
Goal

- Identify and target rural areas for outreach, utilizing our experiences with Indian Country.
- Disseminate information and educate stakeholders through a web portal, bureau points of contact, and outreach programs;
- Listen and learn through workshops and forums, e.g. the Rural Wireless ISP Showcase.


Telephone Penetration Rates by County - 2000






Applying the ITI model, we identify three new targeted regions for the next stage:

- Alaska Native Villages
- Appalachian Region
- Delta Region





Subscribership: American Indian Households Without Service



•American Indian and Alaska Native communities, on average, have among the lowest reported telephone subscribership levels in the country.



Experiences in Indian Country

We have learned:

- Access to telecommunications services remains a challenge.
- Factors leading to low subscribership and deployment:
 - Lack of information regarding the availability of Federal assistance programs.
 - Other priorities/barriers that inhibit infrastructure development.
- Despite having made strides, more work needs to be done.

Outreach Initiatives

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- Indian Telecommunications Initiatives comprehensive outreach efforts include:
 - Interactive regional workshops
 - Commission staff attend and participate at tribal conferences.
 - Meet with individual tribes to address specific telecommunications issues.
 - Disseminate educational materials to American Indian tribes and organizations.

Target Region I: Expand ITI to Alaska Native Villages






Challenges Facing Alaska Native Villages


- 227 of the more than 560 federally-recognized tribes are located in Alaska.
- Alaska Native Villages comprise about 19% of Alaska's population and more than 80% of its rural population.




Increases in Tribal Lifeline Assistance Subscribership



The Appalachian Region

- The Region includes 410 counties in 13 states, extending more than 1,000 miles, from southern New York through, Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia, Maryland, Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama to northeast Mississippi.
- Nearly 23 million people, or 8% of the U.S. population, reside in the region.
- The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) identifies 121 of 410 counties in Appalachia as distressed.
- The distressed counties represent 1.02% of U.S. housing units but 2.62% of U.S. housing units without phone service.

Target Region III: Delta Region



The Delta Region

- 240 County/Parish region spans eight states
 - Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana,
 Mississippi, Missouri, Tennessee

• The region represents 3.33% of U.S. housing units but 6.12% of U.S. housing units without phone service.





Outreach Initiatives for Target Regions

- Embark on a targeted outreach campaign to inform and educate consumers about the availability of Federal Lifeline and LinkUp support.
- Expand scope of outreach to include participation in regional workshops, conferences and events.
- Partner with other federal, state, and local agencies.
- Outreach goals include:
 - Analyze and evaluate the region's specific telecommunications needs and goals.
 - Demonstrate the federal government's commitment to bringing telecommunication services to Rural America.



Establish senior bureau points of contact:

- effectively coordinates and disseminate information on FCC rural activities;
- streamline the exchange of information among bureaus regarding items affecting rural America; and
- serve as the bureaus'central point of contact for outside parties.
