

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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) final *Compliance Assistance Activity Plan Fiscal Year 2002: An Inventory of Activities (FY 2002 Plan)* demonstrates EPA's commitment to help entities comply with regulatory requirements and improve environmental performance through compliance assistance (CA). The *FY2002 Plan* presents a "snapshot," as of February 12, 2002, of the CA activities that EPA intends to undertake this fiscal year. This Plan inventories a total of 455 CA activities that EPA plans for FY 2002 across 10 EPA Regions and 7 Headquarters offices. The *FY 2002 Plan* encompasses most of EPA's planned CA activities, but does not necessarily capture all general mailings, responses to public inquiries, and distribution of existing tools. Also, EPA's plans to undertake certain CA activities may need to shift as the Agency identifies new priority needs or responds to resource changes.

EPA develops and implements CA activities to meet the needs of the regulated community, other CA providers, and the public. Compliance assistance tools and outreach may help the user implement new regulations; address problems with existing regulations; understand basic requirements; or address geographical, national, regional, local, or facility-specific environmental issues. Compliance assistance may include written or electronic materials and tools, such as overviews of laws and regulations; best management practices; outreach opportunities, such as training, workshops, seminars, mailings, new Web sites; and on-site visits.

The FY 2002 Plan continues EPA's efforts to plan and use its CA resources more effectively, and to assist states and other CA providers in deciding how to focus their resources, avoid duplication, and complement EPA's efforts. This Plan summarizes several aspects of EPA's planned CA activities that support or address the following: Agency strategies and plans, specific chemicals or pollutants, specific industry and government sectors, and EPA regulations that have either a significant impact on a substantial number of small entities or have an economically significant impact of \$100 million or more on the regulated community.

Highlights include the following:

- The types of activities contained in the *FY 2002 Plan* vary widely in scope and purpose. Tools Developed (39%) and Workshops/Trainings/Presentations (29%) account for nearly 70% of all planned CA activities (see Chart 1).
- Many CA activities continue from year to year, such as telephone hotlines, Web sites, and Web-based tools. Hence, a significant percentage (66%) of all planned CA activities are ongoing from the previous fiscal year (see Chart 3).

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- The number of activities distributed among EPA offices varies. Regions are responsible for about 73% of total activities planned, while Headquarters offices plan 27% (see Figure 1).
- For the first time, this Plan includes CA activities that are funded by EPA grants to and cooperative agreements with a diverse group of CA providers and stakeholders. These activities represent 17% of the total activities reported in the *FY 2002 Plan*. This represents a small percentage of the CA activities states and other CA providers engage in.
- About two-thirds of the CA activities reported in the *FY 2002 Plan* address one or more Agency strategies, plans, or SBREFA (Small Business Regulatory Enforcement Fairness Act) or economically significant regulations. The *FY 2002 Plan* contains 29 activities that support previous or upcoming SBREFA/economically significant rules (see Chart 4 and Table 4).
- EPA plans CA activities to address more than 30 chemical and pollutant categories. Among the most frequently addressed categories are non-hazardous solid waste, oil, and solvents, accounting for 42% of planned activities. Other significant categories include pesticides, conventional water pollutants, and lead and lead compounds (see Table 1 and Chart 5).
- EPA plans CA activities to address more than 33 industry and government sectors. About 33% of activities (153) specify more than one sector. Among industry sectors, small business is the most frequently addressed and accounts for about 7% of all activities. Federal, state, and local governments are among the most frequently addressed of all sectors and account for about one-third of all planned CA activities. (This proportion may be slightly higher as a result of double-counting.) (See Table 2, Chart 6, and *Appendix E: Planned Compliance Assistance Activities for FY 2002 Sorted by Sector.*)
- Along with improved CA planning, EPA is measuring the impact of its CA activities on the regulated community. For example, a recent on-line survey of the EPA-partnered Compliance Assistance Centers revealed that more than 90% of respondents said that the Centers helped them understand environmental regulations, while 73% noted that they actually took an action such as reaching compliance with an environmental regulation or changing their handling of wastes or emissions after using the Centers.

The activities reported in the *FY 2002 Plan* are recorded in EPA's Compliance Assistance Planning Database (CAPD) and are accessible through EPA's Web-based National Compliance Assistance Clearinghouse (Clearinghouse) at www.epa.gov/clearinghouse. *Appendix A:***Accessing Plan Data: Tips for Users will help you access portions of those records that are available to the public.

