White House and CNCS Announce New Grants to Involve Volunteers in Homeland Security

To meet the President's goal of engaging Americans in the war against terror, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) has awarded \$10.3 million in competitive grants to help support recruitment of volunteers for local homeland security efforts. The new initiative will help 37,000 AmeriCorps and Senior Corps members and other volunteers nationwide to answer the President's Call to Service in the areas of public safety, public health, emergency response, and disaster preparedness.

HHS Offers Grants to Develop Medical Reserve Corps Through Local Volunteers

Thompson has announced that \$2 million in grants will be available to help local officials develop volunteer Medical Reserve Corps units to strengthen emergency medical response and public health infrastructure in their communities. Medical Reserve Corps units will be composed of community-led, community-based volunteers who may assist medical response professionals and facilities during large-scale local emergencies. Volunteers may include current or retired health professionals,

social workers, and clergy, among others.
