HIGHLIGHTS

This report presents results from the 2003 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), an annual census of facilities providing substance abuse treatment. Conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), N-SSATS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcoholism and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. Selected findings are given below.

- ♦ The N-SSATS facility response rate in 2003 was 96 percent. Thirty-seven States or jurisdictions had response rates that equalled or surpassed the overall rate, and seven States or jurisdictions achieved response rates of 100 percent [Tables 1.1 and 6.1].
- ♦ A total of 13,623 facilities responded to the survey and reported a one-day census of 1,092,546 clients enrolled in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2003 [Tables 2.1 and 3.1].
- ♦ There were 92,251 clients under age 18 in treatment on March 31, 2003, making up 8 percent of the total population in treatment on that date [Table 3.5].

Trends in Facility and Client Characteristics

- ♦ The number of reporting facilities increased by 25 percent between 1997 and 2003, from 10,860 in 1997 to 13,623 in 2003. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by 18 percent over the same period, from 929,086 in 1997 to 1,092,546 in 2003 [Tables 2.1 and 3.1 and Figures 1 and 5]. These increases are most likely due to improved survey methodology rather than to actual increases in the numbers of facilities and clients. The principal improvements were an increase in the response rate from 86 percent in 1997 to 96 percent in 2003, and an extensive effort to improve the coverage of the facility universe.
- ◆ Facilities operated by private non-profit organizations made up 61 percent of all facilities on March 31, 2003, compared to 60 percent in 1997. Private for-profit facilities increased from 24 percent of all facilities in 1997 to 28 percent in 1998, then fell to between 25 and 26 percent from 1999 to 2003. Fluctuations in the proportion of private-for-profit facilities are probably because of SAMHSA's efforts to expand survey coverage to these facilities, followed by the decision to exclude solo practitioners that were not State agency-approved. There was little or no change in the proportions of government-operated facilities between 1997 and 2003 [Table 2.1 and Figure 1].
- On March 31, 2003, 56 percent of all clients in treatment were in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations, compared with 55 percent of all clients in 1997. The proportion of clients in private

for-profit facilities increased from 18 percent in 1997 to 26 percent on March 31, 2003. The proportions of clients in government-operated facilities fell or was unchanged between 1997 and 2003 [Table 3.1 and Figure 5].

- ◆ Eighty-nine percent of all clients in treatment on March 31, 2003, were in outpatient treatment, 10 percent were in non-hospital residential treatment, and 1 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment. In 1997, 87 percent of all clients were in outpatient treatment, 11 percent were in non-hospital residential treatment, and 2 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment [Table 3.2 and Figure 6].
- ♦ The number and proportion of clients receiving methadone/LAAM increased from 138,009 (15 percent of all clients) in 1997 to 229,567 clients (21 percent of all clients) in 2003 [Table 3.2 and Figure 6].
- ♦ Over half (51 percent) of all facilities had managed care agreements or contracts in 2003, compared to 46 percent in 1997. Trends in the proportion of clients in facilities with agreements or contracts with managed care organizations were grossly similar to those for the proportion of facilities with such agreements or contracts. On March 31, 2003, 52 percent of all clients were in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts, compared to 47 percent of all clients in 1997 [Tables 2.3 and 3.4 and Figures 3 and 7].
- ♦ The proportion of clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse increased from 41 percent in 1997 to 47 percent in 2003. The proportion of clients treated for drug abuse only remained between 27 and 33 percent from 1997 to 2003. The proportion of clients treated for alcohol abuse only declined from 26 percent in 1997 to 20 percent in 2003 [Table 3.3].

Clients under Age 18

- On March 31, 2003, there were 92,251 clients under age 18 in treatment. These represented 8 percent of all clients. The proportion of clients under age 18 was relatively stable between 1997 and 2003 [Table 3.5 and Figure 8].
- ♦ The majority of clients under age 18 were in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents. On March 31, 2003, 78,330 clients under age 18 (85 percent of all clients under age 18) were in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents [Table 3.5].

Facility Operation

♦ On March 31, 2003, there were 615,410 clients (56 percent of all clients in treatment) in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations, which made up 61 percent of all facilities. Private for-profit organizations reported 282,161 clients (26 percent of all clients), and made up 25 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by local governments accounted for 101,826 clients (9 percent of all clients), and made up 7 percent of all facilities. State government-operated facilities reported 45,649 (4 percent of all clients), and made up 4 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by the Federal government accounted for 37,155 clients (3 percent of all clients), and made up 3 percent of all facilities [Tables 4.1 and 5.1].

Primary Focus

♦ On March 31, 2003, 61 percent of facilities (with 68 percent of all clients in treatment) reported that providing substance abuse treatment services was their primary focus of activity. A mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services was the primary focus of 26 percent of facilities, treating 23 percent of clients. Nine percent of facilities, with 5 percent of all clients, reported the provision of mental health services as their primary focus. General health care was the primary focus of 2 percent of facilities, treating 2 percent of clients [Tables 4.1 and 5.1].

Type of Care

♦ There were 968,719 clients (89 percent of all clients) in outpatient treatment on March 31, 2003, which was offered by 80 percent of all facilities. There were 108,592 clients (10 percent of all clients) in non-hospital residential treatment on March 31, 2003, which was offered by 28 percent of all facilities. There were 15,235 clients (1 percent of all clients) in hospital inpatient treatment on March 31, 2003, which was offered by 7 percent of all facilities [Tables 4.2b and 5.2b].

Client Substance Abuse Problem

- On March 31, 2003, nearly half (47 percent) of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse. One-third (33 percent) of clients were in treatment for drug abuse only, and 20 percent were in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone [Table 5.3].
- ♦ Nationwide, there were 454 clients in treatment per 100,000 population age 18 and older on March 31, 2003. The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug problems (209 per 100,000), followed by drug abuse only (152 per 100,000), and alcohol abuse only (93 per 100,000) [Table 6.27].

Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs)

- Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) were available at 8 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities on March 31, 2003 and accounted for 21 percent of all clients in treatment [Tables 2.2 and 3.2].
- Private for-profit facilities operated 42 percent of all OTPs, although they operated only 25 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities [Tables 4.1 and 4.4].
- Outpatient detoxification was most likely to be offered by facilities operated by the Federal government (40 percent), largely because half (50 percent) of facilities operated by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) provided outpatient detoxification. Outpatient detoxification was also relatively widely available in private for-profit facilities (17 percent) [Table 4.2b].
- Outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance was most likely to be offered by private for-profit facilities (13 percent) and facilities operated by the Federal government (12 percent) [Table 4.2b].
- ◆ Facilities with OTPs were likely to be dedicated entirely or almost entirely to treatment with methadone or LAAM. Overall, 85 percent of clients in facilities with OTPs were receiving methadone or LAAM on March 31, 2003 [Table 4.4].

Facility Size

◆ The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility on March 31, 2003, was 40. Government-operated facilities were generally larger than private for-profit or private non-profit facilities [Table 4.5].

Facility Capacity and Utilization Rates

- On March 31, 2003, 94 percent of all non-hospital residential beds and 80 percent of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use [Tables 4.7 and 4.8].
- ♦ Facilities with non-hospital residential beds had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with hospital inpatient beds. Fifty-six percent of facilities with non-hospital residential beds had utilization rates of 91 to 100 percent, while only 29 percent of facilities with hospital inpatient beds had utilization

rates in that range. About 12 percent of hospital inpatient facilities and 8 percent of non-hospital residential facilities had utilization rates over 100 percent [Tables 4.7 and 4.8].

Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types

♦ Most facilities (84 percent) offered specially designed programs or groups directed at specific client types. Special programs or groups for women and for clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders were each reported by 35 percent of facilities. One-third of facilities offered special programs for DUI/DWI offenders (33 percent) and for adolescent clients (32 percent). Twenty-seven percent of facilities offered special programs or groups for men and for criminal justice clients. Less frequently offered were programs or groups for pregnant or postpartum women (14 percent), persons with HIV or AIDS (11 percent), seniors or older adults (7 percent), and gays or lesbians (6 percent) [Table 4.10b].