Stakeholder feedback was an important part of the development process for the *FY 2002 Plan*. EPA used several mechanisms, including the second EPA-sponsored National Compliance Assistance Providers Forum and a notice of availability of the FY 2002 draft Plan's inventory of activities in the *Federal Register*, to solicit public comment and feedback on the overall plan, the plan development process, and individual activities. This input helped EPA shape the final *FY 2002 Plan*.

Parallel to developing the *FY 2002 Plan*, EPA has taken additional steps to strengthen the management, planning, and infrastructure of its CA program. Chief among these are integrating future plans into the Agency's two-year program planning cycle, Agency-wide tracking of funding for compliance assistance, ensuring external stakeholder input early in the development of future CA plans, measuring the results of CA activities, and reporting these results in the Annual Performance Report and other venues.

2. STRENGTHENING EPA'S COMPLIANCE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

In response to stakeholder feedback, EPA developed the first Compliance Assistance Activity Plan for FY 2001, as a means to better inform CA providers and stakeholders of the Agency's upcoming compliance assistance activities and projects. The *FY 2002 Plan* continues EPA's efforts to plan and use its CA resources more effectively; and to assist states and other CA providers in deciding how to focus their resources, avoid duplication, and complement EPA's efforts. The Agency has taken additional steps to strengthen the management, planning, and infrastructure of its CA program. In February 2002, OECA and the Regional offices agreed to the following enhancements:

- Establish a Regional Compliance Assistance Coordinator to provide a focal point for information on, and organization of, CA activities;
- Establish a formal compliance assistance communication network to facilitate communication, coordination, and planning among CA and other environmental assistance providers, both within the Regional office and with states and other external parties. Building such networks is important to the comprehensiveness of future Compliance Assistance Activity Plans. (See Appendix C: Regional and Headquarters Contacts for the Compliance Assistance Activity Plan.);

- Coordinate with states on compliance assistance planning: A core component of EPA's CA program is to use part of its planning and priority setting cycle to coordinate with states and tribes in planning CA activities that support national and regional priorities. To facilitate EPA and state planning for CA, the Agency added a new section highlighting and presenting Regional activities to the FY 2002 Plan. (See Appendix D: Planned Compliance Assistance Activities for FY 2002 Sorted by Region.);
- Strategically build compliance assistance into the national and regional planning processes. EPA has issued a description of its Core Compliance Assistance Program. This guidance sets out the current CA activities that should be a part of Regional compliance assurance programs, and serves as a fundamental tool for program planning and oversight; and
- Establish the Compliance Assistance Policy and Infrastructure (CAPI)
 Steering Committee. This steering committee of EPA managers will make recommendations to EPA senior managers on how to further integrate CA into our compliance assistance strategies. These recommendations will build on the four basic actions identified above and will also review and address the core CA framework, create and use common measures for CA activity results, and highlight CA achievements in the Annual Performance Report and other venues.

3. OVERVIEW OF THE FY 2002 PLAN

The following objectives guided the Agency in developing the FY 2002 Plan:

- Provide a comprehensive inventory of EPA's planned CA activities, to help inform stakeholders of the Agency's priorities and plans;
- Ensure that EPA's CA resources are used efficiently, and avoid duplication of effort by working with all regions and appropriate EPA offices;
- Solicit stakeholder input on the planned activities to help identify where compliance assistance resources are most needed; and
- Identify collaboration or partnership opportunities across the EPA, with other CA providers, and with the regulated community.

To achieve these objectives, EPA implemented a strategy to ensure broad Agency and external stakeholder involvement. Key elements of the strategy included extensive utilization of the EPA Compliance Assistance Work Group, consisting of regional and headquarters representatives; and consultation with the Compliance Assistance Advisory Committee (CAAC), a committee of EPA's National Advisory Council on Environmental Policy and Technology

(NACEPT). The CAAC's 21 members included representatives from small and large businesses; trade associations; community and environmental groups; state, local, and tribal governments; and other federal agencies.

EPA compiled the draft inventory of activities planned for FY 2002 in July 2001. The draft inventory contained 356 proposed activities and was based on the President's FY 2002 budget submission for the Agency. EPA sought stakeholder input by publishing the inventory through the Clearinghouse along with a *Federal Register* notice on July 27, 2001, requesting public review and comment on the inventory data. The final *FY 2002 Plan* now contains 455 projects. The increased number of projects from draft to final inventory reflects program improvements and changes as a result of internal analysis and collaboration efforts, final FY 2002 budget allocations, shifts in program priorities, stakeholder input, and more complete reporting within the Agency.

