In recent remarks, Secretary of Homeland

Conference attendees (51 out of 56 states and territories are represented) are focus ing on a number of priorities, including ways to improve volunteer programs. Citizen Corps recently announced that county, local, and tribal Citizen Corps Councils now serve 50% of the United States population.

Created by President George W. Bush in January 2002, Citizen Corps mobilizes citizens across America to prepare, train, and volunteer to protect themselves, their

Peace Corps Returns to China In late July, 48 Peace Corps volunteers arrived in China to teach English and environmental education. The Peace Corps program was suspended in China in April 2003 due to concerns over a SARS outbreak. The Peace Corps resumed its partnership with China, the world's most populous country, after an assessment team determined that it was safe for reentry.
