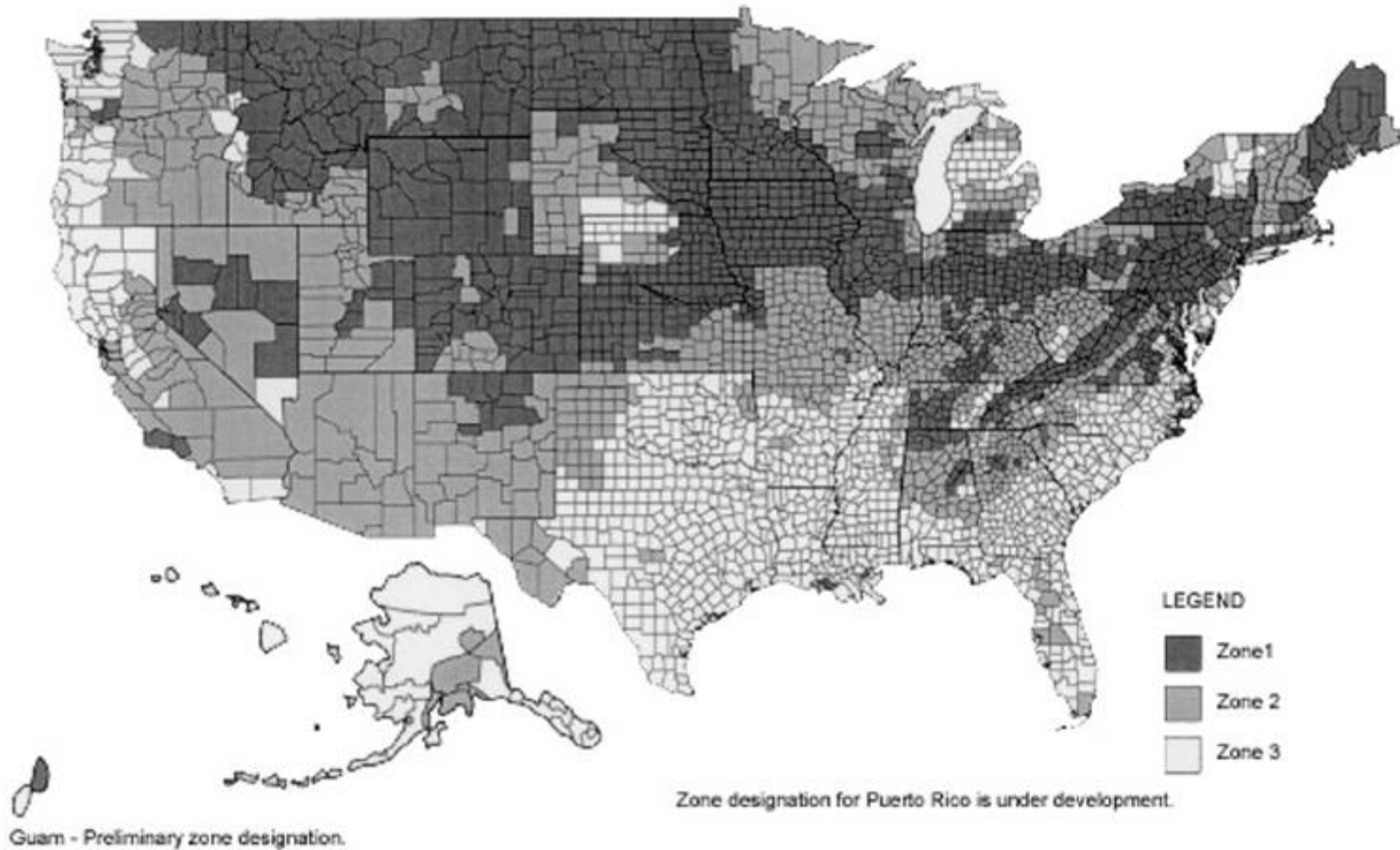


EPA MAP OF RADON ZONES



The purpose of this map is to assist national, state and local organizations to target their resources and to implement radon-resistant building zones. This map is not intended to determine if a home in a given zone should be tested for radon. Homes with elevated levels of radon have been found in all three zones. All homes should be tested, regardless of geographic location.

Important: Consult the EPA Map of Radon Zones (EPA-402-R-93-071) and state-specific booklets (EPA-402-R-93-021 through 070) before using this map. This documentation contains important information on radon potential variations with counties. EPA also recommends that this map be supplemented with any available local data in order to further understand the radon potential of a specific area. EPA encourages state and local jurisdictions to collect and analyze state and local indoor radon measurements and assess geology, soil parameters and housing characteristics - in conjunction with referring to the EPA Map of Radon Zones - to determine specific areas within their jurisdictions that should be classified as Zone 1.
