### Region 6 FY 2003 Environmental Justice Action Plan Progress Report

At the end of FY2003, Region 6 established the Office of Environmental Justice and Tribal Affairs (OEJTA) in the Regional Administrator's office. Although both programs existed separately prior to the 2003 reorganization, the new structure elevates their importance.

Fiscal Year 2003 marked the implementation of the Environmental Justice Action Plan (EJAP) process. Region 6 had a strategy for integrating EJ into its programs, but EJAP provides a better mechanism for tracking and highlighting initiatives. This narrative, in concert with the accompanying matrix, highlights key accomplishments of the Office of Environmental Justice (OEJ). OEJ accomplishments include:

- Strengthening the organizational structure of the Regional EJ initiative by creating a new Office of Environmental Justice and Tribal Affairs. This action facilitates improved communication and collaboration of EJ and tribal issues in the Region;
- Developing and implementing the first national Environmental Justice Listening Session in Houston, Texas in November, 2002;
- Providing EJ training to approximately 300 Region 6 staff and other stakeholders, including personnel from state agencies, other federal agencies, and community members;
- Focusing inspections and compliance assistance activities in areas identified as high risk;
- Providing technical assistance to Tribes that are developing and/or implementing water programs;
- Holding the Region 6 Environmental Justice-U.S. Mexico Border Roundtable in September 2003.

### **Creation of the Office of Environmental Justice and Tribal Affairs:**

The Office of Environmental Justice and Tribal Affairs (OEJTA) was created in 2003 as a part of the Regional Administrator's office. The new office, headed by a Director, is made up of the EJ team and the Tribal team. Each team is led by an Associate Director. It is anticipated that this new organizational structure will strengthen the Region's approach to both the EJ and the tribal programs and will facilitate collaboration on common issues and initiatives. The OEJTA is comprised of 17 staff members.

### **Region 6 EJ Listening Session - November 2003:**

Region 6 held the first EJ Listening Session in the nation in November 2002 in Houston, TX. Region 6 worked with a steering committee to plan the meeting and identify key issues and concerns for discussion. Over 300 community, industry, and government participants met for  $2\frac{1}{2}$ days in a series of solution-oriented listening sessions.

The steering committee, made up primarily of community-based representatives, helped EPA frame key issues for discussion by developing and presenting white papers. Discussion topics included enforcement and supplemental projects, siting and relocation, employment and worker training, permitting, public participation, and U.S./Mexico border issues.

In addition to EPA, other agencies at the state and federal level participated in the sessions. The dialogue resulted in the identification of proposed solutions or action items. EJ staff continues to meet with steering committee members on a regular basis. Region 6 managers will meet with stakeholders during the April 2004 NEJAC to discuss follow-up to the listening session.

### **EJ Training:**

Fourteen EJ training sessions have been held since the training initiative was launched in 2001. A team of six EPA staff and two community-based partners provide training to internal and external audiences.

Approximately 300 individuals from EPA, as well as from other government agencies, Tribal, and community-based organizations, have been trained. In December 2003, the Lousiana Department of Environmental Quality (LDEQ) hosted the training for its managers and staff. The Region will continue its EJ training initiative in 2004 by offering the training two times each quarter to regional staff and state personnel. Participants have expressed a need for advanced EJ training that addresses specific program responsibilities.

### **Grants Training:**

Region 6 has conducted grant writing training in order to build community capacity and to increase the number and quality of the applications for the EJ Small Grants and the Collaborative Problem-solving Grants.
