Mexico Offers 4-Week International Management Course in Spanish

A new Center for Management Development in Public Health (Centro de Desarrollo Gerencial en Salud Publica, or CDG), based on CDC's MIPH program, was launched recently in the General Directorate of Epidemiology (Dirección General de Epidemiología, or DGE) of Mexico's Ministry of Health.

MIPH alumni/ae from Mexico developed the CDG course offering, targeting Spanish-speaking public health professionals. The course, which adapts the English-language version of the MIPH course taught each year in Atlanta, will be held for the first time August 12-September 6, 2002, at the DGE offices, Mexico City.

The faculty includes DGE staff members Pablo Kuri Morales (MIPH '94), Director General; Silvia Artasánchez-Franco ('93), Coordinator, Management in Public Health; Maria Jesus Hoy ('98) Vice-Director, Epidemiologic Surveillance of Communicable Diseases; Javier MontielPerdomo ('99), Chief, Training and Human Development; and Dr. Miguel Betancourt-Cravioto, Vice-Director, Epidemiologic Surveillance of Non-communicable Diseases.

Joining the Mexican course instructors in teaching the four-week course will be Fedor Espinosa ('95),

SMDP Association of Teachers of Preventive Medicine (ATPM) Fellow, who will teach Force Field Analysis and Budgeting.

The course is marketed to federal, state and local government employees through a combination of direct and electronic mail, including the Ministry of Health's intranet and website, which reach a public health audience throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. By June 15, CDG had received 51 inquiries and eight of the 20 available slots were filled.

Silvia said, "We saw a real need for this type of training in Mexico and Latin America, especially for public health professionals managing programs. The course is adaptable to any area of public health. We are delighted that the initial response has been so positive."

Eye Care Managers Trained in India using MIPH Tools, Expertise

SMDP's Brian Robie joined Keerti Bhusan Pradhan (MIPH '01), of the Lions Aravind Institute of Community Ophthalmology (LAICO)-Aravind Eye Care System, in Madurai, India, to teach Total Quality Management (TQM) and Leading Change sessions in the first India-based public health management training course. Keerti organized, promoted and directed the management training program held in Madurai, March 4-15, 2002. The course attracted 19 eye care program managers from Australia, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Indonesia, Maldives, Nepal and Vietnam. LAICO-Aravind marketed the course through the World Health Organization (WHO) and non-gov-

ernmental organizations that work in eye care throughout Asia.

The training is designed to enhance capacity in management and program development enabling participants to more effectively implement WHO's Vision 2020, a global initiative to eliminate avoidable blindness.

Keerti explained, "Eye care service requires more focus on management concepts because it crosses all health care disciplines. In addition, there is a great disparity among nations in providing eye care despite well-defined strategies and developed technology. This course will play a key role in improving management skills across the board."

Course content included planning, project and program management, monitoring and evaluation, information systems, TQM and managing change.

The course will be repeated each year in March at LAICO-Aravind Eye Care System, Madurai, Tamilnadu, India. Please contact keerti@aravind.org for details.

SMDP Presents Paper at JHPIEGO "Best Training Practices" Conference

The paper, entitled "CDC's Experience Strengthening Public Health Management Training Capacity in Developing Countries," highlighted SMDP's experience in Vietnam and Nicaragua as examples of "best practices."

More than 240 participants from 20 countries attended the conference, which was co-sponsored by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) and the JHPIEGO Corporation, an affiliate of Johns Hopkins University.

Hoa attended the 2-year program as a Ford Foundation Fellow, and completed a thesis on "Health-Seeking Behaviors among Women with Reproductive Tract Infections in Chilinh, Hai Duong Province."

She returned to Vietnam in June to resume her teaching duties with the Hanoi School of Public Health, Department of Health Organization and Management. SMDP anticipates working with Hoa and her colleagues on the SMDP Global Conference to be held in Hanoi in April 2003 (see below) and in providing assistance to CDC's Global AIDS Program to develop a management training initiative for HIV program staff in Vietnam.

Philippines creates lab management training course

Government laboratory workers must deliver timely, accurate and reliable data for patient management and disease surveillance. Toward this end, two Filipina MIPH graduates, Thelma Bermudez-de Leon ('00) and Lydia Sombrero ('00) developed a Laboratory Management Training Program (LMTP). The program is designed to strengthen the management competencies of public health laboratory personnel in the Philippines Department of Health (DOH).

The first LMTP workshop was held March 1-11, 2002, and was taught by Thelma, Lydia, Conchi Roces ('98), Rutchie Gamaro ('97) and Tet Castillo ('01) of the DOH National Epidemiology Center; and Dr. Ernie Vera ('01), Center for Degenerative Diseases, Center for Disease Prevention and Control, DOH.

The 15 trainees included 13 from regional and provincial hospitals, and two from the Regional Institute of Tropical Medicine (RITM).

SMDP's Laurel Zaks joined DOH supervisors in April for site visits to monitor and assist participants in completing field projects.

A joint graduation ceremony of the LMTP (*SMDP News*, Spring 2002) and the Field Management Training Program (*SMDP News*, Summer 2001) will take place on August 9, 2002, an occasion also when outstanding TQM projects in the Philippines will be recognized.
