On June 1, President George W. Bush addressed the first White House National place." Conference on Faith-Based and Community Initiatives in Washington, D.C. The Conference highlighted the progress of the President's initiative and focused on key programs created by the Administration to assist faith-based and Americans most in need.

The President launched the Initiative in 2001 to help end discrimination against faith-based and community charities and enable them to compete on a level playing field for federal social service funds. In his remarks at the Conference, President Bush said: "I do believe that groups should be allowed to access social service grants, so long as they don't proselytize, or exclude somebody simply because they don't share a certain faith. In other words, there's a way to accomplish the separation of church and state, and at the same time, accomplish the social objective of having America

become a hopeful place, and a loving

That same day, President Bush signed an Executive Order creating additional Centers for Faith-Based and Community Initiatives in three federal agencies joining seven other Centers already created by the President to help ensure community groups in their efforts to help that grassroots leaders can compete on an equal footing for federal dollars, receive greater private support, and face fewer bureaucratic barriers.

The National Conference followed 12 White House Regional Conferences held thus far. The next Regional Conference is in Boston on July 8.
