## President George W. Bush Celebrates First Year Anniversary of the USA Freedom Corps

On January 30, 2003, President George W. Bush celebrated the first anniversary of the USA Freedom Corps with 500 guests, including young people, their mentors and teachers, and leaders of service organizations at the Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Washington. The President marked the anniversary by launching new initiatives that will engage more Americans in service to their neighbors and their Nation:

**★** President's Council on Service and Civic Participation President Bush announced a new President's Council on Service and Civic Participation, which will oversee a massive nationwide effort to engage more individuals in volunteer service develop new federal initiatives to and recognize them for their dedication.