Services in Sign Language and in Languages Other than English

- ♦ Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired were offered in 28 percent of all facilities [Table 4.13].
- ♦ Substance abuse treatment services in a language other than English were provided in 44 percent of all facilities. Spanish was the most commonly reported language, with treatment services in Spanish offered by 40 percent of all facilities [Table 4.13].
- ◆ Treatment services in American Indian/Alaska Native languages were offered in 2 percent of facilities overall. However, 50 percent of facilities operated by the Indian Health Service and 36 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments offered these services [Table 4.13].

Payment Options

♦ A sliding fee scale for substance abuse treatment charges was used by 64 percent of all facilities. More than half (55 percent) of all facilities offered treatment at no charge to eligible clients who could not pay, and 4 percent provided treatment at no charge to all clients [Table 4.14b].

Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

Overall, 95 percent of all facilities reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or more agencies or organizations. Most facilities (81 percent) named the State substance abuse agency, 34 percent listed the State mental health department, and 32 percent listed the State public health department/board of health [Table 4.15b].

Facility Funding

♦ Two-thirds (66 percent) of all facilities received Federal, State, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment services [Table 4.16].

Client Outreach

- One-quarter (25 percent) of all facilities reported that they operated a hotline responding to substance abuse problems [Table 4.17].
- Most facilities (89 percent) reported that they had access to the Internet. Half of all facilities (50 percent) had web sites providing information about their substance abuse treatment programs [Table 4.17].

CHAPTER 1

DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES (N-SSATS)

This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 2003 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), conducted between March and October 2003, with a reference date of March 31, 2003. It is the 26th in a series of national surveys begun in the 1970s designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and utilization of alcohol and drug treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. The Office of Applied Studies, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, plans and directs N-SSATS.

N-SSATS is designed to collect information from all facilities² in the United States, both public and private, that provide substance abuse treatment. (Additional information on N-SSATS, its history, and changes in the survey and survey universe over time is provided in Appendix C.)

N-SSATS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the U.S. substance abuse treatment delivery system. The objectives of N-SSATS are to collect multipurpose data that can be used to—

- assist SAMHSA and State and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services provided in State-supported and other treatment facilities and in forecasting treatment resource requirements;
- update SAMHSA's Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), which includes all known drug and alcohol abuse treatment facilities (see Appendix C);
- analyze treatment services trends and conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and States;
- generate the National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs, a compendium of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment; and
- update the information in SAMHSA's Substance Abuse Treatment Facility Locator, a searchable database of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment. The Treatment Facility Locator is available on the Internet at:

- ¹ The jurisdictions include the territory of Guam, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of Palau, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands of the United States.
- In this report, entities responding to N-SSATS are referred to as "facilities." As discussed later in the report, a "facility" may be a program-level, clinic-level, or multisite respondent.

Data Collection Procedures for the 2003 N-SSATS

Field period and reference date

The field period for the 2003 N-SSATS ran from March 2003 through October 2003, with a reference date of March 31, 2003.

Survey coverage

The 2003 N-SSATS facility universe included all 17,787 active facilities on SAMHSA's I-SATS at a point 6 weeks prior to the survey reference date. Facilities added by State substance abuse agencies or discovered during the first 8 weeks of the survey were also included in the survey.

Content

The 2003 N-SSATS survey instrument was a 10-page document with 37 numbered questions. (See Appendix A.) Topics included:

- ◆ Facility identification information
- Facility focus (substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, general health care, other)
- Facility operation (private for-profit; private non-profit; government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; tribal)
- ♦ Hotline operation
- Services offered (assessment services, substance abuse therapy and counseling, pharmacotherapies, testing, transitional services, other services)
- Operation of an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) certified by the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), SAMHSA
- Services in sign language for the hearing impaired
- ♦ Services in languages other than English

- Types of clients accepted into treatment (adolescents, clients with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders, criminal justice clients, persons with HIV or AIDS, gays or lesbians, seniors or older adults, pregnant or postpartum women, women, men, DUI/DWI offenders, other)
- Special programs or groups offered for specific types of clients (adolescents, clients with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders, criminal justice clients, persons with HIV or AIDS, gays or lesbians, seniors or older adults, pregnant or postpartum women, women, men, DUI/DWI offenders, other)
- ♦ Types of treatment provided
 - Hospital inpatient (detoxification, treatment)
 - Non-hospital residential (detoxification; short-term, i.e., 30 days or less; longterm, i.e., more than 30 days)
 - Outpatient (detoxification, methadone or LAAM maintenance, day treatment or partial hospitalization, intensive, regular)
- ♦ Payment options
- Receipt of public funding for substance abuse treatment programs
- ♦ Managed care participation
- Number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2003 (total, clients under age 18, clients receiving methadone or LAAM)
- Number of beds designated for non-hospital residential and hospital inpatient substance abuse treatment
- Client substance abuse problem treated
- Facility licensure, certification, or accreditation
- Facility Internet access and web site availability

Data collection

Six weeks before the survey, letters were mailed to all facilities to alert them to expect the survey. An additional benefit of the letters was to update records with new address information returned from the post office. On the survey reference date, data collection packets, including the questionnaire, SAMHSA cover letter, State-specific letter of endorsement, information on completing the survey on the Internet, and a sheet of *Frequently Asked Questions*, were mailed to each facility. During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Support in responding to questions for those facilities completing the questionnaire over the Internet was also available. Four to 5 weeks after the initial

questionnaire mailing, thank you/reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Approximately 8 weeks after the initial questionnaire mailing, non-responding facilities were sent a second questionnaire mailing. About 4 to 5 weeks after the second questionnaire mailing, non-respondents received a reminder telephone call. Those facilities that had not responded within 2 to 3 weeks of the reminder call were telephoned and asked to complete the survey by telephone. The overall response rate was 96 percent.

Forms accounting and response rate

Summary response rate information is presented in Table 1.1. Questionnaires were mailed to a total of 17,787 facilities believed to offer substance abuse treatment services. Of these facilities, 15 percent were found to be ineligible for the survey because they had closed or did not provide substance abuse treatment or detoxification on March 31, 2003. Of the remaining 15,124 facilities, 96 percent completed the survey.

Exclusions

Of the 14,503 survey respondents, 398 facilities provided information but were deemed out of the scope of this report and were excluded from the analyses presented here. The excluded facilities fell into three categories:

- ♦ 148 excluded facilities were halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment. These facilities were included in the survey so that they could be listed in the Directory and on the Treatment Facility Locator, but were excluded from the analyses in this report.
- 130 excluded facilities were jails, prisons, or other organizations that treated incarcerated clients exclusively.
- 120 excluded facilities were solo practitioners.
 I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed and surveyed only if the State substance abuse agency explicitly requests that

they be included. The excluded solo practitioners had not been identified for inclusion by the State substance abuse agency.

An additional 482 facilities whose client counts were included in or "rolled into" other facilities' counts and whose facility characteristics were not reported separately were also excluded from facility counts in this report. However, their client counts are included.

After allowing for the exclusion of 398 out-of-scope facilities and 482 rolled-up facilities, there were 13,623 eligible respondent facilities included in the 2003 N-SSATS report.

Number of respondents reporting facility and client data

Table 1.2. There were a total of 13,623 eligible respondents to the 2003 N-SSATS. The breakdown of these respondents with respect to their reporting of facility data and client counts is summarized below.

♦ 11,939 facilities reported both facility data and client counts for their own organizations.

- ♦ 676 facilities reported facility characteristics for their own facility and provided client counts for their own facility and for other facilities. These 676 facilities reported client counts for a total of 1,421 facilities, including themselves.
- 1,008 facilities reported facility characteristics only. Their client counts were reported by another facility.

