Project Public Health Ready

Project Public Health Ready builds on the practical experience and the research of partners. This foundation includes the workforce competency projects of the Center for Health Policy at Columbia University, the CDC-funded Centers for Public Health Preparedness program, and NACCHO's direct link to local public health agencies nationwide. The Project Public Health Ready partnership will result in voluntary certification of public health agencies whose public health workers have been trained on bioterrorism and public health emergency readiness competencies and have an approved agency-wide terrorism response plan evaluated through exercises and drills.

A NACCHO advisory committee guides the project to assure relevance to public health practice and sustainability into the future. Other partners, including the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO), schools of public health and CDC, assure that all perspectives are integrated. During this year, the project team is working with the advisory committee to develop certification criteria, determine a process to certify local public health agency readiness, conduct pilot tests and plan for a national roll out.

Project Values

- Public Health Ready partners will work collaboratively keeping the needs of local governmental public health practitioners and communities foremost in mind.
- Public Health Ready certification process will be readily accessible and financially affordable to the local governmental public health workforce.
- Public Health Ready certification shall add value to the dayto-day practice of the local governmental public health agency.
- Public Health Ready agency competencies shall reflect knowledge, skills, and abilities that are useful in "real-world" public health practice.
- Public Health Ready certification will complement, not duplicate, existing programs for professional development.

- An advisory committee comprised of leaders and practitioners from local governmental public health agencies and other relevant partners will direct the Public Health Ready certification process.
- The Public Health Ready certification process will be regularly evaluated to ensure benefits and avoid negative consequences.
- Public Health Ready certification shall be sought after by the local governmental public health workforce as evidenced by its success in the marketplace, i.e., the demand for its programs by the workforce.
- Public Health Ready training and certification will be implemented over time to allow for continuous quality improvement.