The *FY 2002 Plan* presents a "snapshot" of planned CA activities as of February, 2002. Some of these activities are new (commencing in the current fiscal year); others are ongoing (begun in a previous fiscal year). The total of 455 CA activities represents an increase of 87 activities from the 368 activities in the *FY 2001 Plan*. To view a complete inventory of the activities in this Plan, see *Appendix E: Planned Compliance Assistance Activities for FY 2002 Sorted by Sector* (also known as Project Inventory Table).

In addition to a hardcopy of the *FY 2002 Plan*, CA providers, trade associations, regulated facilities, and the public can access portions of the Plan data via EPA's Clearinghouse from the Clearinghouse Home Page on the Internet at: http://www.epa.gov/clearinghouse under the topic "Planned and Ongoing Activities." Records located there represent the "publicly available" portions of EPA's Compliance Assistance Activity Database (CAPD). To determine which activities should be included in the Plan, the Agency used the following **definition of compliance assistance**:

Compliance assistance includes activities, tools or technical assistance that provides clear and consistent information for 1) helping the regulated community understand and meet its obligations under environmental regulations; or 2) compliance assistance providers to aid the regulated community in complying with environmental regulations. Compliance assistance may also help the regulated community find cost-effective ways to comply with regulations and/or go "beyond compliance" through the use of pollution prevention, environmental management practices, and

innovative technologies, thus improving their environmental performance. To be categorized as a compliance assistance project or activity, at least one objective must be related to achieving or advancing regulatory compliance.


This definition is derived from the basic operating definition of CA used within the Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance (OECA), the Agency office with lead responsibility for promoting CA. It has been modified to recognize activities such as the provision of CA tools to CA providers (and not just to the regulated community) and innovative approaches to environmental improvement, such as environmental management systems. Certain EPA activities, particularly voluntary programs such as Green Lights and Wastewise, are not included in this Plan because they do not have a direct link to regulatory compliance requirements. This Plan encompasses most, though not all, of EPA's planned CA activities; e.g., it does not necessarily include all general mailings, responses to public inquiries, and distribution of existing tools. Also, EPA's planned CA activities may need to shift if priorities or budgets change.

Information contained in this Plan differs from information about the accomplishments or results of EPA's CA activities. If you are seeking information on results or the effectiveness of such activities, then consult *U.S. EPA Enforcement and Compliance Assurance Accomplishments Report*, a series published annually by OECA. For example, the FY 2001 Report includes the following CA accomplishment information: EPA provided CA to more than 550,000 businesses in FY 2001; the public and regulated entities visited the ten Internet-based and EPA-supported Compliance Assistance Centers (Centers) more than 485,000 times; these visits included more than 150,000 requests for compliance documents; and more than one-half million regulated entities accessed other CA tools such as hotlines, workshops, and guidance materials. Furthermore, a recent on-line survey of the EPA-partnered Centers revealed that more than 90% of respondents said that the Centers helped them understand environmental regulation, while 73% noted that they actually took an action — such as reaching compliance with an environmental regulation or changing their handling of wastes or emissions — after using the Centers.

When reviewing these activities and the following charts, keep in mind that planned CA activities vary widely in scope and purpose. Numerous factors affect their scope and purpose. Some of these factors are the nature of the environmental problem and its impact, EPA's strategy for addressing the problem and the role of CA activities in that strategy, and the target audience. Consequently, it is difficult to compare the number and types of activities undertaken by different regions or Headquarters offices. Some activities are large-scale and costly, such as the Centers, or labor-intensive efforts, such as developing compliance guides for complex rules. Other may be one-time meetings; seminars; or ongoing work, such as hotlines, mailings, and tool distribution. Activities also vary in terms of their geographic reach and number of entities affected.


A. Types of Compliance Assistance Activities

For purposes of the analysis in the *FY 2002 Plan*, EPA has chosen to group planned CA activities into four categories developed for budget tracking purposes: (1) on-site assistance; (2) tools developed (e.g, "Plain English" and other guidance materials, fact sheets, checklists, sample forms, etc); (3) telephone hotlines and Web sites; and (4) workshops, trainings, and meeting presentations. Charts 1 and 2 show what portion of the activities reported for FY 2002 and FY 2001, respectively, fit each of the four categories.