Quality assurance

All mail questionnaires were reviewed manually for consistency and for missing data. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. These incorporated the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks and checks for data outliers not readily implemented by manual review. Calls were made to facilities to clarify questionable responses and to obtain missing data.

If facilities could not be reached during the edit callbacks, responses that were clearly in error were replaced by imputation.

The Internet questionnaire was programmed to be self-editing, that is, respondents were prompted to

complete missing responses and to confirm or correct inconsistent responses.

Item non-response

Careful editing and extensive follow-up have minimized item non-response. (See Appendix B.) Although there were instances of non-response in most data items, item non-response was generally low, only 1 to 3 percent for most items. An exception was the question on payment types accepted by the facility, where non-response rates ranged from 1 to 12 percent for the various response categories.

Missing data for client count variables (e.g., the number of clients in hospital inpatient, non-hospital residential, and outpatient treatment) were imputed. For the remaining unimputed variables, facilities with missing values for a given variable were excluded from the tabulations using that variable. As a result, the number of treatment facilities on which tables are based may vary somewhat from table to table. The number of facilities actually reporting data is generally included on each table.

Methodology of Imputation of Missing Client Counts

A total of 114 facilities were missing one-day census client count values for one or more types of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient treatment, non-hospital residential detoxification, etc.). A facility was given imputed values for a type of service if it reported that it provided the service but had not provided client counts for that service type. For example, if a facility reported that it provided hospital inpatient services and outpatient services, but not non-hospital residential services, client values were imputed for the hospital inpatient and outpatient variables only. Missing values for the number of clients under age 18 and the number of hospital inpatient beds and/or non-hospital residential beds were not imputed.

When available, client values from the 2002 N-SSATS were used to impute the missing client

counts on the 2003 N-SSATS. In all other cases, the average client value, stratified by State and facility operation, was used to impute the missing client counts. If a facility were unique in its State and facility operation category, values were imputed using average values for the State only. Client counts were imputed for each type of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient treatment, non-hospital residential detoxification, etc.) and summed to the larger service type totals (total hospital inpatient clients, total non-hospital residential clients, and total outpatient clients), and finally to total clients.

Further Data Considerations and Limitations

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2003 N-SSATS. Some general issues are listed below, and other considerations are detailed in Appendix C. Considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- ♦ N-SSATS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There is no adjustment for the approximately 4 percent facility non-response.
- N-SSATS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts reported here do not represent annual totals. Rather, N-SSATS provides a "snapshot" of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.
- Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

Organization of the Report

The balance of this report is organized into five analytic sections. Chapter 2 presents broad trends in facility characteristics for 1997 to 2003. Chapter 3 presents broad trends in client characteristics for 1997 to 2003. Chapter 4 describes key characteristics of facilities and the programs and services they provide. Chapter 5 describes key characteristics of clients in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2003. Finally, Chapter 6 presents State-level detail for most of the tables presented in Chapters 4 and 5.

Terminology

The majority of tables in the report are organized according to facility operation and the primary focus of the facility, and present data on the characteristics of facilities and clients in treatment at these facilities. Therefore, it is important to define these terms.

Facility operation indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit; private non-profit; or government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal.

Primary focus indicates the services the facility primarily provides: substance abuse treatment services; mental health services; a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services; general health care; or other.

Clients in treatment were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and non-hospital residential clients receiving substance abuse services at the facility on March 31, 2003; and 2) outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detox service at least once during the month of March 2003, and who were still enrolled in treatment as of March 31, 2003.

CHAPTER 2

TRENDS IN FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in facility characteristics for 1997 to 2003. It should be kept in mind, however, that the facility universe, methods, and survey instrument have changed during this period. These changes are detailed in Appendix C.

number of facilities. The principal improvements were an increase in the response rate from 86 percent in 1997 to 96 percent in 2003, and an extensive effort to improve the coverage of the facility universe. (See Appendix C).

Number of Facilities

Table 2.1. The number of reporting facilities increased by 25 percent between 1997 and 2003, from 10,860 in 1997 to 13,623 in 2003. The increase is most likely due to improved survey methodology rather than to an actual increase in the

Facility Operation

Table 2.1 and Figure 1. Facilities are described in terms of operation, that is, the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit; private non-profit; or government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal.




Despite year-to-year fluctuations in the number of facilities reporting, the operational structure of the treatment system (as reflected in the N-SSATS facility operation data) changed very little from 1997 to 2003.

Facilities operated by private non-profit organizations made up the bulk of the system (61 percent of all facilities) on March 31, 2003, compared to 60 percent in 1997. Private for-profit facilities increased from 24 percent of all facilities in 1997 to 28 percent in 1998, then fell to between 25 and 26 percent from 1999 through 2003. Fluctuations in the proportion of private-for-profit facilities are probably because of SAMHSA's efforts to expand survey coverage to these facilities, followed by the decision to exclude solo practitioners that were not State agency-approved. Facilities operated by local governments accounted for 8 percent of all facilities in 2003 and 7 percent in 1997. The proportions

of facilities operated by State, Federal, and tribal governments remained unchanged between 1997 and 2003, at 4 percent, 3 percent, and 1 percent, respectively.

Type of Care Offered

Table 2.2 and Figure 2. The major types of care offered by facilities—outpatient, non-hospital residential, and hospital inpatient—remained relatively stable between 1997 and 2003. On March 31, 2003, 80 percent of all facilities offered outpatient treatment, 28 percent offered non-hospital residential treatment, and 7 percent offered hospital inpatient treatment. (Percents sum to more than 100 percent because a facility could offer more than one type of care.) In 1997, in comparison, 78 percent of all facilities offered outpatient treatment, 28 percent offered non-hospital residential treatment, and 10 percent offered hospital inpatient treatment.

Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs

Table 2.2 and Figure 2. In 2003, a total of 1,067 facilities (8 percent of all facilities) reported that they dispensed methadone or levo-alpha acetyl methadol (LAAM) as part of an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) certified by the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), SAMHSA. Prior to May 18, 2001, such programs required approval by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Through 2000, the survey counted all facilities reporting that they dispensed methadone or LAAM. In 2002 and 2003, only those facilities that were certified as OTPs by CSAT, SAMHSA, were included.

Table 2.3 and Figure 3. In general, the term "managed care" refers to the prepaid health care sector (e.g., HMOs) where care is provided under a fixed budget within which costs are "managed." Fifty-

one percent of facilities had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations in 2003, compared to 46 percent in 1997. The percentage of facilities with managed care agreements or contracts generally fell between 1997 and 1998, but increased between 1998 and 1999 for all facility operation categories. Between 1999 and 2003, however, the proportion of facilities with managed care agreements or contracts generally stabilized or declined slightly. Private non-profit and private for-profit facilities had the highest proportion of facilities with managed care agreements or contracts on March 31, 2003, at 54 percent and 53 percent, respectively. Among local and State government-operated facilities, 41 percent and 38 percent, respectively, had managed care agreements or contracts. Facilities operated by Federal or tribal governments were least likely to have agreements or contracts with managed care organizations, at 19 percent and 21 percent, respectively.

Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types

Table 2.4 and Figure 4. Facilities may offer treatment programs or groups designed to address the specific needs of certain client types. These client types include adolescents, clients with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders, persons with HIV or AIDS, gays or lesbians, seniors or older adults, pregnant or postpartum women, women, and men. Data on programs or groups for adolescents, clients with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders, persons with HIV or AIDS, and pregnant or postpartum women have been collected since 1997. A question on the provision of programs or groups for women was added in 1998, and questions on programs or groups for gays or

lesbians, seniors or older adults, and men were added in 2000.

In response to concerns about over-reporting of special programs or groups, the question was revised in the 2003 survey to distinguish between those facilities that accepted specific client types and those facilities that had specially designed programs or groups for that client type. As a consequence, the number and proportion of facilities offering programs or groups for each of the specified client types decreased in 2003. The numbers from the 2003 survey are believed to be a more accurate representation of the number of facilities providing special programs for the specific client types.



