

"We the People" Forum **Supports Teaching of American History and Civics**

On May 1, the USA Freedom Corps with the U.S. Department of Education, Corporation for National and Community Service, and National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) co-hosted the "We the People Forum on American History, Civics, and Service" to call attention to the need to improve the teaching of American history and civics and make national treasures more accessible to teachers and students.

The Forum, held at the National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C., is one component of a multi-agency effort that President Bush announced last fall to support the teaching of American history and civics. Click here for a summary of the initiatives.

At the Forum, U.S. Secretary of Education Rod Paige announced that his department is accepting applications for nearly \$100 million in grants for "Teaching American History" (click here for details). ## President Bush Launches "Volunteers for Prosperity"

On May 21, in his commencement address at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, President George W. Bush announced "Volunteers for Prosperity," a new volunteer-based initiative to support major U.S. development initiatives using the talents of highly-skilled Americans to work with nongovernmental and voluntary service organizations in countries around the world.

Volunteers for Prosperity, an initiative of the USA Freedom Corps, encourages American professionals to volunteer for a flexible period of time in developing countries and emerging economies.

Working with federal government agencies that administer foreign aid programs, the USA Freedom Corps will match doctors, nurses, teachers, engineers, economists, computer specialists, and others with organizations working on specific
