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Report Highlights:

South African macadamia production in CY2002 is expected to increase by 15 percent from the previous year because of an alternating 'on-year' nature of the trees, favorable conditions, expanded area and an increase in the number of bearing trees. The industry expects increased growth in the next 5 years because of the establishment of new production areas in Mpumalanga, and Kwa-Zulu Natal in the south coast. The industry exports about 90% of its total production. This year, dry-in-shell exports of about 10,200 tons are expected.

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Executive Summary

South Africa's CY 2002 macadamia production is estimated to increase by 15% from last year mainly because of the alternating nature of the tree-bearing that makes this an 'on' year.

CY 2002's total macadamia trees are expected to reach about 2,7 million. South African Macadamia Association (SAMAC), an independent body represents the interest of the industry. It is free from government intervention, and is funded by its own members through voluntary levy of about 25c/tree (excluding VAT) bought at nuseries, and on processed macadamia products.

The tree levy is SAMAC's attempt to create a more fair and balanced system of funding its activities.

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Production

South African Macadamia industry is expected to continue to increase in the medium term. Expansion includes the recent establishment of about 600Ha macadamia orchard in Maclands of the Northern Province by Macadamia Industrial Development Corporation's subsidiary, Sapekoe. New production areas have also been established in Mpumalanga, around White River and Nelspruit; and Kwazulu-Natal in the South Coast.

In 2001, all SA macadamia factories achieved HACCP and ISO 9002 accreditation. The industry is supported by nine processing factories engaged in drying, cracking, sorting, packing and exporting of the nuts. Four of these factories are located in the Northern Province, with three in Levubu and one in Tzaneen, and the rest in Mpumalanga province. Da Gama in Nelspruit has been the only macadamia oil processor in the country. Last year Sapekoe bought Zetpro's shares, the oldest and largest macadamia processing factory in Levubu, which processes about two-thirds of South Africa's macadamia production.

Currently macadamia nuts, whole and half, command higher prices in both the domestic and international markets. Only about 20% of total production is of cheaper rejects; i.e fractured nuts and lower grades, however, they are used for value-adding such as ingredients in baking, nougat making, chocolate coated macadamia nuts, macadamia butter, oil and oil-based soap, skin lotion and salad dressing.

Macadamia oil price in domestic markets, ranges from about R2/kg to R35/kg for below-premium and premium grades.

The Levubu factory, Royal Macadamia has embarked on a macadamia chips project, earmarking a R5 million for an oil processing plant in partnership with Center for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) Bio/Chemtek.

The long-term upward annual macadamia production trend is continuing. Production increased about 85% between 1987 and 2001 as a result of the estimated 300,000 trees planted in the 1980s which came in full production after 1995.

Consumption

Domestic sales of about 14% more than last year are expected in CY2002.

Trade

SAMAC is export oriented with more than 90% of its production sold in international markets annually.

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Stocks

In CY 2002, ending stocks of about 400 MT are expected.

Policy

The Macadamia industry is an independent organization which is free from government intervention and is funded by its members' levy that is mainly used for research.

The SA macadamia industry complies with the ISO 9002 grading standards.

Marketing

Macadamia growers deliver their produce after on-farm de-husking, as Nut-in-Shell (N.I.S.) at moisture contents varying from 7 to 20%, to any of the five major processing facilities. One of the processing plants is used as a toll cracking facility where producers deliver N.I.S. to the factory, have them cracked and packed before being shipped to the markets. The nuts are marketed through the South African Dried Fruit Cooperative (SAD) in raw or roasted form.