Special programs or groups for women and for clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders were each reported by 35 percent of facilities. One-third of facilities offered special programs for DUI/DWI offenders (33 percent) and for adolescent clients (32 percent). Twenty-seven percent of facilities offered special programs or groups for men and for criminal justice clients. Less frequently offered were programs or groups for pregnant or postpartum women (14 percent of facilities), persons with HIV or AIDS (11 percent of facilities), seniors or older adults (7 percent of facilities), and gays or lesbians (6 percent of facilities).

CHAPTER 3

TRENDS IN CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in client characteristics for 1997 to 2003. It should be kept in mind, however, that the facility universe, methods, and survey instrument have changed during this period. These changes are detailed in Appendix C.


actual increase in the number of clients. The principal improvements were an increase in the survey response rate from 86 percent in 1997 to 96 percent in 2003, and an extensive effort to improve the coverage of the facility universe (see Appendix C).


Number of Clients

Table 3.1. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by 18 percent between 1997 and 2003, from 929,086 in 1997 to 1,092,546 in 2003. The increase is most likely due to improved survey methodology rather than to an

Facility Operation

Table 3.1 and Figure 5. On March 31, 2003, there were 615,410 clients (56 percent of all clients in treatment) in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations, compared with 510,680 clients (55 percent of all clients) in 1997. The number of





clients in private for-profit facilities increased from 168,106 (18 percent of all clients) in 1997 to 282,161 (26 percent of all clients) on March 31, 2003. The proportions of clients in government-operated facilities fell between 1997 and 2003—from 13 percent to 9 percent for local government-operated facilities; from 7 percent to 4 percent for State government-operated facilities, and from 5 percent to 3 percent for Federal government-operated facilities. The proportion of clients in tribal government-operated facilities remained constant, at 1 percent.


Type of Care Received

Table 3.2 and Figure 6. The proportions of clients in treatment for the major types of care—outpatient, non-hospital residential, and hospital inpatient—remained relatively stable between 1997 and 2003. There were 968,719 clients (89 percent

of all clients) in outpatient treatment on March 31, 2003, compared to 808,956 (87 percent of all clients) in 1997. There were 108,592 clients (10 percent of all clients) in non-hospital residential treatment on March 31, 2003, compared to 103,750 (11 percent of all clients) in 1997. There were 15,235 clients (1 percent of all clients) in hospital inpatient treatment on March 31, 2003, compared to 16,380 (2 percent of all clients) in 1997.

Clients Receiving Methadone/LAAM

Table 3.2 and Figure 6. The number and proportion of clients receiving methadone/LAAM increased from 138,009 (15 percent of all clients) in 1997 to 229,567 clients (21 percent of all clients) in 2003. Clients receiving methadone/LAAM could be in any type of care.

Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 3.3. The proportion of clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse increased from 41 percent in 1997 to 47 percent in 2003. The proportion of clients treated for drug abuse only remained between 27 and 33 percent from 1997 to 2003. The proportion of clients treated for alcohol abuse only declined from 26 percent in 1997 to 20 percent in 2003.

Managed Care

Table 3.4 and Figure 7. In general, the term "managed care" refers to the prepaid health care sector (e.g., HMOs) where care is provided under a fixed budget within which costs are "managed." The trends in the proportion of clients in facilities with agreements or contracts with managed care organizations were grossly similar to those for the proportion of facilities with such agreements or

contracts [Table 2.3]. On March 31, 2003, 52 percent of all clients were in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts, and 51 percent of facilities had such agreements or contracts. This represented an increase from 1997, when 47 percent of all clients were in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts, and 46 percent of facilities had such agreements or contracts. The percentage of clients in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts increased between 1997 and 2000 for all facility operation categories. Between 2000 and 2003, however, the proportion of clients in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts generally stabilized or declined slightly. Private non-profit facilities had the highest proportion of clients in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts on March 31, 2003, at 59 percent. Among private for-profit, State, and local government-operated facilities, 46 percent, 45 percent, and 41 percent, respectively, of clients were

in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts on March 31, 2003. In facilities operated by tribal governments, 34 percent of clients were in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts. Facilities operated by Federal governments had the lowest proportion of clients in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts, at 16 percent on March 31, 2003.

Clients under Age 18 in Treatment

Table 3.5 and Figure 8. On March 31, 2003, there were 92,251 clients under age 18 in treatment. These represented 8 percent of all clients. The proportion of clients under age 18 was relatively stable between 1997 and 2003.

The majority of clients under age 18 were in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents. On March 31, 2003, 78,330 clients under age 18 (85 percent of all clients under age 18) were in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents. The proportion of clients under age 18 in facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents fluctuated between 1997 and 2003, from a low of 80 percent in 1998 to a high of 90 percent in 2002.

Clients under Age 18 and Clients under Age 18 in Treatment Facilities with Special Programs or Groups for Adolescents: 1997-2003



CHAPTER 4

FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter describes key characteristics of facilities and programs in 2003. Facilities are described in terms of operation, that is, the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit; private non-profit; or government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal. They are also described in terms of the facility's primary focus: substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, general health care, and other.

Facility Operation and Primary Focus

Table 4.1. Overall, 61 percent of facilities reported that providing substance abuse treatment services was their primary focus of activity. Slightly more than one-quarter (26 percent) of all facilities considered a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services to be their primary focus. Nine percent of all facilities reported the provision of mental health services as their primary focus, while 2 percent focused on general health care.

Private organizations were most likely to regard provision of substance abuse treatment services as their primary focus (64 percent of for-profit organizations and 62 percent of non-profit organizations, compared with 50 to 60 percent of government-operated facilities). State, local, and tribal government-operated facilities had higher proportions of facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, about one-third of facilities at each level of government, compared with 27 percent of private for-profit facilities and 25 percent of private non-profit and Federal government-operated facilities. The Federal government had the largest proportion of

facilities (19 percent) that reported a general health care focus. The large number of facilities operated by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) greatly influenced this—among facilities operated by the VA, most of which are hospital-based, ¹ 29 percent reported a focus on general health care.

Type of Care Offered

Tables 4.2a and 4.2b. Outpatient treatment was the most widely available type of care, offered by 80 percent of all facilities. Outpatient treatment was most likely to be available in facilities operated by the Federal government (96 percent), private forprofit organizations and facilities operated by tribal governments (91 percent each), and facilities operated by local governments (88 percent). Outpatient services were most likely to be available in facilities providing a mix of mental heath and substance treatment services, at 90 percent.

Regular and intensive outpatient care were offered by 73 percent and 43 percent of all facilities, respectively. Sixteen percent of all facilities provided outpatient day treatment or partial hospitalization programs.

Outpatient detoxification was offered at 11 percent of facilities. Outpatient detoxification was most likely to be offered by facilities operated by the Federal government (40 percent), largely because half (50 percent) of VA-operated facilities provided outpatient detoxification. Outpatient detoxification was also relatively widely available in private for-profit organizations (17 percent).

Outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance was offered at 7 percent of facilities. Outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance was most likely to be offered by facilities operated by private for-profit organizations (13 percent). Outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance was also relatively widely available in facilities operated by the Federal government (12 percent), largely because 20 percent of VA-operated facilities provided outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance.

Non-hospital residential treatment was offered by 28 percent of all facilities. Non-hospital residential treatment was most likely to be available in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations (36 percent of these facilities), and in facilities focusing on the provision of substance abuse treatment services (36 percent).

Non-hospital residential long-term treatment (more than 30 days) was offered by 23 percent of facilities. Twelve percent offered non-hospital residential short-term care (30 days or less), and 7 percent offered non-hospital residential detoxification.

