"WHAT CAN I DO TO

- If you cannot stop, do not reuse or share needles or works (cotton, spoons, syringes, water)
- Get vaccinated against hepatitis B and hepatitis A
- Limit sexual partners and use latex condoms every time you have sex

## "WHAT CAN I DO IF I HAVE HEPATITIS C?"

- Stop drinking alcohol
- Stop shooting drugs and get into a drug treatment program
- If you cannot stop, do not reuse or share needles or works (cotton, spoons, syringes, water)
- Get vaccinated against hepatitis B and hepatitis A
- See a doctor to find out if you have liver disease and if it needs to be treated
- Check with your doctor before taking any medicine, even over the counter medicine

"HOW CAN I PREVENT SPREADING THE HEPATITIS C VIRUS TO MY FAMILY & FRIENDS?"

- Do not share toothbrushes, razors or other personal care items that might have blood on them
- Cover your cuts and open sores



## What Every Injection Drug User Should Know

Hepatitis C is a disease that can lead to liver damage and death. You are at risk if you have ever shot drugs.

## YOU CAN HAVE HEPATITIS C BUT NOT FEEL SICK.

## "DO I HAVE HEPATITIS C?"

There's only one way to know: **GET TESTED** Four million Americans have been infected with the hepatitis C virus, and many do not know it.

Hepatitis C	Through infected blood or body fluids	<ul> <li>Shooting drugs or sharing needles or "works" (cotton, spoons, syringes, etc.)</li> <li>Received a blood transfusion before July 1992 or solid organ transplant before July 1992</li> <li>Received treatment for clotting problems with a blood product made before 1987</li> </ul>	No.