NOTE: There are a total of 455 activities recorded in CAPD, showing a total of 637 planned activities. This is due to multiple activities being identified in some records. The chart above presents the distinct activities planned for FY 2002.



Compared to FY 2001, the *FY 2002 Plan* shows an increase from 368 to 455 activities reported. The relative distribution of these activities among the four categories shows a 5% increase from FY 2001 to FY 2002 in "Tools Developed" and an approximate 5% decrease in "Workshops/Trainings/Presentations," while "Telephone Hotlines and Web site" and "On-site Assistance" remain about the same.


B. New Versus Ongoing Activities

Some CA activities are new (commencing in the current fiscal year); others are ongoing (continuing from a previous year). Examples of activities that continue from year to year include hotlines and the 10 Web-based Centers that EPA currently supports. Each national Center serves a particular industry or government sector (e.g., printing, local government, etc.). Chart 3 shows that two-thirds of planned activities are ongoing.



C. Distribution by EPA Organization

In FY 2002, 73% of CA activities are planned by Regions and 27% are planned by Headquarters, compared to 58% and 42%, respectively, in FY 2001. The number of activities planned by each HQ program and Regional office varies from as few as 6 to as many as 54. Within Headquarters, OECA has the largest number of activities with 46, followed by OPPTS with 27. Region 6 has 54 activities planned, followed closely by Region 2 with 52 activities.



This map shows the FY 2002 CA activities distributed by EPA Regional and Program Offices. The number corresponding to each Region or Office represents the number of planned activities for which each respective Regional or Program Office has identified itself as the lead. All Regions are represented and account for approximately 73% of the total activities in the Plan. All Headquarters programs that provide CA are also represented, with OECA having the largest number of activities.

D. Support for Compliance Assistance Providers

EPA provides grants and cooperative agreements to other CA providers and stakeholders for new or ongoing activities that address CA. Approximately 17%, or 80, of the total activities in the FY 2002 Plan receive support from an EPA grant or a cooperative agreement. Grants support 60% of these 80 planned CA activities, while cooperative agreements support the other 40%.

The recipients include a diverse group of organizations. Grant recipients include: 22 to a state or state program, 6 to a university or other academic establishment, 5 to a tribal association or organization, 3 to a federal department or agency, 3 to a non-profit organization, and 1 each to an environmental group, federally-recognized Native American tribe, industry trade association, and local government. Recipients of the cooperative agreements include: 9 each to state or state programs and non-profit organizations, 5 to a university or other academic establishment, 3 to an industry trade association, and 1 each to an environmental group and an environmental justice/community group.


4. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FY 2002 PLAN INVENTORY

EPA develops and implements CA activities to meet the needs of other CA providers, the regulated community, and the public. Compliance assistance tools and outreach may help the user implement new regulations; address problems with existing regulations; understand basic requirements; or address geographical, national, regional, local, or facility-specific environmental issues. Compliance assistance may include written or electronic materials and tools, such as overviews of laws and regulations and best management practices; and outreach opportunities, such as training, workshops, seminars, mailings, and new Web sites. Technical guides, regulatory self-audit checklists and protocols, applicability flowcharts, expert systems, and other Web-based tools are also examples of CA.

This section of the FY 2002 Plan summarizes and highlights several aspects of EPA's planned CA activities that support, address, or assist the following: Agency strategies and plans, chemicals and pollutants, specific industry and government sectors, and EPA regulations that either have a significant impact on a substantial number of small entities or have an economically significant impact of \$100 million or more on the regulated community.

A. Strategies and Plans

About two-thirds of the CA activities reported in the *FY 2002 Plan* address one or more EPA strategies and plans. These strategies and plans may be national or regional in scope or related to specific regulations, pollutants, or industry or government sectors. "Regional Initiatives," usually addressing a specific environmental problem within an EPA region but not necessarily a national priority of the Agency, account for the largest number (113) of these planned activities (see Chart 4). Forty-three (43) activities address or support EPA's national priorities in Memoranda of Agreement (MOA) between Headquarters and Regional offices that establish Regional activity

commitments. For more information about these Agency priorities and the activities that address them, see *Appendix B: Planned Compliance Assistance Supporting EPA FY 2002 National MOA Priorities*.

B. Chemicals and Pollutants

The *FY 2002 Plan* shows more than 30 chemical and pollutant categories addressed by planned activities (see Table 1).