Hospital inpatient treatment was offered by 7 percent of facilities. Hospital inpatient treatment was most likely to be available in facilities operated by Federal and State governments (21 percent and 14 percent, respectively). Hospital inpatient treatment was available at 44 percent of facilities with a general health care focus, and at 15 percent of facilities focused on the provision of mental health services.

Hospital inpatient detoxification was offered by 7 percent of all facilities, and hospital inpatient treatment by 5 percent of all facilities.

Client Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 4.3. Almost all facilities (93 percent) had clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse on March 31, 2003. Over three-quarters had clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone (79 percent) and for abuse of drugs alone (78 percent). These proportions were relatively constant across

facility operation categories and by the primary focus of the facility.

Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs)


Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) are certified by the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), SAMHSA, to use the opioids methadone or LAAM in the treatment of narcotic addiction. Prior to May 18, 2001, such programs required approval by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

Table 4.4. OTPs were available at 8 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities on March 31, 2003 [Table 2.2]. Private for-profit facilities operated 42 percent of all OTPs, although they operated only 25 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities [Table 4.1]. Over half (55 percent) of all OTPs provided both maintenance and detoxification. Thirty-four percent provided maintenance only, and 12 percent provided detoxification only.

Facilities with OTPs were likely to be dedicated entirely or almost entirely to treatment with methadone or LAAM. Overall, 85 percent of clients in facilities with OTPs were receiving methadone or LAAM on March 31, 2003. This proportion was highest (94 percent) in private for-profit facilities and in facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services (89 percent).

Facility Size

Table 4.5. The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility on March 31, 2003, was 40. Facility size varied by type of care offered. In facilities offering outpatient care, the median number of clients was 45. However, this represented a range by type of outpatient care, from a median of 1 client in outpatient detoxification to 28 clients in regular outpatient care and 185 clients receiving outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance. In facilities offering non-hospital residential care, the median number of clients in treatment on

March 31, 2003, was 18. In hospital inpatient facilities, the median number of clients was 9.

Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), 2003.

Government-operated facilities were generally larger than private for-profit or private non-profit facilities. Facilities operated by the Federal government had a median of 54 clients in treatment on March 31, 2003. This was due to the large number of clients in treatment at VA facilities, which had a median of 92 clients in treatment on that date.

The median number of clients also varied according to primary focus of the facility. In facilities with a primary focus on the provision of substance abuse treatment services, the median number of clients in treatment was 45. In contrast, facilities focused on the provision of mental health services had a median of 22 clients in treatment.

Table 4.6. Facilities with a primary focus on the provision of substance abuse treatment services tended to be larger than other facilities. Some 22 percent of these facilities had 120 or more clients in

treatment on March 31, 2003. In contrast, only 8 percent of facilities focused on the provision of mental health services were that large, and 37 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment on that date. Facilities with a general health care focus also tended to be smaller, with 37 percent having fewer than 15 clients in treatment on March 31, 2003.

Facility Capacity and Utilization Rates

Facilities were asked to report non-hospital residential and hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. Utilization rates were calculated by dividing the number of non-hospital residential or hospital inpatient clients by the number of non-hospital residential or hospital inpatient designated beds. Because substance abuse treatment clients may also occupy non-designated beds, utilization rates may be more than 100 percent.

Table 4.7. Some 3,526 facilities reported having 110,772 non-hospital residential beds designated

for substance abuse treatment. On March 31, 2003, 94 percent of all non-hospital residential beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use. Utilization rates ranged from 89 percent in non-hospital residential facilities operated by private for-profit organizations and tribal governments to 109 percent in non-hospital residential facilities operated by State governments.

Table 4.8. Some 888 facilities reported having 13,830 hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. On March 31, 2003, 80 percent of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use.² Utilization rates ranged from 72 percent in hospital inpatient facilities operated by local governments to 233 percent in hospital inpatient facilities operated by tribal governments. Facilities focused on the provision of mental health services had a utilization rate of 94 percent, well above the overall utilization rate of 80 percent.

Figure 9 and Tables 4.7 and 4.8 show the distribution of the facility-level utilization rates separately for non-hospital residential and hospital inpatient beds. Facilities with non-hospital residential beds had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with hospital inpatient beds. Fifty-six percent of facilities with non-hospital residential beds had utilization rates of 91 to 100 percent. Only 29 percent of facilities with hospital inpatient beds had utilization rates in that range, and 25 percent had utilization rates of 50 percent or less. About 12 percent of hospital inpatient facilities and 8 percent of non-hospital residential facilities had utilization rates over 100 percent.

Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types

Facilities may offer treatment programs or groups designed to address the specific needs of specific client types. These client types include adolescents, clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders, persons with HIV or AIDS, gays or lesbians, and pregnant or postpartum women. Special programs or groups may also be offered for women, for men, and for seniors or older adults. Many facilities offer treatment for persons arrested while driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DUI) or driving while intoxicated (DWI), as well as for other criminal justice clients.

In response to concerns about over-reporting of special programs or groups, the survey question was revised in 2003 to distinguish between those facilities that accepted specific client types and those facilities that had specially designed programs or groups for each client type. Although the number and proportion of facilities offering programs or groups for each of the specified client types decreased in 2003 in comparison with previous years, the numbers from the 2003 survey are believed to be a more accurate representation of the number of facilities providing special programs for the specific client types.

Tables 4.9a and 4.9b. These tables indicate the proportions of facilities that accept each client type into treatment. Most facilities accepted most client types. Acceptance ranged from 82 percent accepting pregnant or postpartum women to 96 percent accepting gays or lesbians. Adolescents were the exception—they were accepted as clients in only 52 percent of facilities.

Tables 4.10a and 4.10b. These tables indicate the proportions of facilities that offered specially designed substance abuse treatment programs or groups exclusively for specific client types. Overall, 84 percent of facilities offered special programs or groups directed at a specific client type. This proportion was fairly consistent across operating organizations, with the exception of the Federal

government, where only two-thirds (67 percent) of facilities had programs or groups designed for specific client types. Facilities focused on general health care also had a relatively low availability of such programs, at 64 percent, as did facilities focused on the provision of mental health services (73 percent).

Adolescents

Thirty-two percent of facilities offered programs or groups for adolescents. The highest proportions of adolescent programs were found in facilities operated by tribal governments (50 percent) or local governments (36 percent). Programs or groups for adolescents were available in 42 percent of facilities whose focus was the provision of a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services.

Clients with co-occurring disorders

Overall, 35 percent of all facilities provided programs or groups for clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders. These services were most likely to be provided in government-operated facilities. They were offered in 46 percent of State-operated facilities, 42 percent of Federally-operated facilities, and in 40 percent of local government-operated facilities.

Facilities whose focus was provision of mental health services or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services were most likely to offer programs or groups for clients with co-occurring disorders, at 44 percent and 52 percent, respectively.

Criminal justice clients

Twenty-seven percent of all facilities provided programs or groups for criminal justice clients other than DUI/DWI offenders. (Facilities treating incarcerated persons only were excluded from this report; see Chapter 1.) Thirty percent of both private for-profit and local government facilities had such programs. Twenty-nine percent of facilities with a mixed focus on provision of mental health and

substance abuse treatment services had programs or groups for criminal justice clients.

Persons with HIV or AIDS

Eleven percent of facilities offered programs or groups for persons with HIV or AIDS. Facilities operated by State governments were most likely to offer such programs (15 percent). Among facilities focused on provision of substance abuse treatment services, 12 percent offered programs or groups for persons with HIV or AIDS, compared with 10 percent of facilities focused on providing general health care

Gays or lesbians

Special programs or groups for gays or lesbians were available in 6 percent of all facilities. They were most likely to be offered in private for-profit facilities (7 percent). Eight percent of facilities whose primary focus was provision of a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services had programs for gays and lesbians, while only 2 percent of facilities focused on mental health services had such programs or groups.

