Cold Canadian high pressure pushed the coldest air up through this point in the fall season into southern Illinois. Clear skies and calm winds allowed frost to form, except in the southern tip of the state from Cairo to Metropolis. This was unusually early in the season for the first frost. The low at Carbondale was 32 degrees.

Cold Canadian high pressure pushed the coldest air up through this point in the fall season into northwest Kentucky. Clear skies and calm winds allowed frost to form, mainly in areas north of Madisonville. This was unusually early in the season for the first frost. The low at the Henderson airport was 34 degrees, and Providence (in Webster County) fell to 33 degrees.

0100CST Dense Fog 0700CST

Widespread dense fog formed over most of western Kentucky. Visibility was reduced to around one-sixteenth of a mile at some locations, including Murray, Hopkinsville, Owensboro, and Kentucky Dam. The only part of western Kentucky to escape the dense fog was the extreme west, from Paducah and Mayfield west to the Mississippi River.

Thunderstorms with very heavy rain and small hail moved northeast across the Purchase region of West Kentucky. In Hickman County, an unofficial report of 3 inches of rain in one hour was received from Oakton. In McCracken County, ditches were overflowing between Hendron and Fremont. At the intersection of U.S. Highway 641 and Highway 80 in southern Marshall County, about 2 inches of water was pooling on the roadway.