Among the most frequently targeted categories are non-hazardous solid waste (68 activities), oil (64 activities), and solvents (62 activities). Other significant categories include pesticides, conventional water pollutants, and lead and lead compounds (see Chart 5).

Many records in CAPD designated more than one chemical/pollutant (37% of the total). The most frequently identified chemical/pollutant categories are shown above, with non-hazardous solid waste being most prevalent, addressed by 15% of all activities. This category is followed by oil, with 14% of the total.

C. Industry and Government Sectors


The FY 2002 Plan reports on more than 33 industry and government sectors addressed by planned activities (see Table 2).

Of 10 specific sectors addressed by planned CA activities, federal facilities (60 activities), local government (52 activities), state government (37 activities), and schools (34 activities) are the most frequently reported (see Chart 6).

- In the FY 2001 CAPD, the top 5 sectors were federal facilities, followed by state/local government, tribal, chemical manufacturing, and agricultural. Federal facilities represented the largest single sector addressed with almost 11% of the total 368 activities.

Many records in CAPD designated more than one sector (33% of the total). The most frequently identified sectors are shown above, with Federal Facilities being most prevalent, addressed by 13% of all activities. Activities addressing local governments are the next largest cluster, with just over 11% of the total.

The FY 2002 Plan shows that a wide array of activities are planned to address sector needs. These activities are summarized below (see Table 3). For more information about sector projects, see Appendix E: Planned Compliance Assistance Activities for FY 2002 Sorted by Sector.

The sectors addressed most frequently by activities in the Compliance Assistance Plan are listed below. This table provides a brief list of summary statistics for each group of activities.

Geographic Focus: Forty-one (41) of the activities are regional in scope, with Region 2 accounting for over one-sixth of all activities.

Twenty-five (25) activities involve the local government as well. Activity Type: Half the activities include Web sites; 17 include workshops. Statute: Fifteen (15) activities address the Clean Water Act (CWA). Eight (8) activities address CAA, FIFRA, RCRA, and TSCA each; 3 address these statutes in addition to the CWA. Chemical/Pollutant: The predominant chemical/pollutant categories are general water pollutants (14 activities) and pesticides (8 activities). Geographic Focus: A majority of these activities (29) are regional in focus with Region 2 accounting for nearly one-fourth of the total. Eight activities are national in scope, being led by OPPTS Headquarters.

SCHOOLS (34 activities)	Sector: Eleven (11) of these activities focus on schools alone, whereas 23 activities include additional sectors. Eight (8) involve construction. Fourteen (14) address TSCA; 7 of these are common with RCRA. Chemical/Pollutant: The most common chemical/pollutant is non-hazardous solid waste (16 activities), followed by laboratory chemicals (14). Geographic Focus: Almost all activities are regional in scope, with Regions 1 and 2 each accounting for over one-fourth of the total. One activity is national in focus.
SMALL BUSINESS (31 activities)	Sector: Twenty-one (21) of the activities involve multiple sectors, with 10 focusing solely on small business. Activity Type: Workshops (12 activities) are the most common activity type, followed by general guidance materials (10). Statute: Twenty-one (21) activities address compliance related to RCRA. D. SBREFA and Economically Significant Rules

The following table shows planned and upcoming rules (as of April 5, 2002) for which EPA will develop either a compliance guide or a self-audit checklist during Fiscal Year 2002. The Small Business Regulatory Enforcement Fairness Act (SBREFA) requires EPA to develop compliance guides for federal regulations that have a "significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities" as defined under SBREFA. In addition, EPA will develop either a compliance guide or a self-audit checklist for federal regulations with an "economically significant" impact of \$100 million or more on companies and/or government facilities (see Table 4).

The seven rules listed in this table are either expected to be final in 2002 or are already final rules and will have compliance guides completed in 2002. This table does not, therefore, list the potential universe of SBREFA and economically significant regulations for which future compliance guides may be developed.

The list of regulations is not final and is continually changing based on alterations to the regulation's projected publication date and further economic analysis. The status of the regulations on this table are current as of April 5, 2002. To find out the current status of these rules, contact the EPA program office responsible for the rule. Note that there are an additional 3

5. SCHEDULE FOR FY 2003 PLAN

Development of the *Compliance Assistance Activity Plan for FY 2003* will begin in Spring 2002, in conjunction with the mid-cycle update of EPA's two-year (FY 2002 and FY 2003) planning process, known as the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) process. EPA will compile a draft inventory of activities planned for FY 2003 and a final *FY 2003 Plan* using records of planned CA activities entered into CAPD. EPA expects to issue the draft inventory via the Clearinghouse in July 2002, along with a *Federal Register* notice requesting public review and comment.

