Highlights of the Conference Report to Accompany H.R. 4850, the District of Columbia Appropriations Bill for FY 2005

The Conference Report to accompany H.R. 4850, H. Rept. 108-734, was filed on October 5, 2004.

Noteworthy

- The Conference Report provides \$560 million in discretionary budget authority, which is nearly equal to the Administration's request, and \$18.2 million above the FY04 enacted level.
- The Conference Report includes the District of Columbia's local budget of \$8.3 billion, as passed by the D.C. Council and signed by the Mayor. This includes \$7.2 billion in operating expenses and \$1.1 billion in capital outlay funds.
- The Conference Report provides \$40 million for School Improvement in the District of Columbia, an amount which fully funds the Administration's request.
- The Conference Report makes no change to the current-law provisions concerning: abortion services, attorney's fees, Boy Scouts, domestic partner health benefits, lobbying, needle exchange, and medical marijuana.
- The House passed the Conference Report to accompany H.R. 4850 this afternoon by a vote of 377-26. The Senate is expected to take up the Conference Report and pass it by voice vote before the week is over.

Bill Provisions

The Conference Report includes the following Federal payments:

District of Columbia Resident Tuition Support:

Conference Report: Provides \$25.6 million in Federal funds for the District of Columbia Tuition Assistance Program.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$21.2 million, which is \$4.2 million above the Administration's request, and \$4.3 million above the FY04 enacted level.

District of Columbia Courts:

Conference Report: Provides \$190.8 million in Federal funds for the District of Columbia Courts.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$195 million, which is \$33 million below the Administration's request, but \$28.2 million above the FY04 enacted level.

<u>Defender Services in District of Columbia Courts:</u>

Conference Report: Provides \$38.5 million for Defender Services in District of Columbia Courts.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$34.5 million, which is \$7 million below the Administration's request, but \$2.7 million above the FY04 enacted level.

Court Services and Offender Supervision Agency for the District of Columbia:

Conference Report: Provides \$180 million for the Court Services and Offender Supervision Agency.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$182.5 million, which is \$5 million below the Administration's request, but \$15 million above the FY04 enacted level.

Water and Sewer Authority:

Conference Report: Provides \$4.8 million (to be matched 100 percent with local funds) for the Water and Sewer Authority.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$10 million (to be matched 100 percent with local funds), which is equal to the Administration's request, but \$19.8 million below the FY04 enacted level.

Anacostia Waterfront Initiative:

Conference Report: Provides \$3 million for the Anacostia Waterfront Initiative.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$3 million, which is equal to the Administration's request, but nearly \$2 million below the FY04 enacted level.

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council:

Conference Report: Provides \$1.3 million for the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$1.3 million, which is equal to the Administration's request and the FY04 enacted level.

United Communications Center:

Conference Report: Provides \$6 million for United Communications Center.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$7 million, which is equal to the Administration's request, but \$1.1 million below the FY04 enacted level.

Transportation Assistance:

Conference Report: Provides \$2.5 million for Transportation Assistance in the District of Columbia.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$5 million, which is \$5 million above the Administration's request, and \$1.5 million above the FY04 enacted level.

Foster Care Improvement:

Conference Report: Provides \$5 million for Foster Care Improvement.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$5 million, which is \$5 million above the Administration's request, but \$8.9 million below the FY04 enacted level.

Office of the Chief Financial Officer of the District of Columbia:

Conference Report: Provides \$32.5 million for the Office of the Chief Financial Officer of the District of Columbia.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$32.5 million, which is \$341,000 above the FY04 enacted level.

School Improvement in the District of Columbia:

Conference Report: Provides \$40 million for School Improvement in the District of Columbia.¹

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$40 million, which is equal to the Administration's request, and \$236,000 above the FY04 enacted level.

Bioterrorism and Forensics Lab:

Conference Report: Provides \$8 million for architectural design and planning costs associated with the construction of a new Bioterrorism and Forensics Lab.

Senate-Passed Bill: Provided \$8 million.

General Provisions

The Conference Report retains the current-law provisions as they are in the FY04 appropriations bill for the District on the following general provisions:

- **Abortion services**: Prohibits the use of Federal and local funds for abortion services, except in the case of rape, incest, or to preserve the mother's life.
- **Attorney's Fees**: Caps the amount paid to attorneys at \$4,000 per case in suits against the District of Columbia Public Schools under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.
- **Boy Scouts**: Prohibits the use of Federal and local funds to support the D.C. Human Rights Commission case against the Boy Scouts of America for discriminating on the basis of sexual orientation.
- **Domestic Partner Health Benefits**: Prohibits the use of Federal funds, but allows local funds, to implement the D.C. law offering health benefits to partners of city employees.
- **Lobbying**: Prohibits the use of Federal and local funds for all lobbying purposes, including lobbying for voting representation and statehood.
- **Medical Marijuana**: Prohibits the use of Federal and local funds to implement a 1998 D.C. initiative in support of the medical use of marijuana.
- **Needle Exchange**: Prohibits the use of Federal and local funds to support any program which distributes hypodermic needles for the purpose of reducing disease transmission.

¹ Included within these funds is: \$13 million to provide a scholarship program for low-income children in underperforming schools; \$13 million for development of public charter schools; \$13 million aimed at increasing student achievement at District of Columbia Public Schools in accordance with the No Child Left Behind Act; and \$1 million is for administrative expenses.
