## **TWO TEXAS MEN SENTENCED FOR CONSPIRING TO DISTRIBUTE 100 KILOS OF MARIJUANA IN JASPER COUNTY**

**SPRINGFIELD, Mo.** – Todd P. Graves, United States Attorney for the Western District of Missouri, announced that two Texas men were sentenced for their role in a conspiracy to distribute mass quantities of marijuana in Jasper County, Mo.

**Jamie De La Pena**, 35, of San Marcos, Texas, was sentenced on Feb. 7, 2003, by U.S. District Judge Richard E. Dorr to five years and 10 months in federal prison without parole.

On Sept. 6, 2002, **De La Pena** pleaded guilty to playing a role in a conspiracy to distribute more than 100 kilograms of marijuana in the Joplin, Mo., area. **De La Pena** admitted that he helped arrange for the shipment of marijuana that was intercepted on Oct. 1, 2001.

**De La Pena** also admitted that he traveled to Joplin again on Nov. 25, 2001 and sold undercover law enforcement officers approximately 100 kilograms of marijuana. On Nov. 28, 2001, law enforcement officers in Dallas seized approximately 88 kilograms of marijuana from **De La Pena**, Graves said.

**Jimmy Jones**, 41, of Seagoville, Texas, also was sentenced on Feb. 7, 2003, by U.S. District Judge Richard E. Dorr to six years and eight months in federal prison without parole.

On Aug. 28, 2002, **Jones** pleaded guilty to helping to arrange shipments of marijuana from Texas to Joplin.

**Jones** admitted that he acted as a telephone messenger and “go between” for **De La Pena** and others, passing on information about marijuana shipments while he was incarcerated at the federal prison in Seagoville.

**De La Pena** and **Jones** are two one of four co-defendants originally charged in a five-

count indictment returned by a federal grand jury in Springfield on May 1, 2002.

Co-defendant **Antonio Castro**, 42, of Arlington, Texas, also has been sentenced for his role in the conspiracy. He was sentenced in January 29, 2003, to five years and 10 months in prison without parole.

On Aug. 28, 2002, **Castro** pleaded guilty to helping arrange shipments of marijuana from Texas to Joplin. **Castro** admitted that he allowed the use of his Dallas, Texas, residence as a storage location for the marijuana and that he assisted in the distribution of approximately 100 kilograms of marijuana to undercover law enforcement officials on Nov. 25, 2001. He also admitted that he was present when officers arrested co-defendants in the conspiracy who were, at that time, in possession of 88 kilograms of marijuana. A subsequent search of **Castro's** residence revealed additional quantities of marijuana and drug paraphernalia, Graves said.

Co-defendant **Luciano Martinez-Figueroa**, 34, of Rialto, Calif., was found guilty by a federal jury on Jan. 16, 2003, of one count of conspiring to distribute in excess of 100 kilograms of marijuana and one count of possession with intent to distribute in excess of 100 kilograms of marijuana.

Graves explained that **Martinez-Figueroa** was part of the conspiracy to ship truckloads of marijuana, originating in Mexico for distribution in Joplin, between September and November 2001. On Oct. 1, 2001, law enforcement officers in Jasper County intercepted a tractor trailer that was being driven by **Martinez-Figueroa**. The trailer was carrying 41 cardboard boxes of processed marijuana weighing approximately 455 kilograms and approximately \$5,000 in United States currency.

This case is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Randy Eggert. It was investigated by the Missouri State Highway Patrol and the Drug Enforcement Administration of Springfield, Mo., and Arlington, Texas.