EPA will consider the feedback it receives from the *Federal Register*, regional meetings, and other stakeholder outreach, such as the Agency's Compliance Assistance Advisory Committee (CAAC) — a standing subcommittee of EPA's National Advisory Council on Environmental Policy and Technology (NACEPT). Stakeholder input on the draft *FY 2003 Plan* will be shared with the program and regional offices for their consideration in finalizing their FY 2003 operating plans. As soon as possible after EPA receives its Congressional appropriation for FY 2003, EPA will revise and then issue the *FY 2003 Plan* in final hardcopy form. The hardcopy will be placed on the EPA Web site and linked through the Clearinghouse.

EPA will continue to enhance CAPD and the Plan, and will use both as strategic tools for targeting resources to the most significant Agency compliance priorities and assistance-related needs. In addition, EPA will use the development process to help establish effective networks with CA providers, community groups, and other stakeholders.


ACCESSING PLAN DATA: TIPS FOR USERS

In 2000 EPA created the Compliance Assistance Plan Database (CAPD) to catalogue or inventory EPA's CA activities planned for each fiscal year.² CAPD contains an individual record for each CA activity that EPA plans. Some CA activities are new (commencing in a given fiscal year); others are ongoing (begun in a prior year). Using information entered in CAPD for FY 2002, EPA developed the report entitled, *Compliance Assistance Activity Plan Fiscal Year 2002: An Inventory of EPA Activities*. The *FY 2002 Plan* analyzes and highlights selected contents of CAPD as of February 12, 2002, and presents them in a printed form as a "snapshot" of the database.

In addition to a hardcopy of the *FY 2002 Plan*, CA providers, trade associations, regulated facilities, and the public can access portions of CAPD via EPA's National Compliance Assistance Clearinghouse (Clearinghouse). Portions of CAPD records are available from the Clearinghouse Home Page on the Internet at http://www.epa.gov/clearinghouse, under the "Planned and Ongoing Activities" tab. Records located here, a subset of all the CA information available through EPA's Clearinghouse, represent the "publicly available" portions of CAPD. Consult the Clearinghouse Home Page for more information on the entire contents of the Clearinghouse and its search features.

You can find records for "Planned and Ongoing Activities" under the tab of this name located at the top of the main Clearinghouse menu as shown in Image 1.



You can search CAPD records available for FY 2002 (or the previous year, FY 2001) in several ways: either by organization name (for each of 17 EPA organizations that submitted records) or by "Narrow Your Search" features described below.

If you highlight the organization (e.g., Office of Air and Radiation, Office of Water, Region 1, or Region 2) whose records you wish to view, you may then see and scroll through a brief summary of all the projects planned by that organization.

Alternatively you may search all the available CAPD records by using the "Narrow Your Search" features of the Clearinghouse. These features include: **Environmental Focus** (e.g., Air pollution, Pollution Prevention, Superfund), **Geographic Area** (e.g., Region 1, Rhode Island), **Compliance Assistance Tool Type** (e.g., Guidance Materials, Policy Documents), **Industrial Sector** (e.g., Agriculture, Chemicals, Construction), or a combination of these.



Those portions of an individual record from CAPD, available through the Clearinghouse, include the following: Project ID, Title, Description, Sector Addressed, Applicable Statute, Chemical/ Pollutant, Geographic Focus, Type of CA Activity, Environmental Focus, Contact Name, Contact Phone, Contact Office/Region, Contact E-mail address, and Contact Division.

General Steps to Access CAPD Records via the Clearinghouse³

- 1. Enter the URL (Uniform Resource Locator) or Internet Web address for the Clearinghouse: http://www.epa.gov/clearinghouse
- 2. Scroll to the subject tabs near the top of the Home Page for the Clearinghouse.
- 3. Click on tab >"Planned and Ongoing Activities"
- 4. Scroll in central text portion of the page to "Compliance Assistance Project Activities"
- 5. Click on the subject > "US EPA Projects"

- 6. Scroll in central text portion of the page.

