# European Union Market Development Reports EUREPGAP Update 2003

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### Report Highlights:

At a EUREPGAP global conference in September, certain European retailers said that they will request EUREPGAP certification from their suppliers of fresh fruits and vegetables starting on January 1, 2004. A new EUREPGAP protocol for fresh produce was also unveiled.

Includes PSD Changes: No Includes Trade Matrix: No Unscheduled Report Brussels USEU [BE2] EUREPGAP is a pre-farm gate good agricultural practices certification program established by European retailers in 1997. The EHI-EuroHandelsinstitut e.V., a non-profit private research and education institute in Cologne, Germany, acted as international secretariat in the construction phase of EUREP until February 2001. Since March 2001, EHI founded the independent company FOODPLUS GmbH that serves as legal owner of the protocol and hosts the EUREP Secretariat. EUREPGAP is not a legal requirement, but may be required by individual retailers as part of their contract specifications.

Currently, EUREP has established a GAP protocol for fresh fruits and vegetables and is working on integrated farm assurance protocols for arable crops and livestock. At the EUREPGAP conference in September 2003, an updated fruits and vegetables protocol was unveiled. The details of this new protocol, as well as the planned protocols for other crops can be found on the EUREP website: www. eurep.org.

Several European retailers are already requesting EUREPGAP certification for fresh produce or have indicated their intention to begin requesting certification by January 1, 2004. However, not all European retailers are members of EUREP and not all members have the same requirements or deadlines. In addition, some retailers may continue to impose additional GAP requirements on suppliers above and beyond EUREPGAP. Suppliers should check with individual retailer customers about their requirements.

In addition to certification to the EUREPGAP protocol, there is also a possibility to have existing GAP standards benchmarked to EUREPGAP. This allows farmers covered by an existing standard to have their produce recognized as EUREPGAP equivalent. According to the EUREP website, the following existing GAP programs have been recognized as equivalent

to EUREPGAP: Assured Produce (UK), Naturane (Spain), Natursense (Spain) and UNE (Spain).

EUREP has established a new benchmarking procedure and has recognized JAS-ANZ to carry out assessments. JAS-ANZ was established by the Australian and New Zealand Governments in 1991 for the purpose of being the recognized accreditation body for the two countries to facilitate. It is also member of the International Accreditation Forum (IAF) and is party to the Multi-Lateral Agreement (MLA).
