Description

This workshop is designed to critically examine the scientific evidence regarding the safety and efficacy of musculoskeletal allograft tissue. Finally, the program will include a practical component that will cover applications, techniques and results with different types of allograft tissues. Participants will be given the opportunity to observe and practice procedures that are discussed.