APPENDIX D

This appendix presents 331 activities planned by EPA's 10 Regional Offices and identified for the *Compliance Assistance Plan FY 2002 (FY 2002 Plan)*. The activities are listed alphabetically by title for each region, beginning with Region 1 and ending with Region 10. The fields shown for each Regional activity are summarized briefly for quick reference. This table displays five fields: (1) Title, (2) Record ID #, (3) Sector, (4) Statute, and (5) Contact Information.

When reviewing this table, please note the following:

- 1. All of EPA's Regional Offices lead CA activities and provided information on the activities that will continue or commence in Fiscal Year 2002 (October 1, 2001 through September 30, 2002). This table contains 331 activities. This number does not necessarily capture all of the CA activities planned by EPA's Regional Offices.
- 2. Each Regional Office completed a series of data fields in CAPD. Some of the data fields in CAPD may not pertain to a given Regional activity and are therefore left blank. Differences in the interpretation of a particular data field may have created some inconsistencies in responses provided for a given activity. Where appropriate, information provided for the sector field has been modified in order to allow EPA to display the information consistently in this table.
- 3. "Record ID #" refers to the unique record number assigned to this activity in CAPD (e.g., 02-0215). The record # begins with "02" representing FY 2002. This number is useful as a cross-reference (but <u>not</u> as a search criterion) when you use other sources of information about a planned activity, such as Appendix E, or if you use EPA's National Compliance Assistance Clearinghouse (http://www.epa.gov/clearinghouse) as described in Appendix B of this Plan. When using these sources of information in conjunction with this table, you can save time by comparing the Record ID # provided for a given activity. This action ensures that you are looking at the same record and the same activity while using different sources of information.
- 4. "Sector" refers to the application of an activity to a particular industry, government, or public sector (including "tribe" and "federal facilities"). This data field offered a list of "sectors" from which to choose. Some activities may apply

to one specific sector or to more than one sector on the list. Where one sector is identified for this data field, the table shows that sector name. If more than one sector was selected, the data field shows the term "multiple." Other activities do not apply to specific sectors; rather, the activity is statute-specific, geographically-based, or otherwise cross-cutting in nature. This field may therefore read "N/A - not sector-specific" or "all sectors."

APPENDIX E

PLANNED COMPLIANCE ASSISTANCE ACTIVITIES FOR FY 2002 SORTED BY SECTOR

This appendix presents the entire inventory of 455 projects identified by EPA for the *Compliance Assistance Plan FY 2002 (FY 2002 Plan)*. The projects are listed alphabetically by sector and display eight fields: (1) Sector, (2) Title, (3) Record #, (4) Activity Description, (5) Statute, (6) Chemical/Pollutant, (7) Geographic Focus, and (8) Contact Information.

When reviewing this table, please note the following:

- 1. EPA offices that lead CA activities provided information on the activities that will continue or commence in Fiscal Year 2002 (October 1, 2001 through September 30, 2002). This is the second year in which EPA has collected this type of information. Although the database contains 455 activities, this number does not necessarily capture all of EPA's CA efforts.
- 2. EPA offices that provided information about their CA activities completed a series of data fields in CAPD. Some of the data fields in CAPD may not pertain to a given activity and are therefore left blank. Differences in interpretation of a particular data field may have created some inconsistencies in responses provided for a given activity. Where appropriate, information provided for the sector and chemical/pollutant fields has been modified in order to allow EPA to display the information consistently in this table.
- 3. "Sector" refers to the application of an activity to a particular industry, government or public sector (including "tribe" and "federal facilities"). This data field offered a list of "sectors" from which to choose. Some activities may apply to one specific sector or to more than one sector on the list. Where one sector is identified for this data field, the table shows that sector name. If more than one sector was selected, the data field shows the term "multiple." Other activities do not apply to specific sectors; rather, the activity is statute-specific, geographically-based, or otherwise cross-cutting in nature. This field may therefore read "N/A not sector-specific" or "all sectors."
- 4. "Chemical/Pollutant" refers to the chemical or pollutant that an activity addresses. This data field offered a list of categories from which to choose (e.g., Air Pollutants CFC and other ozone depleters, Air Pollutants criteria air pollutants, Water Pollutants nutrients, etc.). Some activities do not address a chemical or pollutant category; hence, this field would be left blank; some

- activities may address more than one chemical or pollutant. Where chemicals/pollutants are identified for this data field, they are shown in the table. "N/D" in this column means "no data provided."
- 5. "Geographic Focus" means the geographic area (e.g., EPA Region 1 or EPA Region 9 or national) or a geopolitical unit (e.g., a given state or states) to which the CA activity applies.