Seniors or older adults

Seven percent of all facilities provided programs or groups for seniors or older adults. Facilities most likely to have this type of program were Federal and tribal government-operated facilities (12 percent and 11 percent, respectively). Ten percent of facilities focused on provision of a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services had programs or groups for seniors or older adults, as did 9 percent each of facilities whose focus was general health care or mental health services.

Pregnant or postpartum women

Programs or groups for pregnant or postpartum women were offered by 14 percent of all facilities. These programs were most likely to be available in local government facilities (22 percent). Among facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse

treatment services, 15 percent offered programs or groups for pregnant or postpartum women, compared with only 7 percent of facilities focused on providing general health care and 4 percent of facilities focused on mental health services.

Women

Special programs or groups for women were offered in 35 percent of all facilities. These were most likely to be available in State and local government facilities (44 percent and 39 percent, respectively). Similarly, 40 percent of facilities focused on provision of substance abuse treatment services had programs or groups for women.

Men

Special programs or groups for men were available in 27 percent of all facilities. One-third (32 percent) of tribal government facilities had programs or groups for men. Similarly, about one-third (30 percent) of facilities focused on provision of substance abuse treatment services had programs or groups for men.

DUI/DWI offenders

Special programs or groups for DUI/DWI offenders were offered by 33 percent of all facilities. Almost half (49 percent) of private for-profit facilities had such programs, as did 36 percent of tribal government-operated facilities and 35 percent of local government-operated facilities. Programs or groups for DUI/DWI offenders were most likely to be offered by facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (41 percent).

Services Offered

Facilities were asked about the types of services they offered. Services were grouped into six broad categories. (See Appendix A, the 2003 N-SSATS Questionnaire, Question 10, for specific services within each category.)

- Assessment services
- Substance abuse therapy and counseling
- Pharmacotherapies
- ◆ Testing
- ♦ Transitional services
- Other services (e.g., case management, child care, transportation assistance)

The majority of facilities offered one or more of the specific services in each category, although the availability of services varied somewhat by facility operation and primary focus. Differences were most apparent in testing, transitional services, and other services.

Tables 4.11a and 4.11b. At least one of the assessment services was available in 95 percent of all facilities, and their availability differed little by facility operation. The exception was mental health assessment and diagnosis, which was more readily available in Federal, State, and local government-operated facilities (65 percent, 54 percent, and 52 percent, respectively) than in facilities operated by other entities.

Substance abuse therapy and counseling services, offered by 99 percent of all facilities, differed little by facility operation. Pharmacotherapies, available in 20 percent of all facilities, were far more readily available in Federal and State government-operated facilities (68 percent and 34 percent, respectively) than in facilities operated by other entities.

Testing services were available in 85 percent of all facilities. Good availability of a wide range of tests was most frequently found in State and Federal government-operated facilities, and least likely to be found in tribal government facilities. Similarly, facilities operated by private for-profit organizations were less likely than other facilities operated by other entities to offer any of the specific transitional or other services

Tables 4.12a and 4.12b. The overall availability of assessment services (95 percent) differed little by facility focus. However, mental health assessment and diagnosis was far more readily available in facilities focused on provision of mental health services, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, and general health care (92 percent, 83 percent, and 74 percent, respectively) than in facilities primarily providing substance abuse treatment services (20 percent).

Although the overall availability of substance abuse therapy and counseling services (99 percent) differed little by primary focus, most specific services were less likely to be offered in facilities whose focus was the provision of mental health services or general health care than in other facilities. Pharmacotherapies, available in 20 percent of all facilities, were more readily available in facilities focused on provision of general health care (49 percent) or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (28 percent) than in facilities primarily providing substance abuse treatment services (16 percent).

Testing services were available in 85 percent of all facilities, and good availability of a wide range of tests was found in facilities whose focus was general health care (94 percent of these facilities offered testing) and least likely to be found in facilities focused on providing mental health services (61 percent). Similarly, facilities focused on providing mental health services were less likely than other facilities to offer many of the specific transitional and other services.

Services in Sign Language for the Hearing Impaired and in Languages Other than English

Table 4.13. Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired were offered in 28 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by local and State governments were most likely to offer these services (43 percent and 37 percent, respectively).

Substance abuse treatment services in a language other than English were provided in 44 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by local governments were most likely, at 51 percent, to provide these services. Although substance abuse treatment services were available in a wide range of languages, Spanish was the most commonly reported language, with treatment services in Spanish offered by 40 percent of all facilities and 48 percent of facilities operated by local governments. Treatment services in American Indian/Alaska Native languages were offered in 2 percent of facilities overall. However, 50 percent of facilities operated by the Indian Health Service and 36 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments offered these services.

Payment Options

Tables 4.14a and 4.14b. Cash or self-payment and private insurance were the most widely accepted forms of payment for substance abuse treatment (accepted by 90 percent and 68 percent of facilities, respectively). Medicaid was accepted by more than half of all facilities (53 percent). State-financed health insurance, Federal military insurance, and Medicare were each accepted by about one-third of all facilities (36 percent, 35 percent, and 35 percent, respectively).

A sliding fee scale for substance abuse treatment charges was used by 64 percent of all facilities. More than half (55 percent) of all facilities offered treatment at no charge to eligible clients who could not pay, and 4 percent provided treatment at no charge to all clients.

The type of payment accepted varied considerably by facility operation and primary focus. Facilities operated by local and State governments had relatively high proportions of acceptance of a wide range of payment options. They were most likely to use a sliding fee scale (82 percent and 72 percent, respectively), and to offer treatment at no charge to eligible clients who could not pay (71 percent and 75 percent, respectively). However, while 9 percent of State-operated facilities provided treatment

at no charge to all clients, only 3 percent of facilities operated by local governments did so.

Private for-profit facilities were less likely than facilities operated by other entities to accept public payment sources such as Medicare, Medicaid, or other State-financed health insurance. They were less likely to use a sliding fee scale (50 percent) or to provide treatment at no charge to eligible clients who could not pay (26 percent). Treatment at no charge for all clients was provided by less than 1 percent of private for-profit facilities. In contrast, 30 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments provided treatment at no charge to all clients, and 89 percent provided treatment at no charge to eligible clients who could not pay.

Facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services were less likely than other facilities to accept payment options other than cash or self-payment—60 percent accepted private health insurance, 45 percent accepted Medicaid, 29 percent accepted other State-financed health insurance, 24 percent accepted Federal military insurance, and 21 percent accepted Medicare.

Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

Facilities were asked whether they were licensed, certified, or accredited by various organizations. These included the State substance abuse agency, State mental health department, State public health department or board of health, hospital licensing authority, or other State/local agency or organization. Also included were accreditation organizations: the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO), the Rehabilitation Accreditation Commission (CARF), the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA), and Council on Accreditation for Children and Family Services (COA).

Tables 4.15a and 4.15b. Overall, 95 percent of all facilities reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or more agencies or organizations. Most facilities (81 percent) named the State

substance abuse agency, 34 percent listed the State mental health department, and 32 percent listed the State public health department/board of health. Accreditation by JCAHO was reported by 24 percent of facilities, but accreditation by CARF, COA, or NCQA were relatively rare (13 percent, 5 percent, and 3 percent, respectively).

Fourteen percent of all facilities reported licensing, certification, or accreditation by a State or local agency or organization that was not specifically included in the N-SSATS questionnaire. The proportion of facilities accredited by another organization than was listed in the questionnaire was relatively high for tribal government facilities (30 percent) and private for-profit facilities (16 percent).

Facility Funding

Facilities were asked several questions about sources of funding, including whether the facility had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of substance abuse treatment services, and whether the facility received Federal, State, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment.

Table 4.16. Just over half of all facilities (51 percent) reported that they had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of substance abuse treatment services. In general, government-operated facilities were less likely to have such agreements or contracts than were privately-operated facilities (41 percent or less, compared to 53 percent or more). Facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services were most likely to have agreements or contracts with managed care organizations (62 percent), while facilities providing general health care were the least likely to have managed care agreements or contracts (45 percent).

