Twilight Tattoo: A Tradition on the Ellipse

 \mathbf{F} orget what you normally think about when you hear the word "tattoo." To the Army, the Tattoo is a brilliant military pageant dating back to the 19th century that leads the audience on a stroll through the years of American military history, including performances by the Army Drill Team, the Fife and Drum Corps, the Army Band, and the Army Blues Jazz Ensemble.

Beginning in late Spring and usually concluding in July, Twilight Tattoo is held every Wednesday evening at 7 p.m. on the Ellipse. An interpretive program about the history of the Twilight Tattoo will be offered at the Visitor Center on Wednesdays.

These programs are made possible through the U.S. Army Military District of Washington. The Twilight Tattoo Program is the winner of the Department of the Army's 2001 Chief of Public Affairs Community Relations Award for Distinction for Ongoing Community Relations Programs.





Celebrate Our Symbol of Freedom

In August 1949, President Harry S Truman proclaimed June 14th "Flag Day." Ever since, the President has proclaimed the commemoration yearly and encourages all Americans to proudly display the "Stars and Stripes" outside their homes and businesses.

National flags are not merely symbols of a country. Their colors and designs convey past history and future goals. The first flag, called the Grand Union, was first flown at the headquarters of the Continental Army on January 1, 1776. Betsy Ross, a seamstress, is said to have contributed to this design.

On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress proposed that the United States adopt a national

flag with 13 stars and stripes representing each of the 13 new American states.

There were few public ceremonies honoring the Stars and Stripes until 1877, when on June 14, it was flown from every government building in honor of the centennial of the adoption of a national flag. The first official Flag Day was observed in Pennsylvania in 1893.

All Americans should pause for a moment on Flag Day, June 14 at 7 p.m. (EDT), to simultaneously recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. The effect of this simple ceremony each year is a stimulating patriotic experience.

The First Division of the Army Monument is located west of the White House and south of the Dwight D. Eisenhower Executive Office Building. As you stroll around President's Park, take a few moments to admire this beautiful monument.

The First Division of the American Expeditionary Forces was created during World War I and has served honorably in almost every United States military engagement since. This monument was created to honor those who died in World War I; their names appear on the bronze plates at the base of the memorial.

The statue on top is called "Winged Victory," and was designed by sculptor Daniel Chester French. She is made of bronze plated in gold and sits atop a 65 foot column of pink Massachusetts granite – one of the largest pieces ever quarried in the United States.

Panels have subsequently been added to bear the names of those who died in World War II, Vietnam, and Operation Desert Storm. The memorial was paid for by members of the First Division and was dedicated in 1924. Today the monument and grounds are maintained by the National Park Service. The nickname of the First Division is "The Big Red One" and a bed of flowers in front of the memorial spells out a huge numeral "1" almost every summer.
