traffic and road conditions. The Clarion Hotel has a partnership with the National Conservation Training Center to provide shuttle to and from the Airport for all EMDC guests at a nominal fee of \$25 each way. Please look for the NCTC shuttle when you arrive at the airport.

#### Can my spouse or guest accompany me?

Yes, but it is not recommended due to the intense nature of our seminars. There will be an additional \$10.00 per night room charge for guest(s) staying in your room, and if they will be eating with you in the EMDC dining room the charges for guest(s) meals are: Breakfast- \$7.00, Lunch-\$8.00 and Dinner-\$16.00. # Can I stay in the hotel any additional nights not included in the tuition?

For those participants not based in the Washington, D.C. area and its surrounding environment, who cannot arrive in time for class on opening day, the Center will provide an additional night's stay as part of your attendance at the Seminar. For each additional night you elect to stay beyond the term of the Seminar, you will be charged the government rate of \$79.00, plus tax per night. Please note on your lodging and transportation sheet any additional nights along with your credit card number. #### Do I need a rental car?

Personal transportation is not required as the hotel, training center, and health club are in the same complex. If your agency has authorized a rental car, one can be rented at the airport or hotel. Many participants get together to rent a car

for weekend trips. Enterprise Rental has weekend discounts available for Clarion Hotel guests: parking is free at the hotel and the center.

#### What is the dress code?

The dress code is casual: slacks, open collar shirts, and sweaters in cooler weather. We want you to be comfortable while you're here. Bring athletic wear for working out.

#### What is the weather like?

Shepherdstown weather, like weather everywhere, can be unpredictable, but the climate is generally similar to that of Washington, D.C., perhaps two or three degrees cooler.

## How can I access my e-mail while I'm at the Center?

If your agency has set up web-based e-mail, you can access that e-mail from the computers in our Technology Center, all of which have internet access. If your agency does not have web-based e-mail (i.e., if you have to dial in to a separate number to connect), then you will have to do it through the phone jacks in your hotel room; the Front Desk can help you if you have any problems connecting. The telephone lines in the Center are digital phone lines; these will not work with analog modems, and trying to connect through these lines could damage your modem.

#### How do I find out about course content?
