The ninth annual Management for International Public Health (MIPH) course was held at the Northlake Courtyard Marriott Hotel in Atlanta from August 21 – September 29, 2000. Seventeen participants attended from Botswana, Ghana, Guam, Israel, Nicaragua, the Northern Mariana Islands, Palestine, the Philippines, South Africa, Thailand, Vietnam and Zambia. Public health academic institutions were well represented in this year's course with faculty from Hebrew University-Hadassah School of Public Health and Al Quds University in Jerusalem, University of Guam, Mahidol University of Thailand, Medical University of South Africa, and National Autonomous University of Nicaragua. Financial support for participants came from nine different international organizations and governments. The course included practical knowledge and skills in developing effective work teams, health problem analysis, total quality management, priority setting, proposal writing, planning, and implementing and evaluating public health programs. To help prepare participants to conduct management training after they return home, they received teaching notes and curricula, as well as various tools for assessing training needs, planning workshops and evaluating training activities.

Since 1992, the MIPH program has graduated 158 management trainers from 51 countries. Support from a variety of international donors enables SMDP to provide on-site technical assistance to many of our graduates as they establish management training programs in their own countries. In the first quarter of 2001, SMDP staff provided assistance to MIPH alumni in the Northern Mariana Islands, the Philippines, Nicaragua, South Africa and Vietnam.

Philippines Field Management Training Program Upgrades Health Workers' Management Skills

With its faculty of 10 MIPH alumni/ae, the Philippines Department of Health currently has the third largest concentration of MIPH graduates after China (17) and Vietnam (11). Management training began in the Philippines in 1995 with the USAID-funded Data-for-Decision-Making Project. In 1998, MIPH alumna Dr. Conchy Roces, Director of the Epidemiology Center, established the Philippines Field Management Training Program (FMTP) to upgrade the management skills of local government workers whose roles and responsibilities significantly changed following the health sector decentralization of 1990. The FMTP enrolled its first cohort of 20 local trainees from June 1999 - May 2000. The second cohort was enrolled in November 2000 and included twoperson teams from 9 local health units. The FMTP curriculum consists of three workshops held over a 9-month period and combines classroom training with two practical field projects. For the first project, participants use TQM to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of an existing public health program; for the second, they use Healthy Plan-it? to identify a local priority and plan an appropriate intervention. The classroom training consists of five weeks of didactic instruction using group exercises and simulations.

Although the program is subsidized by the USAID Infectious Disease Surveillance Control Project, each participant also pays a tuition fee of 10,000 pesos (about \$200 US). The two-person teams all receive four onsite supervisory field visits (two per project) by course faculty over the 9month training period. Participants give two oral presentations and prepare a poster to demonstrate their competencies and the impact of the projects on program goals. Although the projects are led by participants who attend the formal workshops, another five to seven local health workers at each site also learn TOM and Healthy Plan-it? techniques through their participation.

NICARAGUA: Matagalpa and Jinotega Health Departments Show Major Quality Improvements

Dr. Oscar Nunez (MIPH '97), Director of the Quality Assurance Project in Matagalpa, Nicaragua, found a number of problems in an initial assessment of maternal care in health departments in Matagalpa and Jinotega. These included low customer satisfaction levels, lack of staff conformance to standard procedures, and absence of staff knowledge of professional guidelines.

A Quality Improvement Team implemented a variety of countermeasures from March to November 2000 to redefine workflow, emphasize adherence to standardized procedures and monitor customer satisfaction.

Results showed that after countermeasures were introduced, female client satisfaction increased from 57% to 90%, completion of the basic perinatal clinic history increased from less than 10% to 83%, use of the "partograma" delivery charts increased from zero to 88% and average level of knowledge of Ministry of Health guidelines for women's care during pregnancy, delivery and the puerperium increased from 44% to 88%.

The Quality Improvement Team, health providers and the clients they serve were pleased with these improvements, which were achieved despite considerable economic, social and geographic difficulties.

New SMDP Staff

Three new staff members have joined the SMDP since October 2000. All three will be working with the MIPH course, as well as providing in-country technical assistance to MIPH graduates.
