Answering the President's Call to Service

Non-profit organizations are continuing to answer the President's Call to Service by making important commitments to engage more Americans in volunteer service. Among the commitments already made:

<u>Habitat for Humanity International</u> (HFHI) is collaborating with the Peace Corps to greatly expand the placement of Peace Corps volunteers working directly with HFHI programs. The organizations are partnering in up to 40 countries in various capacities, including community and youth development, family education, and the construction of houses.

Jumpstart will grow to an additional 20 communities next year and will train and support 2,000 college students to deliver a preschool enrichment program to 7,500 children via 700,000 hours of service. Jumpstart is a national organization that engages young people in service to work toward the day every child in America enters school prepared to succeed.

The <u>U.S. Junior Chamber (Jaycees)</u>, a national service organization of 70,000 young adults, has called upon its chapters to play a vital role in supporting Citizen Corps by assisting in the formation of Citizen Corps Councils in their communities.

HHS and USA Freedom Corps Launch Medical Reserve Corps

On November 1, HHS Secretary Tommy Thompson announced 42 demonstration grants totaling \$2 million to community-based organizations to begin building local Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) units that will help local communities prepare and respond in the event of a public health emergency.

The local MRC units are comprised of community-based, community-led volunteers who are trained to respond to health crises. Volunteers will assist with emergency response, logistical planning, records keeping, public health and awareness campaigns, and public communications. In addition to playing an important role during a large-scale local emergency, MRC volunteers will also help promote the public health of their communities.

"The Medical Reserve Corps gives Americans an opportunity to help out in their community. All of us have talents and skills and there is no better place to use those talents than in service to the local community," Secretary Thompson said.
