Kevin's Corner

A new product we are looking at called SONO-Board 3D is truly remarkable. It is absolutely nontoxic in terms of its incremental formaldehyde emissions, 100% recycled content and is entirely recyclable. Not many recycled products can claim that. "What is it?" you say. It is basically a substitute for many traditional wood non-structural applications. It is made of a slurry of recycled paper and other natural cellulose fibers which are molded under high pressure. It is incredibly hard - which seems impossible because it is so light - due to its multi-faceted, honeycomb profile. And unlike many traditional wood products, it can be molded in a wide range of thicknesses and rib configurations. It can even assume the shapes of curves and vaults. One of the uses that intrigues me is as an environmentally responsible countertop. Most affordable countertops are full of formaldehyde and other bad things. Not this one. Take a look at the images below and you will see what I mean. One of the examples is linoleum which Starbucks is using widely for its counters. We plan to pilot linoleum on SONOBoard (with non-toxic glue) in some upcoming projects!

A new Benefit for Federal Employees - Pre Tax Dependent Care Spending Accounts

An open season for Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA), a brand new employee benefit, will be held from **May 19 through June 20, 2003.** An FSA allows you to set aside money, on a pre-tax basis, for health care and dependent care expenses. With an FSA, you can reduce your taxes while paying for services you would have to pay for anyway. Up to \$3,000 may be set aside for health care expenses and up to \$5,000 may be set aside for dependent care expenses. The initial plan year for the FSA program begins July 1 and will end on December 31, 2003. For all future years, the plan will be effective from January 1 - December 31.

All federal employees who are **eligible** for participation in the Federal Employees Health Benefits (FEHB) Program may enroll in the FSA program. **You do not have to be currently enrolled in the FEHB program.**

SHPS, one of the nation's largest FSA administrators, will assume full responsibility for the day-to-day administration of the FSA program. If you have questions and need to speak to a SHPS customer service representative, you should call SHPS toll-free at 1-877-FSAFEDS (1-877-372-3337). Customer service representatives will be available from 9:00 AM to 9:00 PM Eastern Time, Monday through Friday. **Associates must enroll directly with SHPS, either on-line or through the toll-free telephone number.** You may enroll on-line via the SHPS Web site at: www.fsafeds.com or by telephone at 1-877-FSAFEDS (1-877-372-3337).

Open seasons will be held each year at the same time as the Health Benefits Open Season. The next open season will be held from November 10 through December 8, 2003.

ATTENTION -

It is important to understand that Flexible Spending Accounts will have a "use-or-lose" provision - that is, Internal Revenue Service (IRS) rules will require associates to FORFEIT any funds they do not use by the end of the calendar year. This program, however, should still be a boon to those associates who have a good idea of what their average annual medical and day care expenses have been in the past and can therefore estimate how much they will probably spend in the future.



Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania Center Achieves 4 Star Quality

The East Mountain, SSA Child Care center has received a 4 star rating in the Pennsylvania Keystone Stars program. Keystone Stars recognizes child care providers who consistently excel in meeting or exceeding health and safety licensing regulations. The program is built on a four star rating system, with the highest level reflecting standards similar to the accreditation standards developed by NAEYC. The Keystone Stars program is a voluntary program and awards providers who meet the star requirements with financial merit awards. The amount varies by the size of the center and the star designation. The average award for a 2 star rating is \$9,600, \$13,000 for 3 stars and \$16,000 for a 4 star rating. Kudos to the East Mountain Child Care Center staff for all of their hard work.

Uncle Sam's Federal Child Care Center in Des Moines, IA has a new home. Forced to move out of the federal building due to major construction a new leased location was sought. The new building was completed in 93 days which included design and construction time. The building is approximately 8,000 SF. It is a two story building with infants, toddlers, and two year olds on the first floor, along with the office, kitchen, and a story time area. The preschool rooms, commons area, and staff lounge are on the 2nd floor. It has a storm shelter, pantry, and storage area in the basement, an elevator, and two staircases. The playground is 3,000 SF. The center is designed for 72 children. The center is operated by Bright Horizons.

The Courtyard Kids Child Development Center, located on the site of the new U.S. Courthouse and Federal Building in Central Islip, New York, opened its doors on February 3rd, 2003. The 7,000 square foot stand-alone center serves 66 children and is managed by Imagine Early

Learning Centers. The building is arranged so that each classroom exits into a beautiful protected playground that is keeping with the contemporary design of the center. One of the challenges of the design was to ensure its compatibility with the much-honored and very contemporary Courthouse.
