


GDP and Population of North America* in a Global Context

GDP of North America (Percentage of World GDP)






(Canada & United States, 2001)

North American Energy (Percentage of World Production an Consumption)





The PNWER and The Energy Council in the North American* Context

PNWER made up:

- ➤ Supply: 31% Crude Oil, 24% Natural Gas, 9% Coal, and 7% Electricity.
- ➤ Demand: 7% of Total Energy (2000)

The Energy Council made up:


- ➤ Supply: 60% Crude Oil, 71% Natural Gas, 47% Coal, and 24% of Electricity
- ➤ Demand: 25% Total Energy



Population of PNWER & The Energy Council (Percentage of North American Population)




GDP of PNWER & The Energy Council (Percentage of North American GDP)



PNWER & The Energy Council Energy Demand - Share of North America (2001)









U.S. Energy Exports to Canada




2001 and 2025

Total Energy Consumption in Canada and the United States


1970-2025


