

- Homeland Security funding for the Cities of Santa Ana & Anaheim— More than \$25 million in grants to enhance overall security and preparedness level to prevent, respond and recover from acts of terrorism.
- Anaheim Police Department School Gang Officers Division—The Anaheim Police Department will receive \$500,000 for their School Gang Officers Division. The money will keep police officers on campus at Anaheim's seven middle schools and eight high schools to help prevent gang-related school violence.
- Orange County Land Planning and Conservation—\$2 million will go to the Transportation Corridor Agency for land acquisition, conservation practices.
- **Orange County Coast Beach Erosion**—\$250,000 will go to a feasibility study for shore protection, watershed, and water quality efforts along the Orange County Coast.
- Santa Ana River Mainstem—Flood Reduction Project: The Santa River Mainstem project received \$35 million to continue work to reduce flood hazards in the County and, ultimately, decrease the cost of flood insurance for homeowners.
- **Santa Ana River Basin**—\$3.395 million will go toward maintaining the Santa Ana River Basin including operation and maintenance costs for Prado Dam and other routine operational costs to maintain flood control along the Santa Ana River.
- **Groundwater Replenishment System**—The Orange County Regional Water Reclamation Project will receive \$2 million in funding for the Groundwater Replenishment System (GWRS). Upon completion, the GWRS will produce enough water for 156,000 families each year—and save enough energy to light 21,000 California homes each year.
- Santa Ana Memorial Technology Center—Santa Ana Memorial Technology Center will receive \$250,000 to provide enhanced technology training. The technology center is part of a citywide effort to increase workforce and quality-of-life skills through the application of information technology tools.

- Orange County Congestion Program—\$1 million will go to the Orange County Congestion Program to assist communities throughout the County develop innovative responses to combat the region's growing congestion and transportation safety problems.
- **Santa Ana Empowerment Zone**—Santa Ana's Empowerment Zone is expected to receive \$2 million in federal funding to continue its mission to bring urban community revitalization and sustainable economic development to the City of Santa Ana.
- **West Haven Community Center—**The City of Garden Grove will receive \$90,000 to construct the West Haven Community Center and Gymnasium—the only indoor municipal sports facility in Garden Grove serving youth, adults and senior citizens.
- **Garden Grove Storm Drainage System**—\$225,000 will go to Garden Grove for storm water infrastructure improvements. The money will build a storm drainage system in south-central Garden Grove, near the Westminster and Garden Grove border.
- **Multi-Cultural Community Center**—\$405,000 was provided to Westminster to build a Multi-Cultural Community Center. The center features a 400-seat auditorium and banquet and meeting facilities for the expected 100,000 annual visitors—such as local school districts, performing artists, and social and cultural groups.
- California State University, Fullerton Gerentology Center—\$500,000 will go to upgrade the technology, infrastructure and educational capabilities for the Ruby Gerontology Center at California State University, Fullerton.
- **Fullerton Law Enforcement**—The City of Fullerton will receive \$50,000 to improve law enforcement technologies.
