Choosing Quality Health Care

Research shows that Americans want and value quality health care. The problem is that the quality of health care services varies in our country – a lot. For example, some health plans and doctors simply do a better job than others of helping you stay healthy and getting you better if you are ill.

Fortunately, health care quality can be measured, and it can be improved. You can find out how in a new guide developed by the Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Agency for Health Care Policy and Research (AHCPR). Your Guide to Choosing Quality Health Care is based on research about the information people want and need when making decisions about health plans, doctors, treatments, hospitals, and long-term care.

The *Guide* describes quality measures including consumer ratings, clinical performance measures, and accreditation – what they are, where to find them, and how to use them. And it provides other information, such as the "Quick-Checks for Quality" that summarize the major ways you can check for quality health care.

This initiative is one part of HHS' efforts to address the findings of the President's Advisory Commission on Consumer Protection and Quality in the Health Care Industry.