Two-thirds (66 percent) of all facilities received Federal, State, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment services. Not surprisingly, government-operated and private non-profit organizations were more likely to receive

these funds than were private for-profit facilities (69 percent or more, compared to 26 percent).

Client Outreach

Facilities were asked several questions about client outreach, including whether the facility operated a hotline responding to substance abuse problems, whether it had Internet access, and whether it had a web site providing information about its substance abuse treatment programs.

Table 4.17. One-quarter (25 percent) of all facilities reported that they operated a hotline responding to substance abuse problems. Hotlines were most likely to be operated by local and State government-operated facilities (40 percent and 31 percent, respectively). Higher proportions of hotline operation were reported by facilities providing mental health services or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (38 percent and 36 percent, respectively) than by facilities focused on providing substance abuse treatment services (20 percent).

Almost all facilities (89 percent) reported that they had access to the Internet. Half of all facilities (50 percent) had web sites providing information about their substance abuse treatment programs. These were most common among facilities operated by private non-profit organizations (57 percent). They were relatively uncommon (38 percent) among facilities operated by private for-profit organizations.

CHAPTER 5

CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter describes key characteristics of the 1.092.546 clients in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2003. Clients in treatment were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and non-hospital residential clients receiving substance abuse services on March 31, 2003, and 2) outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detox service at least once during the month of March 2003, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 31, 2003. The majority of tables in the report are organized according to facility operation and the primary focus of the facility. Facility operation indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for profit; private non-profit; or government local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal. Primary focus indicates the services the facility primarily provides: substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services. general health care, or other.

Facility Operation and Primary Focus

Table 5.1. Fifty-six percent of the 1,092,546 clients in treatment on March 31, 2003, were in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations. Another 26 percent were in facilities operated by private for-profit organizations. Nine percent of clients were in local government-operated facilities, 4 percent in State government-operated facilities, 3 percent in Federal government-operated facilities, and 1 percent in facilities operated by tribal governments.

Over two-thirds (68 percent) of all clients in treatment on March 31, 2003, were in facilities whose primary focus was the provision of substance abuse

treatment services. An additional 23 percent were in facilities whose primary focus was a mix of both mental health and substance abuse treatment services. Five percent of clients were in facilities primarily focused on mental health services, and 2 percent were in facilities with a general health care focus

Type of Care

Tables 5.2a, 5.2b, and 5.2c. The 2003 N-SSATS requested data on clients in treatment on March 31, 2003, who received:

- Outpatient treatment services (detoxification, methadone or LAAM maintenance, day treatment or partial hospitalization, intensive treatment, regular treatment)
- Non-hospital residential treatment (detoxification; short-term, i.e., 30 days or less; long-term, i.e., more than 30 days)
- Hospital inpatient treatment (detoxification, treatment)

The majority (89 percent) of clients in treatment on March 31, 2003, were enrolled in outpatient treatment. Ten percent were in non-hospital residential treatment, and 1 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment.

Of the 1,092,546 clients in treatment on March 31, 2003, 54 percent were in regular outpatient treatment, 20 percent were in outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance, 12 percent were in intensive outpatient treatment, 3 percent were in outpatient day treatment or partial hospitalization, and 1 percent were in outpatient detoxification. In addition, 7 percent of all clients

were in non-hospital residential long-term treatment, 2 percent were in non-hospital residential short-term treatment, and 1 percent were in non-hospital residential detoxification. Clients in hospital inpatient treatment, both treatment and detoxification, accounted for 1 percent of all clients.

Clients in treatment at local or Federal governmentoperated facilities were most likely to be in regular outpatient care (70 percent and 60 percent, respectively). Clients in treatment at private non-profit facilities were more likely than clients in facilities operated by other entities to be receiving residential treatment (14 percent) and, more specifically, long-term residential treatment (10 percent).

In facilities focused primarily on providing substance abuse treatment services, 46 percent of clients were in regular outpatient care, 26 percent were in outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance, and 11 percent were in intensive outpatient care. In facilities whose focus was the provision of mental health services or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, 77 percent and 69 percent, respectively, of clients were in regular outpatient care. In facilities focused on the provision of general health care, 58 percent of clients were in regular outpatient care, 14 percent were in intensive outpatient care, and 8 percent were in outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance.

Table 5.2c. Clients in outpatient detoxification or outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance were most likely to be in private for-profit facilities—46 percent of all outpatient detoxification and 45 percent of all outpatient methadone or LAAM maintenance clients. More than three-quarters (77 percent) of clients in non-hospital residential treatment (and 82 percent of clients in non-hospital residential long-term treatment) were in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations.

Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 5.3. On March 31, 2003, nearly half (47 percent) of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse. Thirty-three percent were in treatment for drug abuse only, and 20 percent were in treatment for alcohol abuse only.

Private for-profit facilities had the smallest proportion of clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse (38 percent), and the highest proportion in treatment for drug abuse alone (43 percent). Clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone were found in the highest proportions in Federal government-operated facilities (36 percent overall and 66 percent in Department of Defense facilities).

Facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services had the highest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of drugs alone (38 percent), compared with a range of 19 to 23 percent in facilities focused on provision of other services. In turn, facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services had the smallest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone (18 percent), compared with a range of 26 to 32 percent in facilities focused on provision of other services.

Clients Under Age 18

There were 92,251 clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2003, some 8 percent of the total 1,092,546 clients in treatment on that date.

Table 5.4. Clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2003, were more likely to be in private non-profit facilities than was the general client population (66 percent and 56 percent [Table 5.1], respectively). Private for-profit facilities accounted for 26 percent of all clients in treatment, but only 17 percent of clients under age 18.

Fifty-eight percent of clients under age 18 were in facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services, compared to 68 percent of all clients. Almost one third (32 percent) of clients under age 18 were in facilities whose focus was provision of a mix of mental health and substance abuse services, compared to 23 percent of the total client population.

Table 5.5. Adolescents received types of care broadly similar to the total treatment population [Table 5.2b]. Most (88 percent) were in outpatient treatment, 11 percent were in non-hospital residential treatment, and 1 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment.

CHAPTER 6

STATE DATA

This chapter presents facility data by State and jurisdiction. Facilities operated by Federal agencies are included in the States in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other States.

Table 6.1 details the 2003 N-SSATS survey response rate.

Table 6.2-6.4 provide State- or jurisdictional-level detail for treatment facility and client trends presented in Chapters 2 and 3.

Tables 6.5 to 6.19 provide State- or jurisdictional-level detail for the facility tables presented in Chapter 4.

Tables 6.20 to 6.26 provide State- or jurisdictional-level detail for the client tables presented in Chapter 5.

Table 6.27 presents the number of clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over, according to substance abuse problem treated, by State or jurisdiction.

Survey Response

Table 6.1. The overall response rate for the survey was 96 percent. Thirty-seven States or jurisdictions had response rates that equalled or surpassed the overall rate, and seven States or jurisdictions achieved response rates of 100 percent.

Trends

Tables 6.2a and 6.2b. The five States with the largest numbers of both facilities and clients in treatment accounted for 35 percent of all facilities and 38 percent of all clients in treatment on March 31, 2003. California accounted for the

largest proportion of both facilities and clients, at 13 percent and 14 percent, respectively. New York was next largest, with 8 percent of all facilities and 12 percent of all clients. The other three largest States, in terms of numbers of both facilities and clients in treatment, were Florida, Illinois, and Michigan. The next five largest States in terms of number of facilities were, in descending order, Texas, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Colorado, and Maryland, with a combined total of 16 percent of all facilities. The next five largest States in terms of number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2003, were, in descending order, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Maryland, Texas, and Ohio, with a combined total of 17 percent of all clients in treatment.

