
Administration Launches New Civics Initiative

At a special ceremony on September 17 with President George W. Bush, the Archivist of the United States, John W. Carlin, officially launched *The People's Vote: 100 Documents That Shaped America*, a national challenge to engage Americans in a lively and thoughtful debate about which are the most influential documents in American history. *The People's Vote* invites all Americans to vote for ten documents from the list of 100 milestone documents chosen by historians and the National Archives, or to write in their favorites.

The People's Vote is part of a larger project created by the <u>National</u>
<u>Archives</u> and <u>National History Day</u> in collaboration with the <u>USA Freedom</u>
<u>Corps</u> titled Our Documents: A
National Initiative on American
History, Civics and Service. Siemens,
The History Channel and U.S. News

and World Report are sponsoring the Our Documents initiative, the purpose of which is to provide programs like The People's Vote to engage teachers, students, parents, and all Americans in a better understanding of the documents that shaped our country.

Also on September 17, the <u>Our</u> <u>Documents</u> website was re-launched to foster dialogue about democracy and the documents that shaped America. The website features resources and lesson plans for educators and other professionals interested in enhancing civic engagement and service-learning projects for students.

The Archivist of the United States will announce the results of *The People's Vote* and unveil the ten documents that received the most votes at a ceremony in the Rotunda for the Charters of Freedom on December 15, 2003, Bill of Rights Day.

President Bush Signs Executive Order for Volunteers for Prosperity

On September 25, President Bush signed an <u>Executive Order</u> for the Volunteers for Prosperity initiative, directing appropriate federal agencies and departments to look for ways to expand, promote, and enhance volunteer service opportunities overseas for American professionals. The awards are delivered through a variety of local, state, and national organizations that are registered as "certifying organizations."