Tables 6.3a and 6.3b. The proportion of facilities having agreements or contracts with managed care organizations increased in 43 States and jurisdictions between 1997 and 2003. Similarly, the proportion of clients in facilities having agreements or contracts with managed care organizations increased in 38 States or jurisdictions during the same period. There was wide variation among States and jurisdictions in the proportions of facilities with such agreements or contracts, and in the proportions of clients in facilities with such agreements or contracts.

Tables 6.4a and 6.4b. The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment increased in 28 States and jurisdictions between 1997 and 2003, and fell in 29 States and jurisdictions.


Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population Aged 18 and Over

Table 6.27. For the United States, there were 454 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over on March 31, 2003.

The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug problems (209 per 100,000 population aged 18 and over), followed by drug abuse only (152 per 100,000 population aged 18 and over), and alcohol abuse only (93 per 100,000 population aged 18 and over). While these rates can suggest the extent of the underlying substance abuse problem, they also reflect the level of resources available for treatment and should be interpreted with caution.

Facilities also had the opportunity to respond to the questionnaire via the Internet, and Internet responses accounted for 28 percent of responses from eligible facilities in 2003. A printed version of the Internet interview is not included here because it contains embedded instructions and skip patterns that make it difficult to read.

The questionnaire was administered by telephone to those facilities that, after follow-up efforts detailed in Chapter 1, had not completed the survey. The telephone interview was administered using computer-assisted telephone interviewing (CATI). Telephone responses accounted for 23 percent of responses from eligible facilities in 2003. A printed version of the CATI interview is not included here because it contains embedded instructions and skip patterns that make it difficult to read.



APPENDIX C

N-SSATS BACKGROUND

Survey History

N-SSATS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational focus, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, and inpatient/residential capacity. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978.

In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a cosponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were added, and the study was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version called the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory was used. In 1987, the full version of the survey was reinstated and renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989 to 1993.

In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies. The survey was redesigned, and conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set (UFDS) survey from 1995 to 1998. During these years, the survey was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up of non-respondents. The 1999 survey year was a transition year during which the survey was redesigned, and an abbreviated telephone survey of treatment facilities was conducted. In 2000, a redesigned full

mail survey was reinstated with telephone followup; it was renamed the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS). The reference date for the annual survey had always been the end of September or beginning of October. After the 2000 survey, the reference date was changed to the end of March, and no survey was conducted during 2001.

In 2000, the use of an Internet-based questionnaire was tested, and beginning in 2002, all facilities were offered the opportunity to respond via the Internet.

N-SSATS in the Context of the Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS)

N-SSATS is one of the three components of SAMHSA's Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS). The core of DASIS is the Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), a continuously-updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities. The other components of DASIS are N-SSATS and the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of admissions to substance abuse treatment. Together, the components provide national- and State-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals.

I-SATS is the list frame for N-SSATS. Facilities in I-SATS fall into two general categories and are distinguished by the relationship of the facility to its State substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies

The largest group of facilities (about 12,000 in 2003) includes facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State substance abuse agency to provide substance abuse treatment. State DASIS representatives maintain this segment of I-SATS by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA. Some facilities are not licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State agency. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. This group also includes programs operated by Federal agencies, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, and the Indian Health Service. I-SATS records for Federally-operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not approved by State substance abuse agencies

This group of facilities (about 3,000 in 2003) represents the SAMHSA effort in recent years to make I-SATS as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that State substance abuse agencies, for a variety of reasons, do not fund, license, or certify. Many of these facilities are private forprofit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them are identified through periodic screening of alternative source databases. (See *Special efforts to improve survey coverage*, below.) State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Survey Coverage

The use of I-SATS as the list frame for N-SSATS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of response and the scope of facilities included. In addition, the expansion of I-SATS in recent years to provide a more complete enumeration of substance abuse treatment facilities means that year-to-year

comparisons of the numbers of facilities reporting to N-SSATS must be interpreted with caution.

Unit of response

N-SSATS is designed to collect data from each physical location where treatment services are provided. Accordingly, SAMHSA requests that State substance abuse agencies use the point of delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. It also requests that facilities be included in I-SATS, N-SSATS, and TEDS at the same administrative level so that record linkage among the three data sets is valid. Because of the different State administrative systems, however, there are some inconsistencies in implementation. For example, in some States, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate State licenses. These are treated as separate by the State substance abuse agency, and are given separate I-SATS ID numbers. In other States, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report services data in N-SSATS, but client data are available only at a higher administrative level. Beginning in 1995, efforts have been made to identify facility networks and to eliminate duplicate reporting by networks. For most facilities, reporting level remains consistent from year to year. However, beginning in 1998, an emphasis was placed on collecting minimum information from all physical locations, and this has resulted in an increase in the number of facilities

Special efforts to improve survey coverage

The great majority of treatment facilities in I-SATS are administratively monitored by State substance abuse agencies. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in I-SATS is affected by differences in State systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some State substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do

not. In some States, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the State substance abuse agency.

To address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on I-SATS. Some 15 source lists were considered, and facilities not on I-SATS were contacted to ascertain whether they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on I-SATS. (These facilities were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.) Analysis of the results of this effort led to similar but more targeted updates before subsequent surveys. Potential new facilities are identified using data from the American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's biannual Inventory of Mental Health Organizations, the source lists that had yielded the most new facilities in 1995 and 1996. Additional facilities are also identified during the survey itself by survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks. All newly identified facilities are initially included as not approved by the State substance abuse agency. State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agencyapproved list, if appropriate.

Figure 11 is a time line detailing the major changes in survey scope and administration that may have affected the numbers of reporting facilities and clients eligible for inclusion in this report. (See Tables 2.1 and 3.1.)

Expansion of survey coverage to include all sites within networks at which treatment was provided yielded a net increase of about 2,600 facilities between 1997 and 1998. These additions were not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the survey as separate sites. The number of facilities reporting continued to

increase in 1999, but at a slower pace, a net increase of 1,800 facilities. The increase between 1998 and 1999 was in large part because of the improved survey response rate (95 percent in 1999 vs. 90 percent in 1998). In 2003, the number of facilities reporting decreased slightly. The survey response rate remained the same in 2003 as it was in 2002, 96 percent.

Data collection

Until 1996, State substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the UFDS survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized; since that time, SAMHSA has mailed facility survey forms directly to and collected forms directly from the facilities, and has conducted follow-up telephone interviews with the facility director or his/her designee.

Non-response

Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from non-responding facilities. A representative sample of non-respondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all nonresponding facilities. In 1997, a series of measures was introduced to enhance the survey response rate. These included advance notification and improved methods for updating address and contact information. In 2003, use of these methods and intensive telephone follow-up resulted in a non-response rate of only 4 percent. For 96 percent of facilities in the sample, it was possible either to complete the survey or to determine that the facility had closed or was otherwise ineligible.

Exclusions

In 1997, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded; these facilities were reinstated in 1998.

Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) were excluded from the 1997 UFDS survey and

Number of Facilities and Clients in Treatment: 1997-2003



subsequent surveys because SAMHSA conducted a separate survey of correctional facilities.¹ During that survey, it was discovered that jails, prisons, and other organizations treating incarcerated persons only were poorly enumerated on I-SATS. Beginning in 1999, these facilities were identified during the survey and excluded from analyses and public use data files

I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include specialty substance abuse treatment facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed on I-SATS and surveyed in N-SSATS only if the State sub-

stance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included.

Beginning in 2000, halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment were included on I-SATS and in N-SSATS so that they could be listed in the *National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Programs* and on the Treatment Facility Locator (http://findtreatment.samhsa.gov). These facilities were excluded from analyses and public use data files.

Changes in Survey Content

Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, both to minimize non-response and to include areas of emerging interest such as the role of managed care. *Table C.1* shows the major content areas for the survey from 1995 to 2003.
